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

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
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

# Charity begins at home

We look at just two of the many local charities who reach out to those in need – especially at this time of year

he Samaritans is a non-profit organization under Belgian law. The Samaritans asbl was created in 1994 by the late Claude Vander Elst. The main purpose of the organization is to provide assistance to the homeless and other needy people in Brussels through a weekly distribution of soup and sandwiches in the centre of town. They are one of the few organizations that provides food throughout the



At the same time, they try to provide blankets and sleeping bags, especially to those sleeping on the streets. All of this is dependent on the donations that they receive. From May to October, they give soup, sandwiches, coffee and cakes and yoghurt when they receive them.

From November to April, the Samaritans are to be found in the corridor of the Botanique subway, under the direction of Operation Thermos (www.operationthermos.be), giving out soup, hot meals, water, coffee, plus cakes and yoghurts. Apart from this main activity, they organize every year, on the evening of 31 December, a festive New Year's Eve dinner, including a starter, a main dish and a dessert. The meal is accompanied by soft drinks. Finally, the event is concluded with a present

for every participant. Every year, more than 350 people take part in this event, including many children. www.the-samaritans.org

The ASBL Les Petits Riens (Small Nothings) is a social enterprise whose mission is to support people in difficulty so that they gain autonomy in a sustainable manner. After more than 75 years of change and modernization, the association remains faithful to founder Father Froidure's idea. He was one of the spearheads of the

'social economy', and this was long before we had a name for the concept.

Their second-hand shops are present throughout the country and are open to all. Some stores specialize in clothes that combine style and a low price. In addition to their clothes, some stores offer all kinds of household items. They are an Ali Baba's cave, where you can hunt around to find the living room, toaster, bicycle or teaspoon of your dreams – many people go there for the sheer pleasure of bargain-hunting. By buying, you support the ASBL's social projects, and your purchase is also environmentally friendly: by giving a second life to an object, you put a brake on waste and overproduction. www.petitsriens.be



## Giraffe Project

ounded in 2005 by Richard and Denise Baines, teachers in International schools and colleges in Belgium, the Giraffe Project is a UK registered charity providing educational opportunities for children and young people from extremely deprived areas of Nairobi. It works closely with three schools in and around the slums, and also provides support for teenagers to finish their studies in boarding

schools outside. Graduates from secondary schools are sometimes offered places in vocational training colleges. All the schools are managed and run by local people.

The charity has grown steadily since its inception in 2005. The Trustees are committed to grow the charity in keeping with its stated objects, with the help of a staff of expert volunteers, and to ensure that at least 95% of all funds raised reach the projects in Kenya. In the case of sponsorships, 100% is committed to the schooling and wellbeing of each individual students sponsored.

The children we serve are exceptionally poor. Their homes of mud, rough timber and corrugated iron sheeting are usually without electricity, running water or sanitation. Rubbish piles up in the streets and sewage runs down alleyways. Disease spreads easily in the vastly overcrowded neighbourhoods. Parents desperate to give their children a future look for schooling, but government places are inadequate and school fees out of reach for families who sometimes can't afford to eat.

The heart of the charity is the programme of individual sponsorship, and currently over 400 children benefit from this scheme. Sponsors pay school fees, which include meals and supplies. They can write to the children they sponsor and send small gifts. They receive regular letters, reports and photographs. Some sponsors develop a strong bond with the child




they sponsor.

Development work is undertaken in partnership with the three schools in the slums. Green Pastures Primary School has benefitted from an additional building, secure walls, water storage tanks, a library and computer lab. At Tumaini Primary School the charity has provided computers, books and improved structures, and a purpose-built school for 400 children is currently under construction.

Four years of secondary school follow eight years of primary, but only for the lucky minority of Kenyans. We aim to give all our students this chance, and about 100 teenagers are currently supported in the boarding schools. The charity is also working with the local team to establish a secondary school with a difference. It already offers traditional schooling, but we are also planning vocational programmes for the less academic students. Current enrolment is 150, with the first students taking their national leaving exams in November 2010.

In an effort to build bridges and raise awareness we encourage school groups to form partnerships with the schools in Kenya, and so far, three schools in the UK and Belgium participate in the scheme. Each year in July we take teams to work in the schools in Kenya: students aged 16 or over can apply to join a team.

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# Are you fit (enough) for your age?

Matthew Lunn, group wellbeing manager for Aspria, looks at how we should perform through the decades




ow does your fitness rank against that of others your age – and are you doing enough exercise to boost your odds of living a long and healthy life?

Could an extremely fit 60-year-old outperform a less conditioned 30-year-old in a sporting challenge? The answer: conceivably yes. There will always be exceptions to break any rule.

However, in general we accept that what we can expect of our bodies will naturally decline

as we age. This is in part down to genetics, in part down to environmental factors, and in part down to how well we've looked after ourselves up to that point – our exercise habits, eating habits, alcohol consumption, stress levels, amount of sleep and so on.

All that said, given the huge impact physical activity has on our long-term mental and physical health, it's important that we don't simply shrug our shoulders and resign ourselves to a dramatic decline in our fitness levels as soon as we pass a certain age.

Indeed, whether you're 20 or 70 years old, the recommendation remains that you should aim to be active every day.

But just how fit should we be at any given age if we want to maximize our chances of good health – and how do we measure this?

#### Measuring your own fitness levels

Most of us will have some idea of how fit we are. But knowing the specifics can help us set realistic fitness goals, monitor our progress and maintain our motivation. Once we know our starting point, we can plan where we want to go. Below are some simple assessments we can all do.

**Aerobic fitness** can be tested during/after activity or at rest.

At rest, you simply check your pulse either on outlines the *minima* your wrist or neck: for most adults, a healthy "IT'S IMPORTANT

most adults, a healthy resting heart rate is 60 to 100 beats per minute (BPM).

There are several options for assessing your fitness while active. For example, you can stop to check

your heart rate (pulse) periodically during an aerobic workout, or just after a brisk walk if you don't exercise regularly. You should be aiming for 50–75% of the maximum heart rate for your age, which translates to 93–138 BPM for those aged 35+, 88-131 BPM aged 45+, 83–123 BPM aged 55+ and 78–116 aged 65+. If you're falling short of this, you need to gradually increase the intensity of your exercise.

Alternatively, go on a 1.5-mile run and see how long it takes you. As an example, a woman aged 45–54 should be aiming for 14 minutes and a man of the same age 12 minutes – these results would denote good levels of fitness.

**Strength and flexibility** are also key measures, and there are a number of tests to

assess these. Strength can be measured using sit-up and press-up tests, for example, while the 'sit and reach' test measures the flexibility of the back of your legs, hips and lower back.

Your Aspria team can advise you on all of these tests, helping you understand your current fitness levels and identify where you could make improvements – but as an example, if you're a woman aged 45-54 and can do 14 press-ups without stopping for a rest, or 25 sit-ups, this would be a good result. Men of the same age should be aiming for 16 press-ups or 35 sit-ups.

#### Can you do these exercises?

If the above sounds beyond you at the moment – as we say, these results would denote good fitness levels – then the list below outlines the *minimum* you should be able to

- Run 5km in 30 minutes
- Perform 20 burpees in a row
- Hold a full plank for one minute each side

- Run a mile in less than 9 minutes
- Hold a plank for 45 seconds



# Mike & Becky: Real, honest chocolate

**Gemma Rose** meets chocolate makers with a difference, making a difference

efore I eat a piece of Mike & Becky's chocolate, they instruct me on how best to do so: "Find a calm moment.

Relax. Our chocolate should not be consumed in a rush." Whilst I'm carefully chewing, they advise me to close my eyes and "enjoy the full flavour experience". The chocolate is 50% dark milk, 100% organic, and made from cacao beans grown in the Virunga National Park in the Democratic Republic of Congo. I note the strong aftertaste. That's good, assures Mike & Becky's instructions, written on eco-print packaging; it means that it's real, honest chocolate.

The chocolate tastes, well, different. Having munched on Cadbury's chocolate and Côte d'Or for most of my life, it takes a while to reorient my taste buds and fully savour Mike & Becky's. The quality is evident: it's smooth, light and there are no greasy traces. I lay the blame of my ungrateful taste buds at the door of the mass chocolate producers: I am so used to sugary chocolate that I am slow to appreciate the real stuff.

"There used to be hundreds of artisan chocolate makers, but today there are very few, due to the industrialization of chocolate production," says Björn Becker, a.k.a. Becky, noting that many of the most popular chocolatiers buy their chocolate from multinationals such as the Barry Callebaut Group. Barry Callebaut is considered one of the largest suppliers of chocolate in the world. In Belgium, it sells chocolate to Guylian, Leonidas and Neuhaus, who then mould the chocolate into their signature designs.

The tide, however, is slowly turning away from





such industrial-scale production, likely due to the levels of sugar and oil content. In the United States, Frederic Loraschi, French pastry chef and former instructor at Barry Callebaut's chocolate academy, notes on Confectionerynews.com that consumers are getting tired of mass production and are more susceptible to smaller businesses. These businesses are not only more local, they also tend to be more environmentally friendly and socially conscious. What seems to best describe the ethos of artisanal chocolate makers is the 'bean-to-bar' movement, which Mike & Becky are a part of.

The bean-to-bar movement started at the turn of the century in the US and it has finally reached Belgium. At the movement's most ideal state, chocolate makers do everything themselves: from visiting the plantations, shipping the beans over and roasting and processing the chocolate. Mike & Becky buy their cocoa beans from single plantations in Belize, the Congo, the Dominican Republic, India and Peru. They trade mostly directly with the plantation, meaning that they buy straight from the plantation or cooperative; they pay above market value for the beans; and they do not work with plantations that employ children.

Whenever possible, Mike & Becky use organic cacao beans, sugar, cacao butter and milk powder to make their chocolate. Their chocolate does not contain vanilla, palm oil or soy lecithin, ingredients that they describe on their website as "nonsense", used by big companies to "mask bad beans, cut costs or speed up the process".

The bean-to-bar movement also consists of a supportive community of like-minded chocolate makers. The community helped Mike & Becky get on their feet: recommending good plantations to trade with and giving advice and encouragement when the going got tough. It was surprising to hear of such an open community, considering that they are all competitors. Not necessarily so, says Julia Mikerova, a.k.a. Mike: "There are infinite ways to work with cacao and the end result can be so different. Chocolate making is as much a science as it is an art, so there's no point in

being secretive about it."

Julia and Björn are just as open, sharing their philosophy with customers and inviting them to see how their chocolate is made. They also sell other bean-to-bar chocolate. The 'Saltylicious' bars from the Grenada Chocolate Company particularly catch my eye, encased in orange packaging and a hand-painted seaview on its cover. I am intrigued that an exotic island is producing its own chocolate. "This company ships its chocolate by sailboat to Amsterdam, and then it makes its way here by bike." beams Biörn in awe. "Every chocolate maker has its own story," adds Julia, "we understand their stories, and the effort and the appreciation they put into it. We want to share this with our customers."

The name 'Mike & Becky' is a clever play on the surnames of Julia and Björn, who are also wife and husband. As well as making chocolate, Mike & Becky serve hot chocolate and cakes. Their café-cum-chocolate factory is

on Avenue Brugmann in Uccle, conveniently situated at the crossroads of tram and bus routes. Their hot chocolate is warm and soothing, not too sweet or milky, and the chocolate leaves its signature aftertaste.

Hot chocolate is what triggered the idea behind Mike & Becky. Whilst visiting Prague in March 2015, the couple stumbled upon Chococafe, a hot chocolate café. There were lots of variety of hot chocolate to choose from and the quality just blew them away. The couple had no chocolate-making background but they fell in love with the idea of making hot chocolate almost instantly, and thought they could do something similar in Brussels, especially as a good hot chocolate is a surprising rarity.

Even though the chocolate idea was relatively unfamiliar, the couple had been thinking about their future for a couple of years beforehand. They were both in office jobs (Julia still has hers) and they seriously considered whether they wanted to keep the status quo until retirement. Thus began the inquiry into other options: "It was a process, not a 'eureka!' moment," remarks Julia. Although on the face of it, it may seem that their leap from the office to chocolate workspace is large, their backgrounds tell a different story. Julia is an artist, she trained as a ballerina in Moscow: Biorn studied fair trade and development policy. Creativity and ethics, born out of their backgrounds, are the core elements of their

business.

The couple agree that being partners has made running a business much easier, since they are able to confide in one another and sound off ideas. There were doubts along the way, whether they come from the couple themselves or their peers. Even so, the most important thing is to keep it together, recommends Julia: "You need to have your own inner centre to fall back on. You need to believe in yourself."

I have been diligently savouring Mike & Becky's chocolate throughout this writing process. Perhaps it's my taste buds that have finally re-oriented, or perhaps after inhaling Mike & Becky's passion and dedication, I fully appreciate their hard work and principles. Whatever it is, this chocolate is delicious. Mike & Becky are true to their word: it tastes real, it tastes honest. mikeandbecky.be

pharmaceutical companies have renewed their strategies in favour of natural product drug development and discovery. Let us go through the basic principles of the main schools available in Belgium today.


#### Ayurveda

It is an overreaction to unscientific medicine and pseudo-spirituality. As such, the Western approach is based upon three steps: hypothesis, experimentation and observation, and theory or conclusion. Although other forms of medicine have curative properties, in an emergency, allopathy has quicker effects on the system.

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affect the mind. When you inhale a scent, that aroma travels directly to the hypothalamus, which is an organ in the brain responsible for regulating a variety of bodily functions such as growth, sleep, emotional responses, and more. This message flows through the body's limbic system and into an area of the hippocampus, which is the part of the brain that's responsible for memory. This process is called neuro-associative conditioning, which is your body's ability to link a healing response to smells. It also explains why smells often have the power to "WE ARE trigger a specific memory.

#### Holistic medicine

Holistic medicine is a form of healing that considers the whole person - body, mind, spirit and emotions - in the quest for optimal health and wellness. According to the holistic medicine philosophy, one can achieve optimal health by gaining proper balance in life. The belief is that the whole person is made

up of interdependent parts and if one part is not working properly, all the other parts will be affected.

A holistic doctor may use all forms of health care, from conventional medication to alternative therapies, to treat a patient. For example, when a person suffering from migraine headaches pays a visit to a holistic doctor, instead of walking out solely with medications, the doctor will look at all the potential factors that may be causing the

person's headaches, such as other health problems, diet and sleep habits, stress and personal problems, and preferred spiritual practices. Holistic medicine is also based on the belief that unconditional love and support is the most powerful healer and we are ultimately responsible for our own health and wellbeing, that all people have innate healing powers, that the patient is a person, not a disease, that treatment involves fixing the cause of the condition, not just alleviating the symptoms.

So, in the light of what we've learned today, when facing a disease, maybe we can look at different ways of treating it RESPONSIBLE instead of jumping in our car to buy a miracle remedy to stop the symptoms, probably FOR OUR OWN promoted by the pharmacists (usually just another business person). Instead let's ask ourselves a few questions before: what happened in my life recently? Any shock, any

> bad news, any overwhelming emotional reaction? What did I change in my routine recently? What is my body trying to tell me? What shall I change or not eat or do that would bring more ease to my body? Let's consider our bodies like proper 'beings' that have their own way of communicating, and let's enter that space of communion to better listen to their needs.

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



As the fate of the gorillas now depends more on humans than on the species itself. so would the fate of humankind depend on the actions of the machine superintelligence.

But we have one advantage: we get to make the first move. Will it be possible to construct a seed Artificial Intelligence, to engineer initial conditions so as to make an intelligence explosion survivable? How could one achieve a controlled detonation?



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

The pace of robotization has increased, not only in industry but more importantly in the medical and the service sector.

Technology in the field of big data analysis and management has improved dramatically. Google is particularly strong in this field, but all the Cloud and other big data players follow suit, including the Chinese Alibaba and Tencent.

Quantum computers are becoming ever faster and more powerful.

And probably the most special and scary, are new improvements in Machine Learning. Yes, machines learning from machines. There are talks of the fact that a certain test had to be stopped recently (the robot had to be 'killed') because the testers could no longer understand the robot and the latter kept on learning by itself without anybody knowing or understanding what it was

depends on what you call intelligence on one hand, and what you name artificial on the other. Intelligence seems to orbit around self-determination, self-development. To be able to act and learn in an independent way, without being told to or how. Artificial comes from the pretentious idea of humans that we are the only ones who have natural intelligence or at least much more than anybody or anything else. We are the masters of the universe, or at least of the blue planet.

Sadly, with the way innovation is going, it seems more and more likely that robots will take over ever more jobs and tasks. Will those jobs be replaced by other interesting ones as happened after the industrial revolution? Good question. But a positive answer is maybe a bit early given that the idea comes from blunt comparison with a similar event in the past and linear extrapolation towards the future. Innovation is not linear and not comparable

with anything, because it comes from trial and error. With the ever-increasing memory capacity and procession speed, anything can be copied - so why not intelligence? Computer programs beat us at chess and even at mahjong.

Still real intelligence has also to do with learning to recognize patterns, to prioritize, to focus, to short circuit and to learn by doing. But why would robots not be able to do so? Gut feeling is rarely the best driver of a business anyway, at least not over longer periods of time.

Is it perseverance then that sets us apart? The fact of stubbornly continuing to go for a goal, not listening to those who think to prove that it is wrong and eventually once in a billion times being right and forcing a major breakthrough in our world or business. Maybe that will not be easy to copy, but will it still be needed if all the data are available and simulations can be processed at the speed of light?

Then again, if perseverance is no longer needed, where will all the fun be if everything becomes predictable and

automatic? Can robots have fun the way we can? Do they have feelings? Where does our sense for fun come from? DNA? Instinct? Natural evolution? Fear?

What about the risk of one company becoming very dominant at AI, outperforming all the others? OK, we have anti-trust laws, but why would such an AI company abide by that law?

Ok, Al could probably do very well in our courts too, to apply our laws and regulations consistently and fast, because Al robots could strictly apply the rules without emotion and indeed very quickly. What about precedents? And what about cases where it becomes obvious that it is not the letter of the law but the spirit that is important? That is when we humans do kind of crowd thinking, searching and benchmarking to tackle those real new cases.

Can Al have a soul? Can it be religious? I remember reading a discussion in that field that went as follows: "Does Google know everything? Well it knows guite a bit of information, very much more than the old encyclopedia books, that held all information

there was to know, decades ago. If yes, is Google God, because God also knows everything? No. no. Google is not God. Then who is God? Let's ask Google..."

What about AI in the military? Ho, ho, ho, that sounds really scary. Robots fighting robots, ok, but what if they fight us? Does Al have ethics? Given that 'man is wolf for man', as proven by all our wars, can it get any worse?

Enough to be scared about. Eventually super Al or super robots may become so expensive that there is still a use for us humans. And, because the trials with chimpanzees working in factories of decades ago did not work, why would Al be able to completely replace us? If energy becomes very scarce or expensive,


the good old human may be needed again, although we currently have a big carbon footprint too.

Anyway, real sophisticated AI is still vears away. But simple robotics are here today also in the service industry like chat-bots for example. Google ear-bots are next. •

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

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


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# 2018: The political year ahead

had a whole host of challenges thrown its way. From the stagnating Brexit talks, to the political quaqmire in Catalonia, and persistent reminders of tax-avoiding wealthy citizens and multinationals particularly among the Silicon Valley giants. As we move into 2018 these issues remain unresolved. However, this time last year the picture looked a lot more



Brexit A transition deal between the EU and the United Kingdom won't be drawn up until October 2018, according to EU Brexit chief negotiator Michel Barnier - that's under a best-case scenario, where EU leaders decide sufficient progress has been made in the negotiations. A timeline, laid out in a document by Barnier, indicated that negotiations on a transition deal will begin around February.



However, the most pressing issue for Europe is a conclusion to the situation on the Irish border. It's a delicate situation that requires a grown-up solution. Unfortunately, at the moment there remain some childish antics from a minority of UK MP's. Therefore, the UK Prime Minister Theresa May must put every effort into ensuring that a solution is reached that favours both sides of the Republican-

Lovalist divide, so that we avoid opening up age-old tensions along the border.

Catalonia As things stand, the President of Catalonia, Carles Puidgemont remains in exile in Belaium as many of his fellow deputies sit in Spanish iails. The EU was quick to condemn his actions, and those of the Catalan government, but fell eerily silent on the actions of Spanish leader.

Mariano Rajoy and the Spanish police force. Europe looked on as the indiscriminate Guarda bludgeoned both young and old for peacefully protesting.

New media allowed EU citizens a glimpse of the EU's hypocrisy with images that would have normally been filtered out by the mainstream media. The intergovernmental bloc

The EU's condemnation of a democratic vote and its subsequent silence on the heavyhanded tactics of the police left many in Europe a little concerned. If their own governments were to use violence as a political tool against them then would the EU turn another blind eve? The Catalan president has already called for a Brexit style vote for Catalonia and an end to the stalemate feels a very long way off. It is certain to provide a



headache for European leaders well into 2018, if not far beyond.

Silicon Valley Tax Championed by French President Emmanuel Macron, the new tax on digital multinationals will target revenue generated in an EU country, instead of on profits that are booked in a low-tax EU headquarters, often Ireland or Luxembourg.

The hope is to have a formal proposal by EU ministers in December, which would become a draft law by the

"Tax has to be paid where it is due, be it offline or online," Juncker said after an EU summit in Tallinn, Estonia. "The commission will propose next year new rules on fair and effective taxation that provides legal certainty

and a level playing field for all."

Juncker made the commitment after Macron pressed the issue. The push by France, already backed by Germany, is part of a wider crackdown by the EU on Google and other US tech giants as Europe seeks better ways to regulate Silicon Valley. •

# Vlerick: Flexible studying

This month in our education pages we look at a college that is reshaping the future of learning

## How to pack a classroom in your briefcase (or carry-on, shopping tote or nappy bag).

One of the main reasons really motivated people don't ever take an MBA is because... well, when would you do it?

An MBA, most graduates agree, can be an intense experience. Traditionally, it involves taking a

whole year out to study at business school. And although part-time options can be incredibly rewarding, they can still be difficult for some people to fit into ultra-busy schedules.

Of course, the rewards for gaining an MBA can be impressive – more interesting, more highly paid work – or gaining the skills and confidence to set up your own successful business.

But wouldn't it be great if there was an even more flexible way of studying? Dean of Vlerick Business School, Marion Debruyne, strongly agrees. And in January 2018, her school is launching its first ever online MBA.



The programme allows students to learn in bite-sized chunks, whenever, wherever and in whichever order is most convenient for them.

"When we think of digital disruption," says Prof Debruyne, "We think of financial services and healthcare, but digital disruption is happening in education too, and it's very exciting."

## Shaping the future of learning

Vlerick has been at the forefront of digital learning for a number of years now. "Our first digital programmes," says Prof Debruyne, "were tailor-made for companies we were working with – and we still deliver many of these programmes.

"We've also launched online programmes this

year – for emerging healthcare companies and to help businesses and individuals learn negotiating skills. Then in January, we will launch our first ever online MBA."

This long experience has allowed Vlerick to develop a ground-breaking approach to digital learning. "It's a mistake to think that you can just upload some PowerPoint slides from a lecture and that's your online learning taken care of," says Debruyne. "You have to start by looking at what you want the outcomes to be, and then looking at all the ways you can achieve those outcomes using digital approaches. You start with the outcome and work backwards.

"Vlerick's approach is all about putting learning

into action and action into learning. We achieve that in the classroom and we achieve it online. Online actually presents you with many opportunities to bring participants into discussions, to get groups together to take part in tasks and challenges. And of course, our faculty is highly accessible online – either taking part in group

discussions or meeting up on Skype with students for a "virtual" cup of coffee."

Vlerick's investment in developing an exciting and enriching digital offer has been huge. Part of it has been to develop a programme in online learning for its own teams. Prof Debruyne says: "It makes sure that we are continuously improving our digital learning – and importantly, we are all going through the experience of being digital learners ourselves. It helps us to adapt our style to digital learning environments."

## Keeping it personal

All this experience in online learning has led Vlerick to another conclusion too: SPOCS (or small private online courses) are the only way to go. Prof Debruyne says: "We don't believe in mass open online courses (or MOOCs). Our

programmes have small groups and small learning environments. It's important for our learners to be able to form relationships with fellow participants and with their tutors and coaches."

But what is the experience like for learners?

"Flexible and personal," says Prof Debruyne.
"You study when is convenient for you. You participate in units when it's convenient for you. You can study on the train on your way to work. You can study in a hotel room – or on the couch at home after your kids have gone to bed.

"You can easily select areas of study that are more relevant to you and personalise your

experience. Each learner has their own tutor or coach – and they have opportunities, if they want, to take part in study trips, but they are not necessary."

So, is the future of learning all about online? Prof Debruyne says there will always be a need for physical learning spaces – but the role of online

learning will inevitably grow.



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


hether you are a neophyte or an unconditional adept of personalization, the garment made just for you is a fitted pleasure - but it has its pitfalls. Enter Atelier NA.

By creating Atelier NA six years ago, François Chambaud and Nicolas Wolfovski started with a statement: the traditional tailor is expensive and difficult to approach, but also ready-to-wear is not suitable is not everyone's cup of tea. And the brand stands out today as the French leader in custom-made products, thanks to a talent for harmoniously combining the two fundamental elements that make up its DNA: the 100% integration of its production

workshop of 5,000 m2 and technological innovation. The result is totally personalized clothing for the price of ready-to-wear. Unique and created from scratch - without reference to a template.

## A revolution in measurement

To do this, these gentlemen need only to take you to the 3D measuring cabin which is present in all of the company's shops. This revolutionary process, which has made Atelier NA famous, takes most of the measurements of a body - almost 200 - in just one second. In other words, the saving of time achieved compared to taking measurements is very substantial, allowing them to focus fully on the

vital details and finishes, such as a complete interfacing.

## And the materials...

understandable. Here you walk into the domain of experts, where one speaks as much about the history of the garment as of the trends of the moment. sk yourself, is there truly any better time than Christmas to set either yourself or a loved one up for the New Year with a truly excellent timepiece to wear on the wrist? Whether you're a man or a woman, there is an unmistakable cache to wearing an elegant watch.

And that, without a doubt, is where Rado comes in. Makers of some of the world's best watches since 1917, when the Schlup & Co. watchmaking factory in Lengnau, Switzerland was founded by the brothers Fritz, Ernst and Werner – by the time that 1957 rolled around, when Schlup & Co was celebrating its 40<sup>th</sup> anniversary, the occasion was marked by the launch of the Rado brand, with the iconic Golden Horse Collection.

Since then, Rado has become a truly global brand, famous for its innovative design and use of revolutionary materials to create some of the world's most durable watches. Ever since its beginnings, Rado has had a pioneering spirit, with the brand philosophy "if we can imagine it, we can make it" still holding true today. It's all about minimalism, but there is more going on here than meets the eye, with a perforated black brass dial that reveals the Swiss automatic movement below to shine through – and the hour and minute hands are tipped with Super-LumiNova, while the second hand is fully coated in the same glow-in-the-dark substance.

## The Rado True Stratum

And Rado has added another collaborative creation to its collection: the Rado True Stratum, jointly developed with leading Austrian designer Rainer Mutsch. Mutsch's trademark style includes a black dial that features delicate, asymmetrically arranged descending steps that emphasize the three dimensionality of the concave surface. Matt rhodium hour and minute hands and a yellow second hand provide a touch of colour as well as easy readability.

## Rado styles

For nearly three decades high-tech ceramic has played a central role in Rado's approach to watchmaking. High-tech ceramic timepieces are objects of art, but are lightweight and hypoallergenic. In a patented process used by Rado, plasma high-tech ceramic is created in an oven at high temperatures. Gases activated at 20,000°C transform finished white ceramic into a unique



material with an otherworldly metallic shine – in a process akin to modern alchemy, the colour of the ceramic is transformed without affecting its essential properties: lightness, hardness and wearer comfort.

And don't worry, the world's finest jewels are involved in the process – for decades, Rado had envisaged making watches from a material as hard as a natural diamond. As a result of painstaking research and the use of cutting-edge nanotechnology, the Rado dream became a reality with the unveiling of the **Rado V10K watch**. With its uniquely resistant high-tech diamond surface, the Rado V10K achieves a hardness of 10,000 Vickers.

In 1962, Rado introduced the iconic **Rado DiaStar 1**, a scratch-resistant watch at a time when this was far from the norm. The secret behind this creation? Hardmetal. Still used by Rado today, hardmetal is an exceptionally robust material – more durable than steel, gold and platinum and capable of withstanding the stresses of everyday life. 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## Alain De Nys: Tick-tock for the third generation

Nathalie Marchal meets an entrepreneur with timekeeping in his heartbeat

s the passion for watches hereditary? In some families, this appears to be an undeniable fact. And when the mellifluous sound of the watchmaking mechanism blends with a solid entrepreneurial spirit, the story can only get better.

The story I am going to tell you is very Belgian. Have you ever heard of Pontiac watches? Back in 1932, Ali Kinsbergen

launched a brand that would go on to sell more than 10 million watches – that's equal to the current Belgian population, which is no mean feat. And in fact, it has become a common cause that occupies a leading position on the market.

When he died in 1969, his daughter Johanna took over the company, which went out of business a little more than ten years later. But that does not matter - she took up the torch in 1986, creating a new company with her two sons, Philippe and Alain De Nys. Hence the three generations.

Alain recalls: "At the time we imported Breitling watches and at first it took a year to sell one, but five years later, it was seventeen a day. Then we had around 50,000 Breitlings on the Belgian and Luxembourg markets." After



having represented the brand for 18 years, they gave up the concession, rejecting a contract which didn't suit them. Alain then headed for Canada.

## Canadair and timepieces

Uses his solid experience in high-end chronometers, he convinced the Canadian company Bombardier – known world-wide for, among other things, Canadairs – to become a watch brand. In 2005, the Bombardier watch saw the light of day: a watch with Belgian design, a Canadian name and perfect Swiss movement. A timepiece of 'Haute Horlogerie', technique and aesthetics.

Ali Kinsbergen's grandson takes up the story: "In 2011, we decided to create Bombardier's little brother, but this time it would be 100%

ours." The GMT-Chronographs fitted the hour - it is known as the 'anticrisis watch' - and meets very specific criteria: with its excellent value for money (between €250 and €850), it boasts a sporty look dedicated motor sports enthusiasts love it -, while remaining elegant. Its slogan 'Elegance for Professionals', fits it like a glove.

## **Silicone**

But only Alain De Nys can say what entrepreneurial devilish compulsion drove

him to go even further. Along with the creation of the GMT-Chronographs, he launched, in collaboration with Aline de Westel - daughter of the founder of Salon Batibouw - ADNA watches, mounted on a changeable silicone colour bracelet that makes for light and very pleasant to wrist wear.

## Repair or maintain

"And given the success and the existing demand, we decided this year to set up an

all-brand repair and maintenance workshop." savs the entrepreneur. who is decidedly in tune with his watchmaking passion. "There, we put the timepieces back in working order but with quality service at the forefront.

"My grandfather and my mother have been making watches for 80 years, and my mother always told me that after-sales service was more important than the sale itself. Because someone who is satisfied with this the quality of service comes back with confidence - if he doesn't you'll never see him again," Many old watches arrive in Alain De Nvs' lap in the workshop in Waterloo, fine timepieces that have been left somehow in oblivion - there they find a new



life.

## **Old-timers**

Because these restored timepieces worn by our grandparents or our parents are born again they are back in voque. Alain De Nvs savs: "Vintage is in fashion, So, I decided to focus on buying and selling watches from the past fifty years, "In doing so, old Pontiacs and other timepieces with memories of the old days arrive at his door - it's like a homecoming.

" MY MOTHER **ALWAYS TOLD ME** THAT AFTER-SALES the one we love. It can be SERVICE WAS MORE and if it is modernized with **IMPORTANT THAN** THE SALE ITSELF"

My ideal watch is the one with a soul. We find the time everywhere, so this watch is first and foremost reminiscent of loved ones. a new strap, it will also match your personality and become a fashion accessory.

"My sons Nicolas and Robin are thinking about it seriously," he says happily. "The first is creative, and the second financially-minded, and they seem to be preparing something. A new watch? See you in 2018 with the 4th generation!"

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

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



The materials come from the very best European factories. The result is characterized by a high standard of quality, precision and finish that

customers and professional decorators.



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

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# Julia Roberts: A genuine Hollywood icon

This month *Together* chatted to Julia Roberts about her latest movie *Wonder* 




itting in an airy hotel suite, with a breeze tickling her godlike blonde mane, her smile as bright and dazzling as the sun, Julia Roberts emanates movie star. It's coming from her perfect miniscule pores. She takes a sip from a glass with those perfectly plump lips while her chocolate oval eyes glance to her left side, taking in a whispered conversation between clipboard-wielding publicists.

Every mundane action is transformed by

Robert's visceral star power presence. She is a true movie icon in the flesh. Which makes it hard to imagine the Oscar-winning star of *Pretty Woman*, *Erin Brockovich* and *My Best Friend's Wedding* could or would ever feel apprehensive around her devoted fans and well-wishers on the street. But it's true.

"I don't hate it but I try to avoid it," she tells me. "It makes me feel nervous, maybe I'm shier than I realized, I don't think I'm very good in

that interaction. I get nervous. It's always been that way. I'm not sure what to say."

Problem is. Roberts is so appealing and irresistible. Even the most hardened Hollywood hater would melt in her presence. Even a relatively low-key outfit of a black blazer and speckled black and white lightly see-through shirt would on most, appear rather ordinary. But on the recently turned 50-year-old, it's a vision in glamour.

Perky and fun, though terrifically seasoned and equipped with what she wants to answer and more important, what she won't, Roberts is in sunny humour as we discuss her latest performance in Wonder.

She plays the mother of a young boy (Jacob Tremblay) who lives with acute facial disfigurement. After being

home-schooled for all his life, she decides it's time to let him experience life in the outside and take his first steps into middle school.

And while bullying and harassment become part of his daily routine, she has to allow her son to grow strong and learn to stand up for himself. And ultimately love his imperfections. It's a very personal project for the star who fell in love with the book while reading to her three children, twins Hazel and Finn, 13 and 10-year-old Henry.

Roberts talks bullying and social media and

being open about having favourites out of her brood. She also talks turning about 50, why George Clooney gets different treatment and her idea of happiness.

The star lives with husband Danny Moder and their kids on a ranch in New Mexico.

### Together: You character has a very tough moment seeing her little boy heading off to school for the first time. How was it for you with you kids?

Julia Roberts: Torturous. I hate it. I hate it every day. I want them to stay home with me (laughs). Oceans of tears (laughs).

Bullving is obviously the main do you combat it if/when your

Bullying is a big issue of concern for my husband and I. We've always been very open with them and emphasize the point of telling a grown-up if they're being picked on or bullied. Always knowing that.

Because bottling it up and trying to compartmentalize which is a virtually impossible task for a child, that's where the problems stem and grow. So, knowing you have that open dialogue with a parent or a teacher, an adult you trust, is the first step to solving that situation.

### Were you bullied in school?

I was but I remember more the times when I

saw bullying or was present for it. And standing by and watching and not intervening. And that inaction is damaging and I think all of us at one point or another thought, 'I'm happy that isn't me' - as a child, it's hard to step forward and say, 'that's not OK'. I wouldn't have a problem now being older and taller but it's hard when you're that young.

### What about social media bullying, how do you combat that happening?

I don't understand social media, it's seems baffling to me. It appears unknown and indecipherable. I see it as bows and slingshot of negativity being tossed at strangers by strangers, this technological, anonymous aggression, I don't understand that compulsion and I never

books, there's a different response and reaction from my kids who are all at new, constantly evolving times in their lives. I have two boys and a girl, and they all have various likes and dislikes, so sometimes one isn't as invested or interested or the other's attention wanes.

With Wonder, it was extraordinary how equally they were all mesmerized and enraptured. So. based on that, and my kids saying, 'will this be a movie.' I called my agent and said. 'I want to

be the mom in Wonder, how

### That's a cool tradition you have, all reading together.

It's not something I've invented. I can't take credit. millions of families around the world do the same. But I learned it from my father, who

would read to us every night, and I loved the tradition - it was my time of the day for wonder, right before I went to sleep.

So, I like to do the same although my kids are now telling me not to do the voices, which they used to love. But now they're like, 'No voices, just read it.' That was my favourite part but I'm not the boss, am I? (laughs)

### Did you do this movie for them?

I would love to stake that claim, that it's for the children. I would love to smugly claim that but unfortunately my work is not a priority for them,

### So, with your own kids...

There are rules for it.

### How did you become involved with this movie?

I adored the book. I actually bought it for my eldest son after reading about it in the New York Times, forgot about it, discovered again when a lot of time had passed for some reason. I churned through it over a weekend and then I knew I wanted to introduce my children to it but I couldn't anticipate the reaction it got. We read together all the time, it's our tradition, family tradition, but with other Interview



but I do know they will enjoy this because they loved the book, so they're guaranteed to be interested. But in anything else of mine, not so much.

### The movie teaches us never to judge a book by its cover - has it taught you that lesson or were you already educated about that?

I met a good friend of mine for the first time, years ago and I remember when she walked into the room, I judged her and felt like I

immediately knew who she was and what she was about, And I was 99.3 per cent inaccurate. And that has stayed with me, whenever that little voice starts to formulate a iudament. I think of my friend and think, 'wait, I was wrong then and I'm probably wrong now'.

### I detect a slight flinch at the question.

50 years. It was a great very much.

### What did you do for it?

Well I had a lovely surprise in the form of my three kids. My husband and I were away on a trip in San Francisco and I was a little

sad I wasn't with them for the day in question. And then we turned into a shop, my husband directed me in there and I looked around and there they were. And we had a gorgeous day just the five of us.

### What brings you wonder and happiness?

Being with my family, that's happiness for me. Doesn't matter what we're doing, as long as we're all together.

# NY: Festive Contrasts

here may be few – if any – better places to spend the winter holidays than in New York City. But as is the case for every town, a little bit of knowledge will help you make the most of what it has to offer, while perhaps avoiding some its less 'festive' aspects. Combining research, testimony from a couple of opinionated locals and my own personal experience, here are my 8 ideas for anyone travelling across the pond

this Christmas and/or New Year's Eve.

But first, let's start off with what you shouldn't do (but probably will): walking around Times' Square might seem like a must when visiting New York at any time of year, but the truth is that the iconic spot is perhaps one of New Yorkers' most disliked places to have to walk through, never mind hang around. This is due to its extremely crowded, touristy vibe with the













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most cynical, soul-crushing displays of capitalism you will ever find – and I am barely exaggerating. If you must see it, pop by just long enough to take a selfie, then head off to discover all the far better places to take in the magic that is New York at Christmas time.

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said 25 dancers, something called a 'sun gong', etc., colliding in a flashy, spectacular celebration of the return of the Sun. Need I say more?

And speaking of New York's ubiquitous renown for spectacle, your Christmas adventure will require little more if you manage to snag tickets for The Nutcracker, performed by the New York City Ballet at Lincoln Center, It's the quintessential fairy tale experience for all ages, but especially magical if you're bringing kids along with you.

If that's the case, be sure to also take them to the **Holiday Train Show** at the New York Botanical Gardens, and watch with them as the old-timev model trains zip through an enchanting miniature version of the city, somehow recreated with plant materials.

Then again, perhaps the most enchanting thing to witness as a family is the Christmas home decorations at Dyker Heights. Every year, the houses of this Brooklyn neighbourhood carry out a ferocious competition for the most original - and most over-the-top -Christmas lights, to the delight of many tourists and locals alike.

And if you happen to be in town as early as December 17<sup>th</sup>, why not join a bunch of those locals and help them perform 'Unsilent Night': meet the crowd at Washington Square Park where a number of vintage boomboxes will be handed out to participants along with cassettes, all featuring different parts of the eponymous composition by Phil Kline. Then, march alongside everyone as the piece plays out through all the speakers, creating a communal music experience all the way to

Tompkins Square Park.

Now, moving on to New Year's Eve, the problematic topic of Times' Square inevitably comes right back to bother us. Of course, no one can stop you from heading there to

watch the ball drop at Midnight. Therefore. if you must subject yourself to all manners of discomfort and, again, annoying tourists (which, admittedly, you are also), I should at least remind you to be well-prepared: layer up as much as you can, be sure to pack lots of snacks (especially if this is a family outing) and don't forget to keep a close watch on your

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# The Brando and Tetiaroa

Actor Marlon Brando was responsible for ensuring that Tetiaroa remained a little corner of Eden





his is the island you dreamed of as a child when the storybook was closed. It's as if you created your own private world and stepped barefoot into your imagination. With its white sand beaches, swaying coconut palms, colourful birds, and sparkling lagoon, Tetiaroa is a dream paradise.

Beyond its breathtaking beauty, Tetiaroa is a place of rare biodiversity and a natural sanctuary for birds and marine life. Preserving and protecting this rare habitat and its plant

and animal life is critical to the guardians there. They are working on several programmes not just to preserve this sanctuary, but to help restore it and help it flourish.

Tetiaroa has a special place in Polynesian history and culture. It was the exclusive and favoured retreat of Tahitian royalty for centuries. Ancient marae (temples) built on the atoll by early Polynesians can still be found there today. With its rich history and ethereal beauty, it will always have a special place in the heart of Polynesians.

The stars have been guiding explorers to French Polynesia for millennia. The first people to follow guiding stars to Polynesia left from south-east Asia about 4,000 years ago, reaching the most easterly Society Islands by around 1100 AD. They came in outrigger





canoes with coconuts, bananas, breadfruit, chickens, pigs—and new gods.

Much later, the Europeans followed, searching for knowledge. Most famous among them was Captain James Cook, who first came to Polynesia in 1769. His second in command of his third voyage, Lieutenant Bligh, returned years later on the *Bounty* as Captain Bligh to retrieve the local breadfruit plant to feed the far-flung British Empire and was overthrown by his crew, as recounted in *Mutiny on the Bounty*.

Despite these interruptions by European explorers, Tetiaroa remained sacred to the local people. They created a place of sanctuary, ritual, and tapu (taboo) on Tetiaroa, where the gods and ancestors were said to come down to earth to visit the marae (temples). Tetiaroa

was also the favoured retreat of Tahitian high chiefs. While Tahitian ma'ohi (young chiefs)

competed in archery tournaments and sharpened their war skills, the arii vahine (princesses) retreated to the deep shade of the coconut trees to be pampered, as they lightened their skin and became ever more voluptuous. These were the sacred pleasure gardens of the Tahitian high chiefs.

Marlon Brando first came to Tetiaroa while filming Mutiny on the Bounty and was

immediately enchanted by the island's rare

beauty and the sense it gave him of being closer to paradise. Enthralled by the Polynesian

way of life – and the leading lady Tarita, the love of his life - he resolved to find a way to own this piece of paradise and succeeded in his goal in 1967. It was in this natural wonderland that he settled down, and finally found a home.

Brando was passionate about preserving Tetiaroa's natural beauty, biodiversity and cultural richness and was determined to find a way in which it could be a

centre for research and education, and a

model of sustainability. He was convinced that this small atoll could bring good to the entire world.

In 1999 he asked Richard Bailey, a long-time resident of Tahiti who shared Brando's passion for the environment and who had created some of the region's finest resorts, to help him conceive a plan that would help Brando achieve his dream. Together, Brando and Bailey pursued a vision of creating the world's first and foremost post-carbon resort—an island where innovative new technologies would enable a self-sustaining luxury environment for hotel guests, residents and scientific research. The Brando resort is the legacy of that shared vision.

The island abounds with marine life and flora and fauna - beautiful tropical birds are found throughout Tetiaroa, but one of the motus,



Tahuna Iti or 'Bird Island', is a favourite spot where thousands of birds roost every evening.

"My mind is always soothed when I imagine myself sitting on my South Sea island at night. If I have my way, Tetiaroa will remain forever a place that reminds Tahitians of what they are and what they were centuries ago." Check out all that the resort has to offer - it's worth a look.






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# NEMO33: Bora in Brussels!

James Drew extols NFMO33, one of the world's deepest diving pools



ccording to Popular Mechanics, NEMO33 is also one of the 'strangest', Intrigued?

Until the completion of Y-40 in Padua in 2014. NEMO33 held the world record from 1 May 2004 as being the world's deepest diving pool, at a cool 34.5 metres (113 feet). Now, that is deep – given that your humble scribe does know a little about how to dive, but my lessons came some years ago in a swimming pool, 8 feet, it would be fair to say that I would have some trepidation about approaching such a blue whale of a pool.

But, as NEMO33 creator, Belgian diving expert John Beernaerts explains, there is no need whatsoever for nerves: "The water is sunheated to 33°C for comfort, and it is spring water, from which chlorine is completely

absent, to protect your skin, and here at Nemo 33, our very first priority is safety. For 13 years this has been demonstrated, with more than 400,000 dives and not a single injury to any of our customers."

So, what was the inspiration behind NEMO33? Savs John: "I remember the long training sessions in not-so clean swimming pools late at night, and that on top of all that you had to stay for long periods in cold water. And after you finished your course in confined waters, you had to go and do several dives in a lake or in a quarry where the water temperature could be as low as 5°C - they used to tell you that vou were only a 'real man' if you had no fear of diving under those conditions! But, on the other side of the world, men learn how to dive in a blue lagoon... learning to dive was easy. the pleasure was immediate, and discovering

an underwater world did not require suffering. One evening, while waiting for a friend. I drew the first design of a unique and deep pool. The objective - recreate the conditions of Bora in Brussels! It took me three vears' study to define the

boundaries of the project, and 21 versions were tested before I arrived at my final pool."

And what a pool – it contains 2,500,000 litres of non-chlorinated, highly filtered spring water maintained at 30 °C (86 °F) by a solar heater and holds several simulated underwater caves at a 10-metre (33ft) depth. Due to the warm temperature in the pool, divers can dive for extended periods without a dry suit. John intended it to be a multi-purpose diving instruction, recreational and film production facility, and Popular Mechanics has given it the ultimate accolade of a rating as one of the top 18 'strangest' pools in the world – it would be interesting to know how mechanics define 'strange', don't you think?

Never dived before? Have no fear - all vou have to be is aged 12 or over and in good health - John's expert diving instructors will take you very much in hand, as all divers must be either certified or supervised by a trainer and must have a certified diver as a dive buddy.

You can begin with an introductory dive (TSD type), which introduces you gently to the marvellous sensation of weightlessness, Or. why not go straight for Indoor Diver certification, which allows you to acquire experience by diving at NEMO 33 as often as you like. Then, when you are ready, you can go diving at an external location with trainers to convert vour Indoor Diver into an Open Water Diver certification, which is recognized worldwide.

The price of the dive includes all equipment (they don't let you bring your own), and a predive briefing is provided, in French, Flemish

and English to accommodate everyone. The pool also includes a couple of tunnels and 'caves" in which you can surface. The caves are painted so that when you like you are on the moon!

DIVE WAS EASY. THE PLEASURE WAS IMMEDIATE " surface in them it looks like you are on the manner.

And there is also plenty to do as a spectator - the facility has a restaurant, bookshop. swimwear store, souvenir store, rooms for other water activities, and there are also numerous underwater windows that allow visitors to look into the pools at various depths.




# Munich: A winter wunderland

### Relax in the indoor pool or the sauna

From the art nouveau gem that is the

### Wonderstruck


