# Looking after people in difficulty

#### **Paul Morris**

talks to three organizations who help people in distress

#### Samusocial

ne of the main players in Belgian aid services is Samusocial, which is the local branch of Samusocialinternational. They provide a free number (0800 99340) that anyone can call. So who uses the number? Christophe Thielens explains: "Homeless people and people in distress contact us, normally about housing requests or information on social services, etc. The social services, hospitals and police also dial up when they come into contact with someone who needs help. We also get calls about tourists who have

been mugged, women who are victims of domestic violence or people evicted from their apartment. The general public also uses it to report anyone they come across who requires our services."

Christophe said: "Our mobile teams, composed of a driver, a nurse and a

social worker/or a psychologist drive around Brussels looking for people who seem to be in physical or social distress. The teams provide a friendly ear, food and hot drinks, blankets, clean clothes, care products and primary medical care and psychological support."

Samusocial also provides emergency accommodation for many of these people and offers the same service in their centres, including psychological consultations and medical consultations (provided by Médecins du Monde).

Christophe said: "We try to stimulate them to accept a social support plan. A social worker helps them to make appointments in

specialized services (public administration, public social services, medical appointment, etc.); drug addicts, alcoholics and people with psychiatric problems are referred to rehabilitation centres; other people are oriented to nursing homes, hospitals, private housing, centres for victims of domestic violences, etc. Samusocial offers psychological support as well."

In winter, they have at least 900 additional beds (November-March), 600 beds more than the

300 beds they have available all year round. They also have other initiatives aimed at finding permanent housing for people who have lost their way in life.

Samusocial has also had to react to the asylum crisis, providing a permanent hygiene framework and

humanitarian standby 24h/24 to support the most vulnerable people.

So, how is this all paid for? Christophe explained: "The remaining state funding is insufficient to meet the growing exclusion of people from society. Samusocial seeks to develop partnerships with the private sector to provide the means to boost its power to react. Partners such as Carrefour, Belfius, Interparking financially support us. Samusocial also invites the general public to support our efforts through financial donations (online or www.samusocial. be on the account BEO4 0000 0000 3131 - all donations of more than €40 tax deductible).

non-profit organization dedicated to helping the homeless and the helpless, Solidarité Grands Froids' motto is "Improving life in the streets".

#### Help the homeless

From November to March, this operation allows the holding of two weekly social changing rooms in collaboration with the Brussels Samusocial, making two premises available Tuesday and Friday evenings.

Volunteers sign up for the distribution, and the calendar manager oversees all registrations in collaboration with leaders of the social changing rooms.

This project attracts a hundred volunteers every year.

Solidarité Grand Froids' Cynthia Simpson explains: "Basically, our core business is to provide clothes to the homeless and try to be there for them to make their everyday lives a little 'warmer'. We believe in educating homeless children by giving them the correct tools, such as school books, as well giving

as access to books in one of the three bookshops we have set up. We also organize events such as Saint Nicolas and other Christmas activities."

#### Recycling

- Collection of items such as dishes, furniture to assist organizations helping people reintegrate into life.
- Libraries: The books are distributed to organizations such as children's homes, and those that need aid with literacy.
- Plastic bottle tops are collected to help the Belgian Center for Guide Dogs (le Centre Belge

pour Chiens-Guide).

Cynthia adds: "In addition, we act as 'wholesalers' to various associations, since we have noticed that many people want to help but no one takes care of organizing it. We donate to any association that makes a request and also organize teambuilding events for large corporations."

#### **Social Reintegration**

Two very strong strings to Solidarité Grands Froids' bow are Mamy Douceurs and SolidariFemmes. Mamy Douceurs' task is to help homeless children living in the street through donations of clothing, diapers and school supplies..

SolidariFemmes is a group with the verv specific remit of helping women in distress. A number of them have fled their homes and often arrive with their children to protect them and rebuild their lives in a refuge. After intense psychosocial work done by professionals, these women have to find

a home and rebuild their lives but they often have nothing.

"Our specificity is that all our donations toward any beneficiary are free of charge," says Cynthia. "You can donate directly to: Account Number (IBAN): BE82 6511 5585 6168."



### So what is this biological age?

Biomarkers of aging are biomarkers that better predict functional capacity at a later age than chronological age. Stated another way, biomarkers of aging would give the true 'biological age', which may be different from the chronological age.

Validated biomarkers of aging would allow for testing interventions to extend lifespan, because changes in the biomarkers would be observable throughout the lifespan of the organism. Although maximum lifespan would be a means of validating biomarkers of aging, it

would not be a practical means for long-lived species such as humans because longitudinal studies would take far too much time. Ideally, biomarkers of aging should assay the biological process of ageing and not a predisposition to disease, should cause a minimal amount of trauma to assay in the organism, and should be reproducibly measurable during a short interval compared to the lifespan of the organism.

Although graying of hair increases with age, hair greying cannot be called a biomarker of ageing. Similarly, skin wrinkles and other common changes seen with aging are not better indicators of future functionality than chronological age. Biogerontologists have continued efforts to find and validate biomarkers of aging, but success thus far has been limited. Levels of CD4 and CD8 memory T cells and naive T cells have been used to give good predictions of the expected lifespan of middleaged mice.

Biological clocks, for example the epigenetic clock, are promising biomarkers of aging. *Wikipedia.org*

# The power of the mind offers advice on positive thinking




"The mind is a flexible mirror, adjust it to see a better world." Amit Ray

Do you know someone who is almost always happy, smiling and positive? On the contrary, do you know people who are negative,



Ultimately, we attract and are attracted to people who resemble us.

## The task ahead

**Gemma Rose** put the case for the right to not devote ourselves entirely to our jobs



**6 €** We have been trained too long to strive and not to enjoy," wrote John Maynard Keynes in his essay Economic Possibilities for our Grandchildren. Keynes believed that by the year 2030 all our economic problems would be solved, that automation would free up our time and we'd be working a 15-hour work week. Our worries would be focused on what to do with this leisure time. So adamant was the belief – shared by other economists. intellectuals and trade union leaders - that the work day would be substantively shortened, that Life magazine in 1964 dedicated a two part series to it with The Emptiness of Too Much Leisure and The Task Ahead: How to Take Life Easv.

Except that hasn't really happened. We are working longer hours, with more interruptions and demands on our time. Organisations expect our total devotion, just as cults do, and if you don't submit, you get punished. Netflix expects 'A' players in their team: if you are adequate, that's enough to get you fired. If you want flexible hours, you may suffer stigmatization, as illustrated in a study by Professors Joan Williams and Mary Blair-Loy at Stanford University, published in 2012. If you ask to reduce your workload, you get penalized for it, as a recent study by Erin Reid at Boston University highlighted.

We live in a society which perpetuates the 'ideal worker' myth, where not only are we expected

to work harder, but also be smarter. The strivers are rewarded whereas those that believe there is more to life than being a slave to your desk are perceived as idlers. Yet, we also live in a society where one part of the population is over-worked and another can't even get a job.

There is an increasing amount of evidence to show that working too much is not good for us, whether you are in a 'bullshit job' (a term that has been academically coined) or in a job you love. Authors from the Finnish Institute of Occupational Health looked at a range of studies that suggested that employees who work long hours have a 40% increased risk in coronary heart disease. Too much work also kills productivity and is unhealthy for the environment. The Washington Post reported

that even though American productivity seems enormous, once it becomes proportional to productivity per hours worked. the US ranks much lower, even below countries that have a shorter work day. Concerning

sustainability, the UK think tank the New Economics Foundation found in their book *Time* on Our Side: Why we need a shorter working week that having a growing economy cannot be reconciled with environmental sustainability.

And we're not happy.

Of course, we seem to strike a better chord concerning work-life balance here in Belgium than in the US or the UK, but that's not to say that it's an uncommon phenomenon or that it's not on the rise.

A past performance review inspired this article. I was doing a good job, I worked on average 40 hours a week but I had requested to reduce my workload (not my working hours). To my

surprise, my position was in jeopardy partly because I was not considered ambitious enough. It made me ask the question: what is the purpose of work? If we view work from a purely economic standpoint, work is meant to serve the needs of society, and once that is done we can take a break. But what has happened is a burgeoning of jobs which really don't serve society, and in fact serve no one. As Tim Wu from the New Yorker writes in 'You Really Don't Need to Work So Much: "But in white-collar jobs, the amount of work can expand indefinitely through the generation of false necessities - that is, reasons for driving people as hard as possible that have nothing to do with real social or economic needs." Perhaps for the time being, one of the ways to work less is to 'fudgel', that is to pretend to

> work when vou're not really working. But this seems dishonest.

Instead, I would rather support the movement for a shorter working week, such as at the British magazine, The four-day working



week.

"We work to have leisure, on which happiness depends," said Aristotle, leisure being the pursuit of arts, reading, playing sport, philosophy, or perhaps the simple merriment of idleness.

Back in 1930, John Maynard Keynes had a vision of the life we would be living in one hundred years' time: "We shall honour those who can teach us how to pluck the hour of the day virtuously and well, the delightful people who are capable of taking direct employment in things, the lilies of the field who toil not, neither do they spin."

How I wish he was right.

## Food as fuel

Dietician Sophie Bruno looks at food choices before, during and after workouts

hat time of year is upon us vet again. Christmas is traditionally a time of over-indulaence: with the calories stacking up over the festive period, exercising to shed some of those extra kilos you may have gained has never been so appealing. Why not jump-start those New Year's resolutions and embrace a healthy you now.

Perhaps you have set vourself some different types of goals over the holiday season. A charity

run for fun? Training for your first half marathon? Or maybe you are simply aiming at improving vour stamina and performance. No matter what vour goal is nutrition plays a pivotal role in supporting the training and competitive demands of sport. Good food choices ensure that you have adequate energy to drive performance and aid recovery.

There are no strict rules or dietary plan that you must adhere to. However, there are some nutritional strategies and tips that may optimize performance.

#### Before: Fuel up

Carbohydrates are vital for performance during sport; muscles rely on carbohydrate as their main source of fuel. Carbohydrate is stored in muscles as glycogen. As the body's stores of alvoogen are limited, topping up the stores each day is key. The amount you require depends on your training programme and dietary goals. In general, the more intense the

training programme the higher the amount of carbohydrates your diet should contain. The consequences of carbohydrate poor diets encompass energy deficits during exercise, early fatigue, loss of concentration and delayed recovery. For your pre-workout meal, combining carbohydrate with protein and fat will provide sustained energy and maximum performance during a training session.

#### Timing of a pre-workout meal

The timing of your food before a workout can make a big difference to how you feel and will have an impact on your performance. For most workouts, you should aim to eat 2 - 4 hours before exercising. If you have no time for a meal then have a smaller, healthy snack up to 30 minutes before training.

#### After: Refuel your tank

The most effective refuelling to kick-start recovery occurs within 0-30 minutes immediately after exercise; for a rapid recovery, both carbohydrate and protein should feature in

your post-exercise snack or meal. The combination of both nutrients promotes faster muscle repair and greater muscle growth, replenishes glycogen stores and reduces post-exercise muscle soreness. If you only focus on high protein intake without an adequate supply of carbohydrate, the protein will be utilized for energy purposes instead of being used to build muscle. Aim to consume 1g carbohydrate per kg body weight following the exercise.

#### **Protein for power**

Furthermore, the post-workout meal or snack should also comprise protein. Protein is required for building and repairing muscle and plays an important role in how the body responds to exercise. One of the biggest myths is that consuming large amounts of protein equates to large biceps. Muscle is gained through a combination

through a combination of resistance training and a diet that contains adequate energy and carbohydrate.

to trigger maximum muscle protein synthesis (MPS) is 15 – 25g (or about 0.25g per kilogram of body weight). Exceeding this amount will not increase MPS for most people. Eating less may produce smaller gains. Leucine, a branched chain amino acid and component of protein, is the key trigger that stimulates MPS as well as promoting muscle recovery after exercise. Milk, whey, casein, egg, meat, poultry and fish are rich sources.

500ml milk with a banana is an example of a healthy option that delivers carbohydrate and protein in amounts that optimize recovery as well as providing other nutritional needs. Milk will provide the protein needed to maximize muscle adaptation after exercise. It also contains the optimal amount of leucine that promotes muscle building after exercise. You can also obtain 20g protein from three eggs or 250g Greek yoghurt or 25g whey powder or ricotta, honey and banana on toast.

As muscle recovery continues for several hours – perhaps up to 24 hours – you should continue consuming protein at regular intervals throughout the day; aim for 15 – 25g of protein at each meal.

#### Hydration

Maintaining adequate hydration is essential for physical and mental performance. It is paramount to start each exercise session well hydrated, to take on board appropriate fluids during the workout and restore hydration levels as soon as possible afterwards in order to optimize the recovery process.

For low-intensity exercise lasting for a short duration, water is a good choice for rehydration. Water is affordable and convenient for most recreational exercisers. Sports drinks containing electrolytes are unnecessary unless you are

training for over an hour. For moderate to high intensity and endurance sports lasting longer than an hour a drink which contains carbohydrate and electrolytes, such as milk or a

commercial isotonic sports drink, is generally more effective than water in enhancing performance. These drinks contain carbohydrate to help delay fatigue by delivering glucose to the muscles and electrolytes to replace sodium lost in sweat. It is important to note that some studies show that milk rehydrates you more effectively than isotonic sports drinks.

Lastly, the sports world is overflowing with bars, pills, powders and specialized foods that all pledge fitness or performance enhancements. They are particularly popular in the athletic as well as recreational sporting domain. Recreational exercisers do not normally require supplements to complement their diet.

Focusing on achieving a healthy, balanced diet with adequate hydration will supply the necessary nutrients and energy for sport and achieving fitness goals.

## Tesla: Electric but not static

Colin Moors takes a look at the electric motor company's Model S

t may surprise you to learn that the electric vehicle is almost 200 years old – although the early iterations are a far cry from the environmentally friendly and ubiquitous hybrids and eco hire vehicles we see around every day. The 1990s saw a lot of excitement and huge R&D budgets going into the production of electric vehicles, only to be blown away by the next wind due to a combination of societal and fiscal factors, as the excellent documentary Who Killed the Electric Car? attests to. After several false starts and due to a lot more people wanting to do their bit for the environment, the electric vehicle is back with a bang – and the biggest bang of them all is being made by Tesla.

As far as the luxury motoring business goes, you can't get more cutting edge than Tesla. They make being a nerd useful and cool, not an easy job to pull off. The particular nerd that manages the whole operation is Elon Musk. A South-African-born entrepreneur, Musk started his path to success with a software company called Zip2, providing city guides to the media. When the company was sold, he bought into a company that later became PayPal. His share of PayPal was over 10% when it was bought by eBay, giving him plenty of cash to play with. So much cash, he bought into an up-and-coming car company in 2004 with the express intentions of creating an electric luxury sports car first, then to move on to mass production of cars for regular people, saloons, sedans and the like. The best laid plans of mice and men, as the saying goes - Musk and his team had spent hundreds of millions and delivered fewer than 200 cars by 2009 and had to be bailed

out by the Advanced Technology Vehicles Manufacturing Loan system set up by the US government, an injection of some \$465 million. They managed to pay the loan back in full, including interest (something still not achieved by Ford or General Motors) and pushed out 33,000 vehicles in 2014.

The Tesla is associated with luxury and style but as promised, the main thrust of the company is now going to be the delivery of vehicles 'for the rest of us'.

The latest thing you can buy, if you have around €160,000 burning a hole in your wallet is the Tesla Model S. It's a big chunk of cash but this is the full-spec option and they do squeeze a lot of features in for the money. Anyone who loves cars will have something good to say about a Tesla but my favourite option is on the top-of-the-range Model S, the P85D. There's a button on the dashboard that takes the acceleration speed of this 2-tonne behemoth from 0-60 mph (96 kph) in a comparatively sluggish 3.1 seconds to a frankly scary 2.8 seconds. The modes are labelled accordingly: 'sport' and 'ludicrous'. I kid you not.

With all this power at your fingertips you might be wondering if you could take it to the shops without having to recharge it. The answer is yes. In fact, you could drive the basic 70 kWh battery model from Brussels to Knokke, run around and do a bit of shopping, then drive home. Technically, you could drive from the south of France to the very top of Sweden for free on the Tesla Supercharger network. Admittedly, if you really wanted to do this, it would take some careful planning and a lot of

hoping that you wouldn't get stuck in traffic (good luck with that, fellow Belgians). Of course, you can charge your car anywhere there's a charging point and many garages these days have a quick charge option to keep you rolling. Still, southern to northern Europe for free would soon start recouping the initial investment.

The other stuff that'll keep you going back for one more go in a Tesla is the dash. You've got your minimalist LCD displays in the BMW and Mercedes, yes but the Tesla S has a 17-inch touchscreen dash. There are no buttons, dials or switches, it's all done via the screen. Media playback is hard to miss on such a huge screen – no more scrabbling around and stabbing wildly at tiny software buttons, it's all there in front of you. Climate control, locks and lighting are all similarly easy to get to. GPS? Of course – Google maps overlaid with street and satellite data. What else? Obviously, there's a speedometer and the usual display in front of the steering wheel for the ruggedly traditional.

You might think that all this technology would make you weary – well, if it does, you could always let the car drive you around. The Autopilot (that's really what it's called) will steer within a lane for you, so with traffic-aware cruise control on you could conceivably read a book – just don't tell anyone I suggested that. It'll change lanes for you as you use the indicator, too, in case you're really tired. When you're done being driven around, it'll look out for a parking space for you, then park in it for you as well.

All in all, I'd say it was money well spent.

Ozaam is the first 100% new generation mobile real estate platform. With the application, access to property information is quicker and more efficient. The next day, I went on holiday with my childhood friend, Julien. We came up with the initial outline of the Ozaam business plan on the plane and thought about how we could create something that would work for the buyer and the agent."

Julien said: "Above all, it is a mobile app that gives anyone who comes across a For Sale sign instant access to information and photographs relating to the property. We give the agent the visitor's contact details, so they can get back in touch with them to schedule a viewing."

Romain adds: "One last benefit has emerged since the launch: lots of property owners who had not wanted a board on the front of their house have now agreed to one. They want to make sure they're on Ozaam. The agents don't get turned down as often and have more For Sale signs going up!"

Clearly a plan that is coming together!

## EU priorities

Gerry Callaghan looks at the major issues ahead in 2016

s 2015 draws solemnly to a close, we pick ourselves up and carry on. The European Union has endured economic instability, a refugee disaster and devastating attacks on its people. But what the tragic events in Paris highlighted is that the people of Europe stand together. If even solely as an act of defiance the EU must and will push ahead. Events might modify the content of the agenda but we, ultimately, must dictate the direction we take.

#### **Foreign Policy**

The EU will focus efforts on three key priority areas: tackling terrorism and preventing radicalization, disrupting organized crime and fighter cybercrime.

The situation in Syria will be paramount on the EU agenda. Over the course of 2016 we will become more aware of the result of increasing airstrikes against ISIS targets in the troubled

North African nation. The formulation of a more diplomatic policy should be top of the agenda. It is possible that more of the same, bombing and ground troops, in our foreign policy could only serve to escalate the situation. It will not solve it.

EU High Representative Federica Mogherini stated that the EU's ultimate goal would be solving the crisis in Syria. She said: "A political solution is the only possible way to defeat Daesh (ISIS) in Syria and Iraq."

The process started in Vienna at the end of 2015 and the international community is working to make progress in three areas in the new year: starting a political process, working on a ceasefire and providing humanitarian assistance to the Syrian people.

She said the only way to make progress was to bring all sides together.

#### **Migration Policy**

The EU will focus migration policy on four different pillars. The first will aim at reducing the incentives for irregular migration by addressing the root causes and dismantling smuggling networks. Secondly, better management of the EU's external border, in particular through solidarity towards Member States that are located at the EU's outer borders. It will look at strengthening the common asylum policy based on solidarity towards those needing international protection. And lastly, the bloc will look at developing a new policy on legal migration. In view of the future demographic challenges the new policy needs to focus on attracting the workers that our economy needs.

The signing of the EU-Turkey agreement at the beginning of December should reduce the heavy flow of migrants into the EU. Europe's leaders are desperate to slow the flow of refugees, and at first glance Turkey appears to be the clear winner in a deal agreed at a summit in Brussels.

The EU will pay an initial sum of €3bn towards the cost of Syrian refugees residing in Turkey, there will be renewed momentum in EU accession talks and for 75 million Turkish citizens there is also the apparently real possibility of visa-free travel to Schengen countries by 2016. Turkish President Recep Tayyip Erdogan would relish achieving the long-sought goal of visa-free travel for all.

However, even if the European Commission recommends visa liberalization next year, there is a strong possibility member states will object. France, by then in the midst of a presidential election cycle with the far-right National Front growing in popularity, might well be to the fore of countries blocking the deal.

#### TTIP

The Transatlantic Trade and Investment Partnership (TTIP) is a deal to cut tariffs and regulatory barriers to trade between the US and EU countries, making it easier for companies on both sides of the Atlantic to access each other's markets.


Overshadowed in 2015, the trade agreement will come more into focus in 2016 as a deal looms ever closer. Met with increasing opposition, the controversial deal aims to bring closer ties between the two trading blocs.

TTIP talks started in July 2013. A second round of negotiations was held in November and a third round in December 2013. The stakes are huge for both partners, as EU-US trade accounts for up to €2bn per day, making it the biggest trade relationship in the world. Industries it would affect include pharmaceuticals, cars, energy, finance, chemicals, clothing and food and drink.

However, campaigners believe the inclusion of the investor-state dispute settlement (ISDS) clause, designed to protect the overseas assets of investors, could open public services for privatization, lower standards and challenge local government authority. Fears focus on the fact that companies can sue governments using ISDS in non-transparent, private tribunals for perceived devaluing of their assets.

## Crickhowell goes offshore

**Dave Deruytter** looks at the consequences of an entire Welsh town going offshore to avoid tax just like Google and Starbucks



Enough is enough' the small business owners in the Welsh town of Crickhowell must have thought when learning yet again in the press about the near zero percent in taxes that large international groups pay on their revenues.

As a reaction they have decided to apply similar tax avoidance schemes to their own revenue. In doing so the entrepreneurs hope that the authorities will pay due attention to the perceived unfairness of the situation before other towns follow suit and bring the finances of their country into great difficulty.

For years multinationals have been criticized for their practice of international tax optimization. Though legal in most cases, those tax schemes are judged as too aggressive or unethical by the ever better-informed general public. People want their social security, roads, trains and schools to stay affordable. Allowing multinational companies to structure their taxes via a Channel island, Switzerland, The Netherlands, Luxembourg or another tax friendly country depletes the coffers of the tax authorities of the much-needed money to keep on supporting those social benefits and the rest

of the country's infrastructure.

Sometimes this unfair competition has a direct effect. If you are a coffee-shop owner paying your taxes locally, you are not amused by what a multinational company like Starbucks can do on their pricing by lowering their tax bill.

It is all very well that the OECD has presented its recommendations on BEPS (Base Erosion Profit Shifting) practices. First they need to be implemented, then they still need to result in real increases of the amount or percentage of taxes multinational companies actually pay. Many fear that new international loopholes will be found sooner rather than later.

In that respect the revolt of the Welsh town is commendable. Hopefully they succeed in one way or another to get real attention and support. No one wants their social security system to go bankrupt or schools to become so expensive that only the rich can pay for decent education.

At the same time, this action should draw attention to a serious mismatch in the situation of the financial markets today. On the one hand, investors receive near zero interest income on very long term government bonds, and on the other hand investors in the stock markets keep on looking for 10% or more return on equity. If interest rates stay low for the foreseeable future, this is not sustainable. It should lead to yields on equity to also become lower.

The protest of this Welsh town also supports the popular disintermediation drive of the likes of Uber or Airbnb. Although those two do not target large multinational companies, they allow for the general public to earn extra revenues. And the likes of online payment systems, peer to peer lending and crowd funding ventures are targeting the franchise of large multinational banks, whilst the latter still seem to be paying rather high amounts and percentages of taxes on their business.

It may be time for a coffee disintermediation company to step up and create an app that delivers coffee to you from a nearby house at a lower price than the multinational groups do in their shops. It is only a question of time before such a thing will happen. The same could also be done with pizzas or other food. We ain't seen nothing yet on what the digital revolution can bring to this table. Multinational companies be warned.

Finally, isn't all this a strong call for a new rating agency to be created, one that looks at the sustainability of companies including tax?

Today, we essentially have risk rating companies like Moody's and Standard & Poors looking at the creditworthiness of a company. They essentially only judge the Balance sheet and Profit & Loss account of a company and its evolution. On the stock market you have stock ratings by analysts who evaluate the potential of a company as far as its future stock price potential is concerned. Also, there the financials are important, yet the strategy and the potential to innovate and grow are measured too. All these ratings are not enough the public seems say. They are calling for a real sustainability index, and particularly one that includes a measurement of the taxes a company pays, its contribution to society, also locally. It looks pretty clear that if such a rating existed and would be widely used and visible, consumers will reconsider their purchase of goods or services from a poorly-rated company and move to its better-rated competitors.

A widely-used sustainability rating would at the same time give the 'Buy local' initiatives more reasons to be cheerful. Of course, the corporate tax percentage alone is not everything – the CSR initiatives of a company, the number of people it employs, its ecological footprint should all be integrated into the equation.

If the Welsh tax revolt can grow and keep momentum, it might just become the trigger needed for a 'fairer' international tax system for multinational companies. Although some do not find anything 'fair' about taxes, even they like an orderly society with a great social and physical infrastructure. If you would leave all that to capitalism the risk is high that it will not work, at least not for all or for most of us.

"Comedy is my true love," Stone admits. "That will always be my favourite movie genre and nothing can compete with that. But I've also been lucky to have the opportunity to experiment with roles outside of comedies because I want to be able to explore different

kinds of stories that require a different style of acting. I've always been interested in studying the human psyche and acting is an incredible way of trying to understand how we think and behave and why life can be so complicated to figure out."

Her new film, Aloha, written and directed by Cameron Crowe (Almost Famous, Elizabethtown), gives Stone a chance to test her comic mettle once again in the form of Crowe's typically ironic and endearingly humorous look at relationships. Set in Hawaii, Aloha sees Emma play a sprightly U.S. Air Force liaison officer who spends most of the film trying to cheer the spirits of Bradley Cooper's dispirited military contractor fallen on hard times. Co-starring Rachel McAdams (as Cooper's ex), Bill Murray, John Krasinski and Alec Baldwin, Aloha benefits from allowing romantic sparks to fly between

two immensely likeable stars in Stone and Cooper, while Murray provides plenty of deadpan irony.

The 26-year-old Stone is currently basking in the afterglow of her Oscar-nominated performance in *Birdman* and recently marked another milestone in her career when she



made her Broadway debut in the Rob Marshall/Sam Mendes revival of *Cabaret*. Her sensationally exuberant performance in the iconic role of Sally Bowles won her rave reviews from normally tough New York critics. Wrote *N.Y. Times* theatre critic Ben Brantley: "Ms. Stone's version has the avid eyes and angularity of early vintage Joan Crawford and a dance-till-you-drop energy that's all drive and no gears... Stone is scintillating."

With respect to her first Academy Award nomination, Emma was somewhat flabbergasted: "I'm not sure that I will ever know what this means overall. It's a wonderful, very strange feeling. Nothing I can really wrap my head around quite yet. It's just an honour... I got a text from my mom which is how I found out! "It came on the same day as her birthday so it was a double celebration.

boyfriend, Andrew Garfield, with whom she fell in love while working together on *The Amazing Spider Man*.

Together: Emma, in the past year you've played in a Woody Allen movie, worked with Cameron Crowe on Aloha, and now you're making your Broadway debut as Sally Bowles in *Cabaret*. Is this too much success for one girl too handle?

Emma Stone: (Laughs) No, I can handle it! (Laughs) This business has lots of ups and downs and it's just wonderful when things work out and you feel you're flying high and enjoying every minute of what's happening to you. I've been living with this dream for most of my life and it still feels kind of surreal when you find yourself doing exactly what you aspired to. I can still

remember a few years ago when I was crying on my couch by myself when I didn't get some roles I wanted really badly and feeling so upset. That helps make this time in my life that much more meaningful and fulfilling because you know you had to struggle to get here.

It must be an extraordinary feeling to be

It's something I could never even imagine happening. Cabaret was my favourite film when I was 10 years old and I can't even express how it feels to be actually playing Sally Bowles. And working with Woody Allen was another incredible thrill for me. I've grown up watching his films over and over again and then I'm in the south of France sitting at a table with Woody and Colin Firth. Please don't wake me up! (Laughs)

### You're also getting to work with another director, Cameron Crowe, who's also noted for his own particular ironic take on life?

Cameron Crowe is a director I've always adored and I loved the script and the kind of character I get to play. Shooting in Hawaii is also an incredible pleasure, especially after I got to spend a summer shooting *Magic*

in the Moonlight in one of the most beautiful places you can ever want to be. You sometimes feel that you're part of a fairy tale when you get to be part of these projects and that's part of your thinking anyway as an actor. It just enhances the process.

### You've been working a lot lately. Do you like staying busy?

I've been pretty busy, but I'm not a workaholic, really. I enjoy my time away from work and that's where my real identity lies. I make sure that I don't lose sight of my friends and family and the people I love. Sometimes it's hard to go out in public as much as I would like especially when photographers are always hanging outside your home.

I try to live as normally as I can, and even though it's disturbing to see them following you to your favourite café because they know where you live and know where you like to go. I still don't understand why it's so interesting to take photos with a telephoto lens of me drinking coffee because I do that every day! (Laughs) But I'm getting better at just not paying any attention to that. Everything else about my life is great so why let that kind of thing get to you?

### What do you like to do when you're not working?

I'm happiest when I'm hanging out with my friends and getting to read a lot at home. I also love travelling when I have some free time because it's much more interesting to be able to explore a city or places when you're not spending most of your day on the set and then going back to rest at your hotel at night and then getting up at 6 am to start work the next day. I have to be careful sometimes not to spend so much time on the internet because it starts to become a black hole and it's so easy to get sucked in before you realize it! (Laughs)

# In the past you've talking about how you've suffered from anxiety. Has acting over the years been of some therapeutic value to you?

Acting was a way of overcoming my anxiety. I'm much more secure now, but I still deal with anxiety. Acting allows me to make productive



use of my overly sensitive side and channel all that nervous energy which would otherwise be more of an obstacle in life. My work is such an important and wonderful creative outlet for me that I couldn't imagine my life without it.

### You seem to be a rather carefree and engaging woman. Is it hard on occasion to be out in the public constantly?

Sometimes I try to show that I'm a little cooler and more relaxed than I actually am. But I prefer being myself and not trying to hide my nervousness or vulnerable sides rather than trying to put on a facade or hide behind any contrived public persona. I think the public also appreciates it when you are able to be natural and just relate to people as honestly as possible.

### You live in New York as opposed to L.A. Do you prefer the lifestyle here?

I love New York because there are so many different things going on and people are involved in many different kinds of work which is different from L.A. where life revolves around the film business and it's hard to spend one day without meeting or being with people who are in some way connected to your industry.

New York gives me a chance to feel that I can get away from thinking about the business and

also be in a place where people don't really care that much if you're an actor. I feel I can be more anonymous here because the city has a life of its own and people respect your privacy.


### Your parents and particularly your mother have been an inspiration to you. How they have influenced your life?



#### What are your goals for the future?



ost cities have a defining landmark in their skyline. New York has the Empire State Building, Paris has the Eiffel tower and the London skyline features the Houses of Parliament. Singapore recently ioined Dubai in the small club of cities that have a hotel as their defining landmark. The Marina Bay Sands Hotel, completed in 2010, is an impressive architectural achievement but it is first and foremost testament to the never-ending push for modernity of this city state. Singapore is both admired and ridiculed. This 'nanny state' of 5 million is impeccably clean, bordering on sterile, and organized to a level that would even please North Korean choreographers.

Yet, the progress it has made since independence is mind-boggling. It is now a regional economic powerhouse. A business friendly government, low taxes and the rule of law (down to imposing hefty fines for a failure to flush public toilets) has attracted business from across the globe and fostered a vibrant local business scene. And it shows. Its litter-free streets are packed with Italian super cars and high-end SUVs.

#### Holiday destination?

But should you go there on holiday? The answer really depends on who you ask. Those looking to soak up history, cute cobble stone streets or nature will be very disappointed. Yet Singapore is still an interesting place to visit, albeit for a short trip.

#### A confluence of cultures

Since the British established a trading post in Singapore in the early 19th Century this quiet settlement has developed into a metropolis that is home to many cultures. Malay, Chinese, Indian and a range of smaller communities make up the melting pot that is Singapore. This mix of cultures, religions and cuisines makes the city vibrant and colourful. You can stroll through the narrow lanes of China Town, visit temples in Little India and enjoy a G&T at Long Bar of Raffles, all within a few city blocks.

#### Duck lovers' paradise

Melting pots generally lead to tasty cooking pots. Singapore is no exception. Restaurants are good and there are some true hidden gems. Khansama Tandoori, New Ubin Seafood or the more trendy and upmarket White Rabbit

will not disappoint. However, nothing beats the duck in one of the many eateries in Chinatown.

#### Will I get bored?

Don't stay for two weeks: unless you are a shopaholic, you will get bored. Singapore is perfect for a three-day stopover on an Asian tour. It is hassle-free and a nice change after spending time in some of the more intense Asian cities. You can spend a day discovering the different neighbourhoods, a day Museum hopping, a morning shopping for electronic on the cheap and an afternoon buying gifts in Haji lane. Unless one likes rollercoasters, haunted houses and feels an urge to spend the day at Universal Studios (the Transformers ride actually makes it a worthwhile visit), three days is about as much time as one needs in Singapore. So, not quite Hong Kong, New York or Barcelona, but a pleasant three days. Just don't jaywalk, it will cost you a thousand dollars.

#### **Asia Light**

I have heard Singapore referred to as 'Asia Light', and that sums up the place in two words. It has the energy of a large Asian city without any of the chaos. This makes it an ideal starting point for an Asia trip; a nice place to relax and get into the Asian groove without being overwhelmed. Singapore is the place to get over your jet lag. It is easy to fly to with direct flights to most European hubs, and Singapore Airlines offers a Business Class experience that is second to none.


#### When to go

You can visit all year around. The only thing to watch out for is 'the haze', this annual event drowns the city in thick smog caused by forest fires in Indonesia and brings the city to a standstill.

**Dave Deruytter** heads far West to a part of Canada with a flavour of the Fast



Vancouver sailed to the west coast of Canada in the latter half of the 19th century he must have had a very different sight of the coastline than the one tourists have today. Then western Canada consisted of rough land and mountains with brown bears and salmon aplenty. There were towering Douglas firs as far as the eye could see and only a few thousand Indians inhabiting the place.

Today, Vancouver is a bustling city with many high-rise buildings, nice beaches, lots of greenery and a population of more than 2.5 million in the agglomeration. Of the current inhabitants more than 25% are of Asian origin. There is more than salmon, fish and chips and

hamburgers on the menu in the restaurants. This should come as no surprise since Tokyo is closer to Vancouver than Brussels is.

A great feature of Vancouver city is that it is close to many places worth visiting: the mighty Fraser river rapids, the ski resort of Whistler, the Sunshine Coast and of course Vancouver Island with all its attractions, including Victoria, the capital of the province of British Columbia, in the south.

You should definitely go for a biking daytrip. Start in the centre of Vancouver or near Canada Place by the ocean then cycle around Stanley Park all the way to English Beach. From there you take the well-kept and pleasant biking lane all around False Creek. On the way you have

great views of the coastal buildings of Vancouver with the hills and mountains in the background and superb pleasure marinas on the front, I recommend you continue biking a bit further to Kitslano Beach for another moment of relaxation. On a rainy day the Museum of Anthropology should be high on your wish list with its magnificent collection of Indian totems in a great architectural setting.

To catch the atmosphere of the early days of Vancouver a stroll and a meal in Gastown is a must. Look out for the steam clock and a statue of Gassy, one of the early pioneers of the city

who gave his name to this neighbourhood full of great souvenir shops, including some fine local woodcraft. Just make sure vour purchase fits into your luggage. There is no room on the average airplane for a full size Indian totem or a lifesize wooden arizzly bear!

For foodies and shoppers there also is the superb Granville Island, Small boats take vou back and forth. and it's not really far away from the

Vancouver city centre if you like to walk.

In summer there is always something going on at the many beaches of Vancouver, the coastal walkway and in the city centre. And from Vancouver city you can make daytrips to the surrounding towns, even take a boat trip for some whale spotting.

To fully discover the greater Vancouver area, including Vancouver Island, it may be more convenient to rent a car for ten days and leave Vancouver city behind you. That way you have more time to enjoy the Fraser River and the Hells Gate rapids whilst staying at Harisson Hotsprings for a day or two. The ski town of

Whistler has great accommodation and things to do in summer such the Peak to Peak gondola and a hike on the Black Comb Mountain. A ferry will take you to the Sunshine Coast where there are many options of boating, hiking and picnicking.

Another ferry or two and you are on Vancouver Island, a kind of a mini Canada, Surface wise it's a bit larger than Belgium. The island is best known for the Pacific Rim National Park, with its pristine rain forest, the great natural beaches and the towns of Ucluelet and Tofino. Whale watching, bear watching, island hopping, hiking

and biking, surfing and sunbathing. There is


surely something to do there for everyone and the restaurants of Tofino succeed in excelling, providing great salmon and other seafood. I ate the best burger ever there because it had salmon as its main ingredient and other seafood for the rest.

When you cross Vancouver Island from coast to coast, from Parksville to Tofino, you pass through and over an important mountain

ridge with snowy peaks and you drive through Cathedral Grove with Douglas firs that are centuries old.

It will be difficult to get enough of this island, but when the time has come to go back home, please remember that you can also fly home from Victoria International airport at the southern tip of the island. That way you can enjoy its great old harbour, the Empress hotel, the fine wining and dining, whaling and hiking or biking. Alternatively you ferry back to Vancouver to fly back home from there.

Whatever your choice, one thing is for sure: you will be back. I certainly will.

La Ferme de Lormay is a small gastronomic venue but big on taste. Off the beaten track, beneath the stars, sits a former cottage. With just a few tables, a wood fire, you discover Albert Lormay's amazing and exquisite cuisine. It is one of

those places one is hesitant to share because the world and his uncle would want to eat there. Book in advance. www.lafermedelormay.com

Manigod is entirely complementary to the other Aravis resorts, a natural destination, protected and preserved, offering a breath of fresh air to those lucky enough to discover it. A family ski area, located at 1,500 metres above sea level, Manigod boasts an open

environment where alpine skiing, cross country skiing, snowshoeing and tobogganing will delight the whole family. The areas of La Croix Fry and Merdassier are the sunniest. And for those not keen to strap on the skis you can opt for snowshoeing under a starry sky with a glass of wine and some Reblochon de Savoie beneath the branches of a splendid spruce tree – a unique experience.

Connected to Manigod, La Clusaz is one of the most sought after resorts in the French Alps and is part of the closed circle of resorts with the longest tracks: the top of the village Balme has a ski drop of 1,500m ski. And for a well-deserved break, stop at Les Fermiers where

you can enjoy 'The Brasérade' and 'Reblochonade' which make it an absolute must. www. lesfermiers.com. Here, too, activities other than skiing abound: Skiing Joering (ski pulled by a horse: a good level of skiing recommended), Snowpark, huskies...

It is also worth highlighting the

excellent commune of La Clusaz with its 5-star Au Cœur du Village, which opened its doors in 2010. The hotel is at the foot of the slopes and ski lifts, a luxurious and refined retreat combining wonderful accommodation with

exceptional service. Discover the CINQ restaurant where you will discover chef Thomas Eudier's refined cuisine where revisited traditional and local food mingle. The Spa at the hotel is also well worth a visit: The Crystal Spa is an ode to wellbeing, with its swimming pool, a

# So many rivers to float

Intrepid traveller **Lesley Williamson** cruises the rivers of the South of France on an inflatable raft





s barges were the easiest way to transport heavy wine casks around Europe for centuries, it is no coincidence that France's network of ancient trade routes is accessible today by sea, canal or river. In an attempt to combine 'slow' travel to connect with the gentle flow of nature and explore a land fashioned by the history of its waterways, I travelled with an inflatable raft to sip, sample and float my way through France's epicurean rivers.

My summer 2015 love-affair was introduced to me in Canada – it's a Vancouver Island traditional leisure indulgence, weekend hobby or aquatic social gathering commonly known as 'river tubing' on inflatable rafts. Due to my natural obsession for everything nautical, I joined in (with my newly-purchased Canadian inflatable SeaHawk) to cruise down Stamp River Falls in Port Alberni and the Cowishan river. The Cowichan Valley, 'land warmed by the sun' in Coast Salish, enjoys some of the warmest temperatures in Canada and certainly some mind-blowing views of the majestic conifer forest and mountain peaks – you have to see it to believe it.

My journey started in the morning when the river is stirring into life, when frogs are croaking and songbirds trill along the banks. Distinctive bald eagles, the world's largest birds of prey, are looping high in the sky. Floating down the gentle current, admiring the surrounding drooping oaks and weeping willows, marveling at the scenery, I embraced the perspective of a new way of life... or perhaps just a sensational summer of travelling back in Europe.

August in Belgium, with summertime in full swing, I conducted a successful test of



Seahawk on an 'urban river safari' through Ghent to get the best up-close views of the city's stunning architecture. Friends I managed to embark with me were suspiciously yet genuinely intrigued by the concept, and later on surprisingly enchanted by their experience – perhaps seduced by onboard hospitality facilities. I was itching to expand my horizons and somehow convinced my best friend to volunteer as a crew member to explore France's rivers. Research began, and so did my belief and confidence in self-taught navigational skills on an inflatable boat.

The Vezère and the Dordogne rivers wind gracefully through some of France's most picturesque landscapes, embellished with fine medieval castles built during the early Middle Ages by barons seeking to consolidate their power or protect their wealth. This land has invited exploration and settlement for centuries on the traditional mode of river transport, the gabarre, a wide, flat-bottomed barge known for its stability. At the confluence of the Dordogne, the southern part of the Vezère drifts down a steady, lazy current cupped in a tree-lined valley, providing an ideal waterway for novice and experienced 'floaters' alike. The joys of relaxing on this gently winding river from Montignac to St Léon-sur-Vezère lasted about six hours for a 10 km long journey. Architectural highlights include the fairytale 15th-century Château de Belcavre hanging over the river and the medieval fortress of Chateau de Losse.

Still on time for aperitif, we deflated in the meander of the river, in St Léon-sur-Vezère. Ranked among France's most beautiful villages, St Léon was awarded with the tourism label of Les Plus Beaux Villages de France which gathers 155 referenced authentically preserved

villages throughout France.

#### Fairytale castles and foie gras

Tackling the Dordogne River the next day was approached with a certain upgrade of facilities - a cooling section for drinkables and a provision of culinary delights on board. Dordogne is fiercely proud of its food heritage and exciting your taste buds is simply a way of life here. We picked up a fresh baquette from the local boulangerie and in a tenacious respect for local gastronomic traditions grabbed a small pot of foie gras du Périgord, figs, walnut jam, knobbly yellow guinces and Cabécou goat cheese from a town market. We were spoilt for choice of a good bottle of wine to wash down all these delicacies with the local vineyards of Bergerac, Duras, Marmande or close by Monbazillac or Saussignac. Alternatively the sweet dark walnut wine is a local aperitif of excellence here.

Passing by one inspiring chateau after another, the water leads us to the exquisite riverside village of la Roque-Gageac. Wedged between towering cliffs and the Dordogne River, it is known for its subtropical microclimate due to its unique setting. The view from the river is breathtaking, with troglodytic cave dwellings nestled in the rising cliffs.

The undulating river banks are lively, populated by kayakers on a well-deserved picnic break. The flow of the crystal-clear waters has created riffles, pools and idyllic white sandy beaches and lagoons. Downstream, we passed under a couple of old stone bridges waving to enthusiastic kids, enjoying picturesque scenes of fly-fishing, family barbecues and a festive riverside atmosphere of quintessential France.

The day was drawing to its end after an ambitious 17 km journey down the Dordogne, and as we approached disembarkation shores in silence and serenity, the splendid shadow of the medieval fortified chateau of Castelnaud rose from the mist of the river in a surreal sunset at the meeting points of the Dordogne and Ceou Rivers.

#### The legendary Gorges du Tarn

Heading south for more water adventures, mountain scenery and abundant wildlife, the Millau viaduct is the gateway to reach the high limestone plateaux of the spectacular Gorges du Tarn, known as Les Causses and classed as a UNESCO world heritage site. We ventured to the most exciting and attractive section of the Tarn River which runs north of the pretty little village of Rozier, 21 km northeast of Millau along a twisting road at the foot of one of the longest and deepest gorges in Europe. The narrow scenic road follows the left bank of the river up to Les Vignes, a tiny perched village over an ideal departure point on the river, equipped with an inviting water toboggan.

Both sides of the river are spiked with pinnacles of sheer eroded rocks and cloaked with woods of feathery pine. The steep environment sets scales into perspective – from my cosy embarkation the grandeur of the precipitous trench is impossible to capture on camera, the majestic landscapes are too difficult to fit in a lens. About a kilometre downstream, rapids start splashing. Nothing too impressive for

Seahawk, riding rapids on an inflatable is fun, safe and bouncy. Oh, and big adrenalin kicks.

Paddling an inflatable is nothing like paddling a kayak. It is smooth, gentle and reactive mainly. Your faith lies more in the drifting current than in your paddling skills and allows focusing on onboard entertainment and conviviality. A distinct 'non-sporty' rafting experience you can quickly get addicted to, for a perfect escape on a hot summer day. Floating brings your awareness into the present moment and awakens the senses. I ife slows down.

Everyone has a personal preference when it comes to crew navigation techniques on the river. I'm a big fan of rowing in turns. Team collaboration somehow reaches its limits and sharing the task with one paddle each is bound to stimulate divergences in rhythm and strategy, to create tensions and could easily ruin a relationship, occasionally cause murder on board. My tip is to leave your part-time co-sailor paddle as you offer to spread the local tapenade or foie-gras on a piece of crispy baguette and quench our thirst with a fruity rosé.... Team work it is in the end!

an't get more central in Amsterdam than the Dam, which acts as a dam for the River Amstel, Amsterdam has come a long way since its origins as a small fishing village in the late 12th century. ## Cuisine à la Corse

Corsica is blessed with many options when it comes to preparing its gastronomy



orsican cuisine has many connections to Italian gastronomy but if there is one ingredient that stands out on I'Île de Beauté it's the humble chestnut. And the use of chestnuts goes way back in the island's history. For many years it has played a significant role in Corsican life, as witnessed by a traditional wedding lunch in 19th century Castagniccia which boasted twenty-two different courses prepared using chestnuts as the main ingredient. The pork they ate surely tasted of it too since the pigs were left to eat chestnuts on the forest floor and were also fed on chestnut flour.

Rich in calories, this flour is used to prepare polenta and cakes. Popular dishes include *Fritelli castagnini* (chestnut flour fritters) and *nicciu* (chestnut flour, cooked between two iron plates).

Meat and game are also abundant. Stews are very popular, such as *Stufatu* made with beef meat, ham, garlic, onion, clove and herbs, as is *Sanghi di maiale incu l'uva secca*, a blood sausage with raisin, similar to the French boudin, and popular wild game includes wild boar (*singhjari*), thrush (*tordulu*) and hare (*levru*).

Surrounded by water Corsica is inevitably a paradise for fish lovers, with forty different species to choose from. Fish soup (azziminu) is



made with both sea fish and river fish. The national cheese, brocciu, is used also with fish, such as sardines stuffed with brocciu (sardine piene incu u brocciu), and Corsicans are also partial to roasted eel (anguilla arustita).

For those with a sweet tooth we return to the chestnut once more, since its flour is the base for many of the island's delicious cakes, such as *Falculelle* from Corte made with *brocciu*, sugar, flour and egg yolk, and cooked in the oven over a chestnut leaf.

Many special cakes are baked to fit feast days. Strenna (a pie made with flour and sdruttu dough and a brocciu filling) is prepared in Vico for New Year's Day, panzarotti (beignets made with flour, rice and yeast) are prepared in Bastia for St. Joseph's day and the dramatically titled pan di i morti for All Souls' Day in Bonifacio.

Wash it all down with a glass of wine from, among other regions, Cap Corse, Sartène or Ajaccio. If ale is more your thing, try *biera accumudata cu a castagna* – that's right, chestnut beer brewed by the Pietra Brewery. Bon appetitu!

# Champagne galore



hampagne? Which would you choose for the festive season? Do you prefer a 'sec'? A Blanc de Noirs? A Millésimé? Do you prefer it to come from the Marne Valley? We take you into the magical world of champagne to help you make the best choice!

The traditional champagne we drink is the champagne called 'brut'. It is a blend of years and of grape varieties and has 'brut 'sugar content. Let's see how we arrived at this conclusion and what it means.

How to differentiate the different types of champagne? By their sugar content, their sub-region, the grapes used and their category.

#### The sugar content

In Champagne, eight categories have been established (in decreasing order): Doux, Medium dry, Dry, Extra Dry, Brut, Brut Nature, Extra brut and Non dosé.

The theory is quite simple: the less sugar in it the closer you stay to the basic taste of wine and thus its authenticity and its soil. The classic is Brut champagne. Doux, semi-dry or dry are quite marginal.

#### The grapes used

Three grapes are recognized in the Champagne 'appellation': Pinot noir, Pinot Meunier and Chardonnay. So we distinguish the blended champagnes, where three grapes are used from the Blanc de Blancs (100% Chardonnay) and Blanc de Noirs (100% Pinot).

- The Pinot Noir is characterized by its powerful red fruity aromas.
- Pinot Meunier is characterized by its flexibility

**Geoffroy van Lede** of le-vin-dumois.be takes a look at the various types of bubbly

and fruitiness.

- Chardonnay is characterized by its finesse and floral notes.

#### The subregions.

As in any vineyard, the wines are predominantly influenced by local typicalities of the soil and their grape variety. The Champagne region is divided into four subregions: Mountain and Val de Reims (two Pinots), the Valley of the Marne (Pinot Meunier), Côte des Blancs and Sézannais (Chardonnay) and the Côte des Bar (Pinot Noir).

### The categories: Millésimé, Blanc de Blancs, Blanc de Noirs, Rosé

A champagne Millésimé is a champagne vinified with the juice of a single year. A Blanc de Blancs is champagne made from white grapes (to differentiate it from blended champagnes). A black white champagne is a white champagne made from black grapes (the grape juice is always white). A Rosé champagne refers to its color.

Now that you know a bit more about champagne, try different ones to find your own taste. And never forget: each wine or champagne is always produced by a winemaker, and he is the most important element in determining the quality and authenticity of your drink. For classic champagnes trust the brands that blend the best grape varieties and vintage to offer a constant taste throughout the vintages. For authenticity and personality, head to independent winemakers who dedicate themselves entirely to viticulture and winemaking.





#### Cowboys

One of the real surprises of this year's Cannes film festival – *Cowboys* (*Les Cowboys*) is a 2015 French drama film directed by Thomas Bidegain. It was screened in the Directors' Fortnight section of the festival – it begins at a country western rally somewhere in eastern France. Alain (François Damiens) is a pillar of the community, whose daughter disappears, turning his life upside down. *114 mins*.

#### **Bridge of Spies**

And just about the world's favourite director Steven Spielberg returns for a Christmas release based on apparently genuine historical espionage - in 1957 Brooklyn, New York, Rudolf Abel (Mark Rylance) finds a secret message on a park bench and manages to reads it just before FBI agents burst into his rented room. He manages to keep the message to himself, but other evidence in the room leads to his arrest and prosecution as a Soviet spy. James B. Donovan (Tom Hanks), a lawyer who specializes in insurance settlements, is asked by his partners to take on Abel's defence against the United States' charge of him being a KGB spy. A 'fair' trial, to reduce the Soviet Union's chances of using the situation for propaganda, but what are the chances of that, with Abel refusing to cooperate with the US government on any intelligence revelations? The plot thickens... 141 mins.

#### Star Wars: Episode VII – The Force Awakens

Well, here it is – after new Bond *Spectre* (2015) (which Picturenose did not rate one little bit), Star Wars returns to our screens, doubtless to the delight of billions. Understandably, plot details are somewhat scarce, save that it is set approximately 30 years after the events of *Return of the Jedi* (1986), and features the return of Luke, Leia, Hans, Chewbacca, C-3PO, R2-D2 as well as some new leads. So, will it be any good? Well, your guess is as good as mine, but I will be up for it, naturellement. *135 mins*.

#### In the Heart of the Sea

And Ron Howard returns with what looks to be a stirring historical adventure thriller. In 1820, the whaling ship Essex is crewed by Captain George Pollard, Jr. (Benjamin Walker), first officer Owen Chase (Chris Hemsworth), second officer Matthew Joy (Cillian Murphy) and cabin boy Thomas Nickerson (Tom Holland). During their voyage, the ship is sunk when it is rammed and split in half by a very large and enraged bull sperm whale, ultimately leaving its crew shipwrecked at sea for 90 days and more than a thousand miles from land. After the attack, the crew sails for South America and is forced to resort to cannibalism. Gulp, and ulp! 122 mins. •
