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



We highlight a charity that is once more dedicating a four-day exhibition to help disadvantaged children

he ASBL L'Accueil could receive more children, but it needs help... your help. The funding granted to it by the authorities is insufficient – without the support of individuals like you and us the Centre cannot continue to exist and help these children in need.

L'Accueil is a centre that welcomes children aged 0-6 years whose parents are faced with relational or personal difficulties that make them momentarily unable to ensure a secure, adapted parenting

environment. It is a living space for children who need to be removed from their home environment to assure them of all necessary protection, prevent abuse happening and getting worse to the point where negligence becomes daily. L'Accueil boasts a team of specialists on hand to offer all necessary care. 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

f you're struggling to stick to your exercise routine, it's time to surround yourself with like-minded individuals – because the more your friends exercise, the more you will.

"This year, I'm going to exercise regularly and get fit."

We've all been there haven't we, setting ourselves a new year's resolution to get in shape and get fit. And it's so easy to say on 1 January.

Yet it's so hard to do in practice - as the

novelty wears off, we realize how much time it's going to take to actually get fit, and obstacles place themselves between us and our gym visits: long days of work, family commitments, dinner with friends...

So how can we help ourselves?

Make friends at the gym

Well, here's the good news: it turns out that exercise is infectious: surround yourself with networks of friends who exercise and it can positively influence your own exercise habits.



How so? Did you know that if you've made a friend at the gym in the last three months, you're 40% less likely to give up on your gym membership than those who haven't? As the UK researchers behind this study conclude, it's a great reason to start making connections at the gym, surrounding yourself with people who will hold you accountable - albeit in a nice way, because you don't want to miss

out on a gym session with them.

And now researchers from the MIT Sloan School of Management have found that 'peer pressure' is as evident in fitness as in other areas of life. with our own activity levels influenced by the activity of our friends: the more our friends exercise, the more we will,

The power of your social network

In coming to this conclusion, the researchers focused on running, looking at whether someone's global network of friends would affect how far they ran. To do this, they analysed fitness tracker data that was posted to a social media site by around 1.1 million

people over a period of five years.

Acknowledging that individuals will have deeprooted, and often unobservable, reasons for behaving in a particular way, the researchers focused on the weather as a naturally occurring variable - something they could observe and that could be expected to influence people's propensity to "THE MORE

run, without needing to delve deeper into people's very

The team reasoned that good weather would encourage longer runs, while bad weather would result in shorter runs. They hypothesised that when people in one location experienced good weather and extended their runs accordingly, their friends in different locations would see this and also extend their runs - even though they were experiencing different weather. This hypothesis was proven across the board.

However, how strongly people were affected by their friends did vary depending on their profile.

Exercise is especially infectious for men

Men appeared to be more easily influenced than women and were particularly influenced by their male friends.

Women were moderately influenced by other women, but unaffected by men.

Runners who were typically lazier had a strong influence on their more active friends: their active friends didn't want to feel they were being left behind in their training efforts.

OF THE SAME The opposite, however, was not true: less active people were very used to seeing (and ignoring!) status updates from their active friends and tended to just carry on as normal.

Who will be your exercise influencers?

If you're strugaling to stick to your exercise routine, it seems you need to surround yourself with friends of the same gender who are being active, and whose activity will spur you on to be active yourself.

It could be as simple as agreeing with your friends that you'll do a class together; you're much less likely to drop out if you feel you'll be letting your friends down.

But why not harness the power of your social media network too? Rather than leave it to

chance that you'll see updates, you and your friends could create a group and all agree to post workout updates as a way to keep WITH FRIENDS each other motivated. It then doesn't matter if you come to Aspria on your own or with friends - you'll still want to do it so you don't get left behind by your online group.

Detox from your phone



Additionally, smartphones can be viewed as an extension of our brain in that they come with a certain amount of storage or 'memory'. Smartphones allow us to do everything with one single device - on the go. Our phones contain more processing power

than the first rocket ever launched into space. Everv vear, newer devices are unveiled with a new design and new 'spec' to outperform the competition. Businesses understand the brain's addiction and entice us into staying switched on by consuming their apps

and social media. In today's world we have become so obsessed with buying the latest version and so engrossed in our devices that the average user is engaged between three to five hours (even up to eight hours) and checks their device as often as 150 times over the course of a day. The extent of consumption is affecting our behavior. Just as a child with a toy, when separated from our devices we can we get irritable and moody. Our use of them

has turned into a dependency or an addiction. An addiction (just like sugar or tobacco) raises the level of dopamine, a neurotransmitter that is released when the brain expects a reward or new information. When the level of dopamine drops, our mood changes and we crave more of the addiction. When we reach this level, all barriers drop. The brain does not know when it's had enough. So we consume more and more in order to satisfy our mental stimulation.

Tips for detoxing

I recommend using the Moment App to check just how often you use your phone. Over the course of one week, seek to connect less and less to your phone by applying the tips below so that by the end of the week you will have significantly reduced your time spent on it. Here is a list of tips, try them out for yourself:

- Disable alerts and notifications
- Establish phone-free zones (leave it outside bedroom and bathroom)
- Switch it off in the evening before your curfew
- Clear out unnecessary apps (access social media from a computer)
- Don't take it into work meetings
- Use airplane mode at work (only turn it on during breaks)

• Use airplane mode while on vacation (your battery will last longer so you can make it through a day of taking pictures and looking up directions and things to do and see)

- Go back to basics:
- Go back to using a 2G phone
- Favour voice calls over texting and social media
- Read magazines and crossword puzzles while going to the toilet
- Challenge: can you make it through an evening without your phone?

The next time you go out to dinner, have everyone place their phones in a stack in the middle of the table. The first person to reach for their phone must pay for everyone's dinner!

Take the challenge

Smartphones and technology are not to blame, we are. We have allowed ourselves to become so attached and dependent to the point of becoming addicted. Remember, technology itself is not a bad thing, it all depends on how it is used. Take the challenge to use the month of March to march away from your phone. Disconnecting for as little as one hour a day can give you a renewed sense of energy. You'll find more time for other activities and appreciate just how much more you can get done when you're not 'switched on'. By consuming less you'll reclaim and appreciate time for yourself, your family, relationships and social gatherings, and you'll regain mental cognition such as improved focus, attention, productivity and sleep!

e all have that little 'should' voice in our head, saying I should eat less, I should exercise more, I should quit smoking, I should become a vegetarian... I should do a detox. And it continues: I should know better, I should be more positive, I should be more free, I should be more intelligent, I should, I should and I should... I should do an emotional detox.

The voice of knowing what we should do is, indeed, the voice of a better version of ourselves. We constantly listen to it but in most cases do not follow it. Often, it is a voice that is simply present in our consciousness, just changing subject and form. Sometimes, of course, we do listen, and we do obey it but then only for a while, a few months, a few weeks, a day, or just a fleeting moment. More often than not, once we act and actually embrace the 'should', we end up in our old behavioural patterns with the 'should' still there, or we replace it with something else that we should. We end up in the place where we feel safe, even if it is not perfect, or less than life could be.

More than anything, we end up with the comfort of having a 'should' as a companion. A companion that keeps repeating that you are less than you could be, and that there is a slimmer, better and more beautiful version of you - somewhere. We feel secure in the way things have always been; in a way we are attached to our 'shoulds'. If we actually acted on our 'shoulds', they would disappear. Then

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there would be acceptance, uncertainty and freedom. With our companion present, we are at least certain that there is something to fix. How sad to lose such a precious friend, the one that is constantly telling us that we are not good enough! That we are not perfect the way we are.

We would benefit tremendously from acting on our 'shoulds', so that we could become free from this negative friend of ours. Or our second best option: get the voice out of our minds once and for all and be free to just be, without any guilt. When you realize that a 'should' not acted on is like a demoralizing friend, you could either take action to follow the advice or accept yourself with your imperfections. To stop demoralizing yourself, either change and be happier, or do not change and let go of the guilt, and be happy anyway. 'Should' is like an extra icing on our imperfections. Not like the one on the cake, but like a thick layer of cloudy black smoke, preventing you from accepting yourself just the way you are. To be allowed to exist, to fully live and be happy. Perfect imperfections included.

To detox has become a fashionable thing to do, and it is in fact extremely beneficial for your whole being, both physically and emotionally. During any detox, you get closer to who you would be if you were perfect. Detox is a kickstarter to finally listen to the voice that knows. During detox, your body is cleansed from sugar and toxins. embracing any unpleasant feelings and the nonexpressed frustrations that tend to emerge during the detox. During detox, all that was hidden inside tends to become visible so that you can get closer to your true self. The emotional detox, included in any physical detox, removes old emotions and liberates you.

To focus on something that we do not like about ourselves is deeply human, as if we were not good enough just the way we are. We miss out on precious life concentrating on something that needs to be fixed and changed before we can really live.

There are things that everybody knows are bad like alcohol, cigarettes, fattening food - the list is endless. But there are many other things that are regarded as good even though they are just a form of comfort. Things that you need to do, or things that you focus on, be it TV shows, frequent naps, meditation and yoga, or needing 20 supplements a day and only organic vegetables otherwise you freak out, or checking your mobile every two seconds to see if your partner has sent you a text. We are all more or less attached to something to soothe ourselves, and if not an addiction most people are at least a little obsessed about one thing or another.

It can be your partner, your hobby, your children, your colleagues, the way you feed yourself, your clothes, your appearance, learning, cleaning, your dating app - just about anything. We are not that different from one another when we scratch beneath the surface; everybody is obsessed about something. So, just relax, it is all going to be fine in the end. We are human. We are not supposed to be perfect.

The small things that we focus on are not addictions. To be addicted is a completely different story. When you are addicted, your life



suffers because you need something outside of vourself, something that is slowly destroying vou, and probably people around you as well. Maybe you are stuck and have not even acknowledged to vourself that you have a problem. Then it's time for a serious detox, and vou need outside help. First to accept vou have a problem, then to acknowledge the truth. As in the AA, acknowledging that you are powerless in the face of alcohol. Or like with bulimia, that you are powerless in the face of food. Or like with anorexia, that you are powerless in the face of not wanting to feed your physical body. Or with sex addictions, that you are powerless in the face of sex. Or with workaholics, powerless in the face of having to perform, or as a shopping addict powerless in the face of spending too much. Anything that is present in your head at all times is an addiction. Anyone who has been addicted, and recovered, has a lot of wisdom to bring to this world. In the powerlessness of an addiction, we are certainly less than we could be.

When we lose our power, we lose ourselves.

The rituals of life

Sarbani Sen takes a broad look at the rituals that govern different cultures

When we experience violent or important events in our lives, the brain often perceives this as a shock - an unusual event that disrupts the course of things, or alters it: a death, a birth, a move, a separation, an

accident, a sale, etc. But in a more and more "THE UNDERLYING human life. globalized, smoothed environment, where culture is mixed. particularisms are lost, and with them the rituals of our ancestors. A

piece of humanity is lost. Of course, the consumer society has been careful to keep the so-called 'commercial' rituals such as Saint Valentine's Day and Saint Nicholas and Halloween. But it is important to reclaim certain rituals that mark the course of our stories, both

individual and collective. Since it would no longer be possible to adhere today to practices that no longer correspond to our current values, it is interesting to look at the creation and reintroduction of new rituals in life for the

few important steps in

The best known are the rituals around birth (in Brazil there is for THINGS IS LOST " example the 'cha de nenem', feast of the

> future mother who sees herself cherished with gifts for her and for her future baby), the ritual of the first meal (Mukhebhat in India, when the first teeth appear, the child is dressed and shown to his community), the ritual of the first menstruation or first sperm, the ritual of

academic success (the famous Graduation in the United States), the ritual of leaving childhood and entering adulthood (many tribes in Africa have their rites), the ritual of marriage and the ritual of death are just a few examples.

These are ceremonies intended to help the subject overcome the crisis represented by a change in his or her physiological or social characteristics. They have an important role in strengthening the social order and the cohesion of the group. By respecting the social rites and the codes specific to the group's culture, each person in fact manifests his desire to be fully admitted to it, marks his belonging. But today, given the complexity and the mix

of the majority of the population, which membership do we talk about? That of the original group? To the group we are currently forming? To both?

The constants of the rite are its repetition, its practice renewed identically, in a perpetually similar context. If we take the example of the funerary rite, it includes: a funeral ritual, a burial ritual (coffin or for Muslims on the right side of the earth towards Mecca, three shovels of earth by those close to Israelites), instructions on the tombstone, and possible bans (cremation, organ donation). Every culture has its own, often linked or grouped with religion. Religion has taken over and instituted these kinds of rites in order to maintain social cohesion in the group.

Western society, more and more liberated from all these dogmas and sectarian beliefs, was at the same time relieved of its panoply of rites. As a teenager, I questioned the importance and the meaning of the rites of my parents (Indian, Hindu, Bengali on one side and Protestant, German on the other, Belgian, atheist on the third). I questioned the need for presence at family meals, weddings, religious holidays, meaning and lack of communion. felt that my friends had privileges in their social groups that we did not have (just the concept of godfather and godmother that we did not

really have in Indian culture has long disturbed me and my brother).

My parents never found the right explanation. which is often the case in cultural expats: the underlying meaning of things is lost, but only the ritual remains, often adapted to modernity and the local possibilities. Funnily enough, I only became interested in all this at university during my sociology, then anthropology studies.

However, we all have our "A PERMANENT rituals, individual or collective, which are more or less governed by time and space. They are constituted by rites, that is to say, a set of immutable rules, fixing the course of a ceremony, which is public, thus exoteric or secret to be discrete.

therefore esoteric. With regard to individual rituals, we need only think of our habits such as meditation, prayer, reflection or less spiritual habits such as the systematic time of the coffee break, the bedtime story or the train schedule.

Although these habits are for the most part the result of improvization or simply the consequence of the time that remains available to us during the day, these rituals have the particularity of allowing us to reassure ourselves and to plunge ourselves into an inner self, to somehow establish a balance sheet. This report is simply the daily reference point about our family balance, our emotional situation, our performance at work done the same day and our body condition.

Shamanic and masonic mituals

By comparison, and to look for the opposite extreme of a contemporary reality, let us observe what is still done today on the shamanic and masonic side. In masonic life, each symbol, each rite, each ritual has no other interest than a permanent individual search for light, but this research is generated

and activated by all the brothers in a lodge and this research continues in meditation and interpretation of the meaning of life in the secular world. The masonic ritual is an initiatory vehicle that leads us on the path of the search for truth. A universal tool with which each brother can work intuitively, by means of his five senses, in order to awaken and develop his individual consciousness.

The meaning of the masonic ritual is to make each person Receiver and Donor, Student and Teacher, Apprentice and Master. It aims to encourage us to a state of fraternal sharing,

thus enabling us to awaken to a permanent evolution of the mind and the heart. It is a link between the visible and the invisible, between the microcosm (man) and the macrocosm (the universe). In the shamanic life, we work with the elements of nature, the

seasons, the solstices, the end of the harvests or the beginning of the harvest. So many rituals related to primary agricultural life, which was the basis of life at one time.

The ritual as active meditation

Active, because its action is greatly increased by the invocations. explores what it means to be successful. referring to a number of fictional characters who struggle to achieve success as illustration. For George Bailey, the main character of the film It's a Wonderful Life, he is dissatisfied with where he has ended up - living a very ordinary life in small-town America - and contemplates committing suicide. His guardian angel shows him all the lives he has touched and at the end of the film, he realizes that he has led a good life and is valued and appreciated by those who matter to him. His life has been a

success, but not the kind of success that society tends to value.

In the play The Seagull by Anton Chekhov, Baggini cites the example of three characters: a celebrated writer who wishes he was more successful: a moderatelv successful writer who envies the success of the celebrated one: and the civil servant who envies the success of the moderate one because he failed to even try to become a writer. Thus, Baggini notes that success tends to be subjective.

relative only to people more successful than us (rather than less), and elusive. Life cannot be meaningful if all it depends on is being successful, can it? Because if it does, then what happens when we have reached that success? Does life become meaningless after it? And if the purpose of life is to be successful then what happens to those who do not succeed? Are their lives pointless? Surely not, says Baggini. Rather success ought to be about becoming who we want to become by doing what we do. He refers to another character in Chekov's play Nina. She is an actress and struggles to make a living but she is satisfied with life because she is an

actress by being one. This kind of success being by doing - places meaning within our reach, because it focuses on the process, not the outcome. 
In his book Stand Firm: Resisting the Self-Improvement Craze, professor Svend Brinkmann of Aalborg University in Denmark


members know that that purpose or goal can change.

Now, the thing with CES is that it's not just a sloppy thrown-together collection of computer kit like so many other shows are. Rather, it's an exposition of electronics from cars, to boats, TVs and audio equipment. On the subject of which, the must-have item in the world of audio his year is apparently the DS W2 cartridge from Japanese audio doyens JS Audio, It's the latest iteration of their optical cartridge system. For those not in the know. on a record deck there's an arm, which is the


thing on a pivot that holds the needle. The cartridge is the thing that encases the needle. Put simply a regular cartridge will contain a magnet set between two electric coils. The magnet vibrates in response to the needle moving along the record and translates it into electrical signals sent to the amplifier.

With the DS W2, the magnet is replaced with - what else? - a laser. The company claim that using an optical signal to read the vibrations cuts down the interference on the needle itself and reduces the

tracking force, causing less damage to the record. If this is the sort of thing that makes you drool, you just know there's bad news coming. Along with its own pre-amplifier (for boosting and 'cleaning' the signal) the whole affair will set you back in the region of €10,500 - happy shopping.

Turkey improving relations with EU

Gerry Callaghan looks at Turkey's problematic push for visa-free travel



n 26 March, EU and Turkish leaders will meet in Varna, Bulgaria in efforts to renew strained ties between the blocs.

Turkey wants to improve relations with the European Union and will seemingly press for visa-free travel for its citizens during the upcoming EU-Turkey summit in Bulgaria's Varna in March. Turkish President Recep Tayyip Erdoğan will meet European Council President Donald Tusk, European Commission President

Jean-Claude Juncker and European leaders in the Bulgarian Black Sea city on 26 March. However, given the events of the past few

years and Turkey's unwillingness to protect the rights of its citizens, visafree travel is an unlikely outcome of the summit.

In 2013 the European Union offered Turkish

citizens the prospect of visa-free travel on the condition that Ankara met 72 criteria on democratic rights, primarily in freedoms of thought and expression, civic society, economic transparency, the judiciary and tackling corruption. Visa-free travel for Turkish citizens was also a key issue in the refugee deal Turkey and the EU signed in March 2016. Ankara was supposed to meet all of the criteria by the end of that June, but failed to do so. The EU said seven criteria remained outstanding which infringed on the freedoms of thought and expression. President Recep Tayyip Erdoğan, in a speech on 6 May 2016, said Turkey remained under the threat of terrorism and criticized European authorities for tolerating exiled supporters of the armed Kurdistan Workers Party, or PKK, considered a terrorist group by Ankara, "We're going our way, you go yours," said the Turkish leader. In July of the same year, a failed coup attempt resulted in the declaration of a state of emergency, which is still ongoing. The aftermath saw a heavy-handed crackdown on

opposition leaders and supporters, marked by mass purges at public institutions and universities resulting in the arrest of journalists, academics, politicians and parliament members. The crackdown

sunk Turkey-EU relations to a new low. Yet Erdoğan has taken up the issue of EU membership anew, including during recent trips to France and Italy, amid growing talk of normalizing ties with the EU. At the beginning of February, Turkey submitted documents to the European Commission, saying it had fulfilled the outstanding criteria for the visa waiver. "The ball is now in the EU's court," said Turkish Foreign Minister Mevlut Cavusoglu.

However, the seven outstanding criteria identified by the EU required Ankara to introduce biometric passports for its citizens, adopt measures to fight corruption, align its anti-terror legislation with EU standards, conclude an operational cooperation accord with Europol, adopt rules on the protection of personal data in line with EU norms and cooperate efficiently with all EU countries on issues related to fighting crime and fully implement the terms of the refugee deal. Turkey has since begun issuing biometric passports and adopted a law on the protection of personal data but the EU has deemed those steps insufficient and not fully compliant with its standards. On the issue of combating corruption, then-Prime Minister Ahmet Davutoglu had unveiled a 'transparency package' in 2015, but planned measures were shelved after vocal objections from Erdoğan. Davutoglu was eventually forced to step down, and his successor Binali Yildirim has never revisited the issue.

For the EU, the amendment of anti-terror legislation is a top priority. Ankara has not only failed to make any move to meet the EU's demands, but it has continued to arrest and prosecute opponents on terror-related charges. Most recently, the judiciary targeted members of the pro-Kurdish Peoples'

Democratic Party ahead of the party's convention in Ankara in mid-February.

Meanwhile, the European Parliament, a key player in winning the visa waiver, passed a harsh resolution

condemning Ankara's emergency rule, political pressure on the judiciary, arbitrary arrests of dissidents, suppression of the media and attempts to silence opponents. The resolution acknowledged that terrorism remained a threat for Turkey but stressed that "the broadly defined Turkish anti-terrorism legislation should not be used to punish citizens and media for exercising their right of freedom of expression". To which the Turkish Foreign Ministry responded by calling the resolution "null and void".

Just days earlier, EU leaders had announced they would hold a summit with Erdoğan to review the state of EU-Turkish relations on 26 March 2018. Turkey wanted the summit to take place in Brussels, but the EU chose the city of Varna in Bulgaria, which is currently holding the rotating presidency of the bloc. The relegation of the venue suggests the EU is trying to give the meeting a low profile. The LIFESTYLE

invitation to Erdoğan says the agenda will focus on issues related to the supremacy of law and basic freedoms. Given Ankara's toughening practices under the state of emergency, the Varna summit seems unlikely to yield any substantial results toward improving ties.

Moreover, in Germany, the coalition protocol between the Christian Union parties and the Social Democrats suggests that the EU door will be closing for Turkey. The protocol states that progress on Turkish demands such as the revision of the Turkey-EU customs union accord and the abolition of visa requirements will depend on Ankara's fulfillment of its obligations. On the issue of membership talks, the protocol continues the current freeze. It describes Turkey as an important partner for Germany and an "EU neighbour", dropping the reference to "strategic" cooperation used in the previous protocol. **"THE EU**

On 6 February, the European Commission announced a new strategy to expand into the Western Balkans, setting 2025 as the target year for the first accessions. Serbia and Montenegro appear first in line for the next enlargement, a strategy in

which Turkey is not featured. As the European Parliament's resolution underscores, any visa waiver for Turkey requires first and foremost the lifting of the state of emergency and an end to the suppression of opposition, namely the media and other government critics.

decrees, the restriction on the rights of defence lawyers and the detention of hundreds of people for "terrorist propaganda" over social media posts will not satisfy EU leaders. With more than 150 journalists behind bars, Ankara's argument that they landed in jail because of links to terrorist groups and not solely by carrying out their occupation is left wanting. Any visa waiver will require the approval of the European Parliament and the European Council. The European Parliament's resolution already shows that almost no political bloc will be willing to vote in favor of such a gesture to Turkey. And with Germany and France floating an alternative status for Turkey less than membership, the country's accession appears off the table for the foreseeable future, until at least 2025,

To avoid the full alienation of Turkey and its citizens, the EU might consider a limited visa waiver covering certain groups such as businesspeople, scientists, artists and civil society activists. Yet, **IS SLOWLY** inevitably, it would still require the lifting of emergency rule, the release CLOSING of jailed journalists, steps to ensure iudicial independence and the **ITS DOOR** " narrowing of the scope of terror crimes to exclude the expression of opinion. In conclusion, Turkey is

unlikely to emerge with a visa waiver programme at the summit in Varna on 26 March, and the EU is slowly closing its door. If Turkish leaders do not address the issues outlined in the European Parliament's resolution, a new crisis in EU-Turkey relations might be just over the horizon.















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






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Villa Antinori di Monte Aguglioni, Florence

This beautiful historic villa, located on a scenic position, on one of the hill tops on the left side of the river Arno a few kilometres from Florence, once belonged to one of the great families of the Tuscan wine tradition from the late 19th century until the middle of last century. 


Villa Reale di Marlia

The famous violinist Paganini used to play during the summer evenings for Napoleon's sister, Princess Elisa Bonaparte Baciocchi, in the spectacular Green Theatre. We are talking about the most celebrated historic villa in the province of Lucca, Villa Reale di Marlia. The estate was bought from the Pecci Blunt Counts, by a Swiss couple, who, after having it accurately restored, under the surveillance of the Arts Council, will open a dream hotel that aspires to be one of the prime extra luxury hotels in Italy. Among one of the



most representative Italian historic dwellings, Villa Reale di Marlia is one of the Monumental Villas of Lucca, which were built in the 15th century in the countryside surrounding the town of Lucca, by rich bankers and silk merchants. The villa is surrounded by a 19-hectare English style park, with parts of the garden original from the 1600s, including the magnificent Green Theatre, created in 1652. an open-air theatre, with walls of yew hedges and statues in terracotta, representing the characters of the Commedia dell' Arte. 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
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
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



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Mer Du Nord: De-coding the DNA that is MDN

Jeanie Keogh looks at a Belgian fashion brand that dares to care



ong-standing Belgian fashion label Mer du Nord, which now goes by the peppier acronym MdN, has undergone an interesting revival. When the company went into receivership three years ago, French businesswoman Dominique Nebbout Chekly was handed the challenge of bringing it back to life, thus becoming the fairy godmother of struggling fashion houses. Here's how the story goes...

Once upon a time, Mer du Nord found itself boxed in by its reputation as a staid fashion house. Nebbout Chekly, who was working as a fashion consultant after a 20-year history in strategic brand development for fashion houses such as Maja and Tara Jarmon, was

invited to cross the border from her native France to work her magic on Mer du Nord. Now she is in the process of nurturing it back to financial health and saving it from the brink of fashion extinction. As the new moniker suggests, MdN is more modern, with a touch of laidback bohemian added to the company's signature preppy and conservative style. The private school/horse riding look is still evident in the classic blazers with a gold-embossed MdN on the coat pocket, or the striped tunic dress with MDN embroidery, but there's a down-to-earth twist thrown in. The look says "dare me to care" while remaining decidedly chic.

I met up with Nebbout Chekly ahead of Paris



fashion week in January, where the spring/ summer 2018 collection was to be presented. the second collection since she became artistic director of MdN a little over a year ago.

She spoke about the transformation the brand "THERE'S A DOWN- have to move forward, of has gone through under her leadership, as well as the reverence she has for Mer du Nord and its established prominence in the Belgian fashion market.

"There's still a history – it's a company that is going to celebrate its 30th anniversary in 2018. Today, you need to look at the present and the future and not look at the past. Yes, the past is



important because you need to examine it and try to see the DNA of the firm and the legacy that we need to preserve and respect. Beyond that, when it comes to the negative aspects,

I'm not in denial, but we course, while considering the brand. It's easier to launch a new brand, which includes other difficulties of course, but it was

more simple, in any case for me. But in this instance I think it's worth stretching out a bit. Today, there is a shortage of established companies. This brand has an effect on people in Belgium. Everyone knows Mer Du




Nord and people like the brand. It's true that this was a bit tarnished in its last seasons, but now we're giving it another life, which it deserves. It's a Belgian brand that is renowned and fashion comes from Belgium so it was a super challenge for me."

To wake up this "Sleeping Beauty", as she refers to it, she first spent six months focusing on getting to know its DNA and remaking the

code, before thinking about collections. It was important, she said, to first identify the fundamentals of the brand, which came down to two things: timelessness and highquality material. The newly-launched spring/

summer collection has an androgynous theme, and Nebbout Chekly turned to men's clothing for inspiration for the designs, which are exclusively for women at the moment. Oversized boyfriend shirts feature highly, as well as men's silk pyjamas intended for loose summer streetwear. The poplin cotton is made by Thomas Mason in Italy and the embroidery is also done in Europe; the printing happens in



studio. There are plans in the works to add a

men's line starting with a capsule collection – a few pairs of pants, a coat – and next year they are going to add accessories to their women's line, introducing bags and shoes.

"I want to go much, much further with this company. We have boutiques in Belgium, and we opened a boutique in Paris in Le Marais.

> The idea is to really develop the online site because it's a storefront window that is accessible to everyone around the globe. The next step will be to work on exporting the brand, especially to Japan and to South Korea. But for

the moment the concentration is on Northern Europe."

In these times, converting a fashion house from passé to trendy is not as easy as waving a wand and turning Cinderella's rags into a ballgown, but here's hoping MdN goes on to thrive in the ever-changing world of fashion and lives happily ever after. www.mdn-online.com ●





A new estate in Pouilly-Fuissé

This month we focus on the Vignoble du Mâconnais region

he Domaine des Boutires, which was acquired in 2016 by the owners of the Château du Moulin à Vent, has produced three Pouilly-Fuissé wines that will hit the market for the first time in 2018.

"The Domaine des Boutires gives us the opportunity to fulfil our desire to take control of every stage in the winemaking process from the vines to the wine itself," explains Edouard Parinet. "Pouilly-Fuissé is an

appellation in the making, producing wines that fit perfectly with current drinking trends, and which offers a wonderful challenge to me and my young team," he adds.

Of the estate's three cuvées of Pouilly-Fuissé, two are plot selections: Pouilly-Fuissé En Bertilionne and Pouilly-Fuissé Aux Bouthières. All three came to market in January, with the 2016 vintage, the first of the new owners. In 2016, the Domaine des Boutires in Solutré (Saône-et-Loire) was purchased by Jean-Jacques and Edouard Parinet, along with Brice Laffond. This acquisition represents a key part of their trio's project as it brings together five hectares of old vines across the Pouilly-Fuissé appellation.

Pouilly-Fuissé

From the wine-producing region of Vignoble du Mâconnais (Saône-et-Loire).



Elegant and full of charm, this white wine has a colour ranging from pale to deep gold, flecked with green. Different families of aromas make up the bouquet: mineral notes (silex), almond and hazelnut, citrus notes (lemon, grapefruit, and pineapple), white fruits (peaches), bracken, acacia, breadcrumbs, buttered brioche, and honey. In the mouth it is possible to discern the differences between wines from different plots. The texture is

opulent, and the structure, thanks partly to the wine's natural richness, is full of flavour. It is by nature delicate and distinguished. This wine is not to be confused with the Pouilly-Fumé, which comes from the banks of the Loire River.

According to the Bourgogne wine steward

Straightforward, rich and complex, it has a characteristic hint of minerality which allows it to partner noble crustaceans (king prawns, lobster, crawfish) as well as foie gras. With acidity and smoothness so nicely in balance, it goes well with white meats such as veal or poultry in cream sauce, as well as many varieties of goat's cheese. Its aromatic power means it can also match spicy and perfumed exotic dishes such as couscous, fish tajines, or sweet-and-sour prawns. Sushi is also enhanced by its minerality. Serving temperature: 11 to 13°C. *www.bourgogne-wines.com*

Melancholia

"Those who have been eminent in philosophy, politics, poetry, and the arts have all had tendencies toward melancholia," states Aristotle. A melancholic disposition – when it is predominant in a person's character – doesn't necessarily lead to a dark temper, but manifests itself as a need for solitude. It is not so much a desire to be isolated from others, but more to hide away from the turmoil of the world around us.

Melancholia, the Boghossian Foundation's exhibition at the Villa Empain, examines a feeling – manifest in both the East and in the West, and in every era since ancient history – which unremittingly reminds us of a lost origin, and instills in us a sense of mourning for a past world and its bittersweet charm.

This feeling of melancholy remains at the heart of the problems we are confronted with today – irreversible climate change, alarming humanitarian and migration crises, for example – because the world we face is an inevitable cause for concern. The earth we know will

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Crypta Balbi Museum

The Crypta Balbi offers its visitors a historical trip through Rome's past thanks to the excavations carried out on its site. Originally, the Crypta housed a theatre, a block of four apartments and a patio. Built between 19 and 13 BC under Lucius Cornelius Balbus, the theatre had a crypt where people would go during the intermissions of the different plays. Over time, the theatre was forgotten and buried under other constructions. Excavations on the site started in 1981 and twenty years later the remains were opened to the public. The upper floor features objects from the Antiquity and the Middle Ages, and the ground floor presents what was found during the excavation but the basement is the most surprising part of the Crypta, housing the

The Treasure of Antiquity Winckelmann and the Museo Capitolino in eighteenth-century Rome

An exhibition to celebrate the anniversaries of the birth and death of the founder of modern archaeology, Johann Joachim Winckelmann (1717-1768).

The exhibition *The Treasure of Antiquity: Winckelmann and the Museo Capitolino in 18thcentury Rome* intends to celebrate the important winckelmannian anniversaries of 2017 (300 years since birth) and 2018 (250 years after death) and fits into the context of the European events coordinated by the Winckelmann Gesellschaft of Stendal, by the Germanic Archaeological Institute of Rome and by the Vatican Museums.

The exhibition has a dual purpose: the first, to offer visitors the story of the crucial years that led, in December 1733, to the establishment of the Museo Capitolino, the first public museum in Europe, intended not only for conservation but also to the promotion of the "magnificence and splendour of Rome"; the second, presenting the Capitoline sculptures in a different light, or through the intuitions, often brilliant, of the great Winckelmann. *www.museicapitolini.org*

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






God's Own Country

Francis Lee, in his feature directorial debut, helms this British drama film starring Josh O'Connor and Alec Secareanu, in the story of a young sheep farmer in Yorkshire, Johnny Saxby (O'Connor), whose life is transformed by the arrival of a Romanian migrant worker, Gheorghe Ionescu (Secareanu). 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Adina Pintilie Touch Me Not

Federico Grandesso sat down exclusively at the Berlinale with Golden Bear winner Adina Pintilie

Pintilie graduated in 2008 from the National University of Drama and Film Bucharest and her film *Don't Get Me Wrong* (supported by ARTE France, the Romanian Cinema Center and the Romanian National Television) premiered at Locarno 2007.

Together, the filmmaker and her characters venture into a personal story about intimacy. On the fluid border between reality and fiction, the film follows the emotional journeys of Laura, Tomas and Christian, offering a deeply emphatic insight into their lives. Adina, with a very delicate and natural touch, shows us another angle of sexuality applied to three different complex but fascinating individuals fighting an epic internal and external battle. The film also shows the importance of coaching in self-development.

Can you tell me about the objective of film?

The goal of the film is precisely to open the viewer's mind about how intimacy can be experienced, it's just opening a horizon. I was really happy to have such wonderful characters join me in this research, they really wanted to communicate with the audience, for example Christian has a really clear statement about his motivation for participating in the film. have the same rights to sexuality as everyone else. So, I have the right to enjoy my body and to exist as a sexual being – even if my beauty doesn't fit the normal beauty pattern, I'm entitled and I have the right to have my own needs and desires."

How was the process on set and what difficulties did you encounter?

First of all, there was no immediate 'casting' for actors, I was searching for people who were interested in the same area of research that I am, all interested in exploring how intimacy is experienced but in a different way from how we have been educated. The process took several years. I was working more with a documentary procedure, it was more like a laboratory. By the fact that the film explores areas that are usually surrounded by taboos and the fact that the film refuses the conventions of classical storytelling, it is very challenging. It was difficult from a financing perspective – a film that defies conventions is perceived as risky.

How did the shooting of the film go?

We shot in Romania, Bulgaria, partly in Germany, and we also shot with Skype – this was a European project in every respect and the cast was very international. The shooting process was a fusion of real and fictional elements and we worked with a mix of professional and non-professional actors; there was a script which was the basis of a process, so fiction functioned as a sort of safety net for the characters in which we could work with reality and we could explore new elements.

Can you talk about the characters? We know that Laura couldn't bear to be touched, for example. We also see in the film a kind of 'group therapy' that helps the protagonists?

The human story that the main character Laura experienced was mixed like everything else in the film – while the analytical process was real, she really worked with her own anger and met a real

escort who has a blog that expresses his progressive views about the world. Laura is a woman who is attempting to free herself – also, Tomas is in a process of self-exploration and all his interactions that you see are real – we designed the workshop and the coaching following similar real-life experiences.
