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
Serve the City: Spreading **Kindness Across Brussels**

A Global Movement with Local Roots

Though now a global movement active in over 60 cities around the world, Serve the City began in Brussels. It was the brainchild of Carlton Deal, an American who had moved to the city for work. He saw the social issues affecting many people around him and was struck by the gap between those who wanted to help and those who needed it. Deal founded Serve the City as a way to bridge that gap, providing a platform for people to give back to their communities in a meaningful and organized way.

The organization's philosophy is simple: acts of kindness, no matter how small, can transform both the giver and the receiver. Whether it's serving food to the homeless, spending time with the elderly, or organizing clean-up projects, Serve the City encourages vo-

lunteers to get involved in hands-on ways, believing that service can create connections that strengthen communities.

What makes Serve the City stand out is its approach to service as a human connection. Volunteers are encouraged not only to whelp» but to build relationships with those they serve. This personal touch is central to the charity's vision, as it seeks to break down the barriers of isolation and foster a deeper sense of belonging.

Addressing a Range of Social Issues

AREA real estate: a success story

David McGowan met with Charles De Pauw from AREA real estate to discuss his organisation, the real estate market, and what to look out for in 2025



an you tell us the story of AREA real estate? What motivated you to create this enterprise?

My family has been pioneers in real estate in Belgium since the 1960s, my grandfather, dad, and uncle developed the northern quarter, a business area In Brussels, such as the WTC towers, the "Manhattan district" if you will at the start of the 70s. I began work as a commercial director specialising in the residential areas. There was a law in the 80s, for every square metres, we had

to construct X number of properties. When family activities stopped for a bit, I decided to launch my proper promotional real estate company, that specialised in high quality residential real estate.

How has the vision of AREA real estate evolved since the birth of the organisation?

In the beginning we started with luxury houses, then we went into apartments in luxury areas, so Uccle, Woluwe, centre of town. Today we specialise in apartment blocks of 50 or 60 more. We do mixed projects, small units, anywhere from 50 square metres and above to 150 square metres penthouses.

What distinguishes AREA real estate from the other real estate agencies in the European market?

To say there's a difference, there isn't much. Every promoter has his or her battle horse, our projects are more for high quality, luxury, less for investors but more for people who own or already exploit their apartment.

How do you see the current real estate market in Europe?

Europe is difficult to say, in Brussels, it stays a stable market. Brussels remains an attractive place. Deals are much slower here now because prices of property have risen due to interest rates and the heightening cost of raw materials.

What challenges do you see in the real estate market in the 5 years?

What's important today is to do more eco projects that consume less, so occupants have a minimum of charges. Triple A ratings are key too, but triple A for accessibility too. Our next projects will be focused on accessibility. Our new projects in Woluwe saint lambert are there for example it has a better accessibility to the centre of town than say Uccle.

So you invest in property, but do you construct it too?

Yes, we have the licence, we develop it, it's difficult to obtain construction licences, as they receive complaints from local authorities. Permits are difficult to obtain.

Could you tell us about your next project you're working on?

We have a new project called W56, it's a project that has a large emphasis on the Natura 2000 area of the woods, it borders the

Woluwe park, it connects the park and other green places. For it's a remarkable situation, it's well located. The new construction will have 29 apartments, 1 commercial area and a car park underground. It's at the place St lambert, boulevard de la Wolu, people can do everything by foot. Today, and around that area, a lot of former office space is being converted into living apartments, the accessibility is perfect.

How do you see the evolution of technology in the real estate game, and what innovations are AREA real estate exploring?

Theres lots of technology out there, what's for sure is that we're looking at technology that diminishes the charges of apartments.

We work with solar panels, the recuperation of lost water through tanks, heat pumps, good insulation. All of this is part of an acoustic study. Our new apartment blocks are across a boulevard with lots of traffic, our goal is to see how we can reduce the level of noise pollution that enters our buildings. The technology is here.

Where do you see the greatest chances of growth of the European Real estate market?

Europe is big, I'm more specialised in Brussels and Luxembourg. I think big cities are developing, there is such a high demand in big cities, all big cities are looking at bringing people who live outside, into towns. The mayors are pushing for good quality of life in the centre of town as those who live outside. The closure of the Bois de la Cambre, the closure of the Bois de Boulogne, closure of la rue Rivoli you see it more often in Brussels and Paris. More green cities, less cars, more bikes, more public transport, this is

still growing in Brussels, it brings a few problems for this generation who have to witness these new works in Brussels however to accommodate this change.

What continues to nurture your passion for real estate?

Listen I was born in this business, it's a family business, what's sure is to create something is awesome, to tell yourself after some years to see results, to see buildings built and to see people who live together and build families in these places, it's a beautiful feeling. I help people and I know that every Belgian has a brick in his heart to build or want to build his or her dream living space. To help my town grow is such a good feeling.

When will the Woluwe buildings be completed?

June 2026. It's a long process, there's many licences, the entire building was destroyed and rebuilt. There's a mix of small and big apartments in this next project.

What has been the most gratifying project you have seen at AREA real estate?


My Uncle, father and Grandad, had the luck of building towers, the WTC towers, it was the Manhattan centre. I've never had the chance to build towers, but I have had the chance to renovate and collaborate with Jean Duvelles, in the Ixelles area, it was to renovate a classical building.


What advice would you give to young people wanting to become real estate agents or set up their own business?

Patience. The licences are difficult to obtain in Brussels, you need patience. To think about the new technologies and what people need, to anticipate trends, and to inform yourself about the different demands needed by the commune for building projects. Every project I look at I think, "I must be able to live in this." Every apartment is studied as if a person on my team is going to be living there. •

With the indices of many financial markets sky-high, the air gets thin. What to watch out for by year-end and into 2025?

Dave Deruytter gives *Together Magazine* a heads up on financial markets for 2025.



It has been a bonanza for many financial markets since the fall-out year 2022. Back then inflation soared driven by the start of the Russian invasion in Ukraine, and there was the subsequent sharp increase in energy prices, particularly of gas in Europe. Still, having almost solved the energy issue in the meantime, even in Europe inflation has come down again to near the 2% range, favoured by the ECB. Subsequently, interest rates in Euro are starting to decline.

A slow-down in the world economy has been forecasted in the news for many quarters now, but it did not yet materialise, at least not in full. Economies around the globe showed resilience, not in the least because of lavish government spending. The latter has led to very high levels of government debt to GDP ratios in many countries. It is questionable whether that is sustainable, and how it can be reduced to normal levels without hurting economic growth.

If there is one big economy struggling for some time already, it seems to be the Chinese one. Trade and geopolitical issues are at the basis of that, on top of a fragile local real estate market. Consumer confidence is low in result.

In Europe it is the German economy that is not on a strong footing. Exports to China are important for Germany, but there is also the local political instability that is ne-

gatively impacting consumer confidence. The US economy has been steaming ahead quite strongly over the past few years. But even there the recent figures point to a slowdown, particularly the labour market is weakening. Interest rates in USD may come down soon too.

The most recent and strong power behind the rise of the financial markets has been all the buzz around Al. The likes of NVIDIA. OpenAl (ChatGPT) and their copycats are driving the frenzy on the tech side. Still, from early July to early August 2024 the NAS-DAQ 100 index lost over 15 percent of its value before bouncing back. It was a major correction and it may not be the last one. Al definitely has great potential for the business world, but it still needs to show up in the mainstream economy and in the financial results of the "common" companies. Geopolitical instability keeps on lingering on and the US presidential election outcome is uncertain, as are the policies the new US president will want to pursue. In Europe far right political parties are polling strongly and put the EU to the test.

There is a lot of volatility and change in the world, on many fronts, for investors to digest. If you keep on investing according to your investor profile and time horizon, things should be ok though. But you have to accept the consequences of your choices. Money you think you may need in 1 year time or less, is probably better kept on a high yielding savings account. If interest rates come down, mortgages rates should come down too, giving way to opportunities in the real estate market.

Al is probably a stayer in business, but it will not go up in a linear way. What is needed now is widespread adoption of Al in the mainstream businesses leading to cost reductions, new products and increased sales. If Al could already be a useful assis-

tant to many workers, that would take the pressure off the labour market and thus of wage inflation. The biggest cost of many companies is their labour cost. Commercial real estate is a second big source of cost for companies, but there prices are already softer due to the hybrid way of working leading to less need for office space.

Free trade is also an important factor for global growth in wealth. The tense trade relation between the US and China plus the geopolitical issues on many fronts are not helping global free trade at all. Protectionism, in any form, is an important risk to the efficient use of capital and talent around the world. And when mingled with geopolitics, the US - China stress on Taiwan (China Taipei) for example, that becomes a quite risky cocktail.

Thus, more peace in geopolitics, and trust and rule based global cooperation in trade,

R&D and business development, are to be watched for, on top of AI entering the mainstream business yielding its promise of efficiency and innovation. There are no safe havens. Every choice has its advantages and disadvantages. That is why the portfolio theory states that diversification of investments leads to a higher return and lower risk (in the long run). Some investors play on liquidity (reducing or increasing their risk appetite), others bet on the next big thing in innovation (AI), others believe in real estate as the ultimate investment category, even others believe in the sustainability transformation needed to save the planet (and ourselves). The US Inflation Reduction Act is, at least in part, aimed at the latter, in the EU the Green Deal does pretty much the same. If you don't know what to invest in, you might just as well buy an index tracker or a few of them.





Technology


Claire O'Sullivan on two books that inspire


'The Culture Map' by Erin Meyer

This book is a must-read for anyone living or working in an international environment, 'The Culture Map' will help you reassess some of your assumptions about how colleagues and managers are communicating with you. It can inspire you to improve your self-awareness of your own communication style so that you can work more effectively with teams composed of people from different backgrounds and reduce misunderstandings.

According to Meyer, while we may like to consider ourselves as unique individuals, our exposure to different cultures through our upbringing and experience may also play a subconscious role in shaping how we view our interactions with others. Understanding this can help us become more skilled at cross-cultural communication and may be key to improving our professional performance.

Meyer's book considers various dimensions of culture using a framework of eight different behavioural scales, and provides insights as to how two cultures' relative place on these scales can influence how they are perceived by one another. For example, whether it's more common for decisions to be made via a top-down (manager decides) or bottom-up (decision by consensus) process; or whether direct or nuanced language is more appropriate when communicating via email; or the extent to which trust is primarily built based on relationships or is solely based on work results.

Meyer is clear that using this approach is not an excuse to stop paying attention to individual personalities. The goal is not to promote cultural stereotypes or clichés, but rather to empower people to better understand other cultural business norms when working in international teams or organisations.



What's more, organisations often operate according to a combination of their own specific communication and behavioural expectations. Many even build this into their organizational design and explicitly communicate this to employees through internal guides. The norms of a law firm can differ significantly from the etiquette in a non-profit, for example.

Whatever scenario you're faced with, this book provides a useful framework for thinking about culture that can help you to more flexibly adapt to different professional environments, so you can collaborate effectively and achieve your goals. The narrative style makes for easy reading, combining clear examples of different types of miscommunication with straightforward analysis of the underlying causes and practical suggestions to achieve better outcomes when working in multicultural teams.

Continuing the Legacy: **Ado Chale**

Michael Beadling met Pierre and Ilona Chale to discuss Ado Chales work and upcoming expo at the Solvay Stables in Brussels

he sky is grey and overcast, and I'm worried it's going to rain as I dismount my bicycle looking for the famous Ado Chale studio around Avenue Louise. The weather could not be more Belgian unless it rained.

Coming up to a studio I see a pensive man wearing stained trousers smoking a rolled-up cigarette and sipping a morning coffee outside, I admittedly almost mistake him for a builder. He is no builder however, this is sculptor and designer Pierre Chale, son of Ado Chale, the legendary Belgian designer, who left an indelible mark on the world of furniture and domestic objects with his unique ability to blend art and nature.

We greet and enter the back of the studio as Pierre gives me a quick tour before we begin our interview, and I'm immediately struck and in awe of the size and beauty of some of the visibly timeless art works on display. Huge 400 kilo sized tables made of bronze

adorn the walls along with other objects made of precious minerals. Ado Chales iconic use of precious stones, metals, and organic materials resulted in works that are as functional as they are sculptural, evoking the raw beauty of the natural world through textures, patterns, and forms.

Today, Chale's children have taken up the mantle, continuing the family legacy while navigating the challenges and opportunities of modern design. In a recent interview, they opened up about growing up with their father, how they honour his vision, and their aspirations for the future.

How long have you been at this studio for?

"I grew up in this studio, it's been in my family since the 1980s" said Pierre. "My father, now 96, still lives above us, he is surrounded by his family here. I have taken on my fathers work and today I design, build and restore new and previously sold artworks, whilst my sister Ilona takes more care of the public relations side of the business" he added. Pierre points to the endless racks of carefully arranged buckets containing random stones and minerals on the side of the wall that look like something from a geology


department or an archaeological dig site, "Nothing has changed here much since I took over 6 years ago" said Pierre. At this point, his sister Ilona joined us, and we sat in the main living room as I began to ask more questions over coffee.

Before I began, I was struck by a curious looking item on the wall in front of me. I asked them both, what is this and what is it made of? "It's an artwork of mine made of bone," replies Pierre. "My background is in sculpture and design and my favourite material to work with is bone, it is a lot more difficult to work with than stone" he added. I had to ask slightly worried, "what kind of bone?" afraid that it may be human. He smiled "we get that question a lot, I can assure you it's not human" chuckles Pierre.

Your father, Ado Chale, is known for his deep connection to the natural world in his designs. How did growing up around his work shape your own understanding of design and nature?

"Design not really, I just see detail, contours, he taught us to observe what is close. He never saw himself as a designer, this was never part of his vocabulary and wasn't a proper term in the 1960s, he was an artisan

of material, whatever he found, to create objects from nature" said Pierre. "He started from nothing and developed his art from nothing and just from his imagination. Myself and my brother grew up at different times of his life, but his vision of what he wanted to create never changed" said Ilona.

In continuing Ado Chale's legacy, how do you balance honouring his original vision with bringing your own creative voices into the designs?

"I try to respect his creations as much as possible, however I'm an interpreter of his work, we have a slight difference in approach, everyone has a different look on things" said Pierre. When creating works, especially with stone, the more you do it, the more you realise every stone has a different feel, cut, how the material reacts to where you want to take it, stone by stone. It's an arduous process making a table from beginning to end, it can take months" he added.

Do you still create tailor models for prospective clients?

"Yes, we do tailored orders. I try to interpret their vision" said Pierre. No Ado Chale table is ever the same and if we at the studio receive a table that needs renovating that was sold years ago, then we carefully renovate it in the same manner as it was built" he added.

How do you think your father's work has influenced the broader design community in Belgium and internationally, and what responsibility do you feel in maintaining that influence?

"What Ado Chale brought to the design world was the liberty of forms, he started with round or rectangular tables, and then he started to do all his designs by hand. Mixing various art forms such as contemporary with classical with regards to tables and other objects is one of his greatest marks" said Pierre. "I would also add the mosaic aspect of it" added Ilona. "He didn't invent it,



but he created a new way to do liberal forms in mosaic, very recognisable, the teardrop, the tripod stand, that you can see in modern design. With regard to tables, he opened up a door for the liberty of expression when it comes to design" she added.

What challenges have you faced in continuing Ado Chale's work, particularly in a modern world that is increasingly focused on sustainability and ethical sourcing of materials?

"Ado Chale tables are 'life proof', when the atomic bomb goes off they will still be here" chuckled Pierre. "These are the tables that will last for life. We stay true to the materials used in previous Ado Chale tables and look to source as responsibly as possible" said llona.

Are there specific pieces or collections created by your father that resonate with you personally? How have these influenced your direction in continuing his body of work?

"There are stones that are nicer than others, when I was little, I resonated strongly with a stone called "tiger eye", I still love it, each person has a different stone they prefer. "Malachite, a type of green stone, is a lo-



vely stone to work with too, I see that a lot in his pieces. Some stones have a better aura than others." Pierre stated. "Hematite is one of my favourites," said llona. "It's a black stone that vibes well, contains a lot of iron, sometimes looks a deep red. I've always loved the deepness of the colours. I love the tables made from peppercorns too, they are special, the pepper corns are all hand selected. These ideas are genius. It's the poetry of Ado Chales work that touches me the most." said Ilona.

What is the most important lesson your father taught you about working with precious stones, metals, and organic ma-

terials, and how has that influenced your approach to crafting new pieces?

"One word. The 'dream' and the notion of work, he was plunged into his work but to him it was never really work because he enjoyed every second of it. Another key word that comes to mind is wonder and imagination" said llona. "Each stone is a world of its own in a mosaic, one's gaze is fixated on these stones" said Pierre. "One of the hallmarks of Ado Chale's designs is his use of rare and precious materials, particularly stones and metals. These materials are notoriously difficult to work with, but they are also what gives Chale's work its distinctive, luxurious feel" added Pierre.

Do you collaborate as a family on the creative process, or does each of you bring a different perspective to maintaining and evolving the Ado Chale brand? "It's not a brand, each piece is a unique work of art. Every table is different, no Ado

Chale table is the same" said Pierre. Myself and Pierre are always of the same idea and wavelength, we respect as much as possible our fathers original designs, but most importantly, its respect for each other" said Ilona. "There is an interpretation, but fundamentally we take decisions as a family. We have the same eye on things, and we usually have similar ideas" said Pierre.

What's the future Ado Chale

"Our father is still here, we're accompanying him through life. We can't really comment on that question, where we go. The tables we do now, we do now, the future is now, and that's it haha" said Pierre.

How many expositions or retrospectives do you do?

"Few. The last one was in 2017 at the BOZAR. We had a different array of tables and other sculpted objects from the studio. You can find everything in this book" said Ilona.

A Lasting Legacy

As Pierre and Ilona Chale continue to build on his remarkable legacy, they do so with a deep respect for the man who taught them not only about design but about life. «Our father's work is more than just furniture or objects,» they concluded. «It's a philosophy, a way of seeing the world. We feel privileged to be able to carry that forward» Ilona stated. In an era where design trends come and go, the enduring influence of Ado Chale's work — and the family that continues it — serves as a reminder that the most profound design is rooted in something timeless: a deep, abiding connection to the natural world.

The coming exposition at the Stables of the Hotel Solvay Brussels (Rue Lens 36, 1050) from the 18th of October to the 26th of November will showcase an array of Ado Chales remarkable tables and objects to the Belgian public and the international community. •





Brussels and figurative art: Yves Gobart

Michael Beadling met with local artist Yves Gobart to talk more about the Etterbeek Artist Trail, what inspires him, figurative art and life in Brussels



or two days a year in Brussels, the city of Etterbeek, in partnership with the local commune and artists, celebrate the annual Etterbeek Artist Trail (Parcours d'Artistes d'Etterbeek). From October 4th to 6th 2024, local artists open their workshops to the public, allowing all to explore vibrant local art scenes and galleries. One can enjoy unique exhibitions, workshops and live per-

formances, celebrating creativity and community in the dynamic neighbourhood. Together Magazine interviewed Yves Gobart, a participating artist, to discuss his work.

Yves can you tell me a bit about yourself, your background and what drove you to become an artist and your art and its style?



"I'm not going to give you my CV, but when you realise as a kid that you spend a lot time drawing pictures in the margins of your text books, the question is quickly answered." said Yves. "I stumbled upon some great professors who pushed me in the right direction, I started at l'Ecole des Arts Appliques Olivier de Serres, France, a public school, where I gained my formative training on various types of art, how to study, compose and really look at images. I started with architecture, quickly understood it wasn't my thing however. I then applied for a competition to enter this prestigious art school, les Beaux-Arts de Paris, and I won! I've been an artist ever since and my specialty today is drawing and painting" added Yves.

What was your first major influence in art?

"One of the first artists that left a big impression on me was Jean Marc Reiser. He would do satirical sketches in magazines for the likes of Charlie Hebdo, the old school Charlie Hebdo different to what it is now" said

Yves. His works were very simple, 3 or 4 line drawings so messy they looked borderline abstract, but they explained complex topics clearly and were hilarious. My first contact with his images was through magazines or newspapers, there were no such things as museums or books on art where I lived growing up in Buzançais, Indre, France" added Yves.

Can you tell me a bit more about the themes in your work, subjects such as shelters, ghosts, donkeys, landscapes and accidents, what does it all mean for you? "A friend once called me "incomplete by nature and hybrid by accident". Incomplete by nature is a term for any artist, the creation, from your own means, the ego from the Greeks, that were all meant to be running after this to create balance within our own minds" said Yves.

"Hybrid by accident refers to the way I collect pieces of images from one place and stick them onto another and create a diffe-

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rent hidden meaning. Yves then pointed to one of his works on the wall, the subject is a make shift tent in the woods used by prostitutes to entertain clients titled 'Little Home Sweet Home'. "The tent structure in the middle of the forest for example, those are a direct critique of the difficulty of society that manifests itself in front of us, but also the beauty of the objects, the strangeness of the objects, you have the mixture of man made plastic in a forest setting, it shouldn't exist naturally, its perplexing and that's only humanity that's been able to do that" said Yves.

"This falls into a greater theme called the drape. The subject of the drape is very important in these paintings, the flow of the drape is a science within itself. Paint is a pigment mixed with liquid and gives the illusion of something that is a cloth, the mass, the light, the volume. The same detail can be seen within my paintings on plastic tents in the woods. When my colleague says 'hybrid by accident' I think he may also be referring to my habit of placing donkey heads on human bodies, like a chimera effect" stated Yves.

Can you tell me a bit more about the donkeys? Why this animal?

"Why donkeys? Well donkeys are from the countryside, I am from Berry / France, a very agricultural village, you see them often, so it resonates with me. Donkeys are very calm, gentle creatures. It was probably one of the first animals I ever sketched in nature. I can do human faces and portraits too but I'm more interested in creating chimeras. Chimeras distort the vision one has on the image, look at the picture here (Yves points to the portrait of the two chimeras paddling a canoe in the forest titled 'Le Théâtre des Opérations) you don't know if its dangerous, accommodating, pleasant. But you know they're paddling, that's all you know. So what I'm actually doing is not attracting attention, but discussing intention. Intention,

not attention" says Yves. "Back to your original question on donkeys however, they're docile and lovely animals, and I'm sure they will inherit the earth or at least still be here once humanity has gone" chuckled Yves.

You have been in Brussels for 6-7 years now, how has the city, art scene, or its cultural atmosphere influenced your work over the years?

"I love Brussels compared to other European cities like Paris or Berlin, in Brussels you have the cradle of Flemish renaissance art just round the corner (Flemish masters), Brugge, Ghent, Holland, these are 'painter towns' said Yves, "People here understand and know paintings, when I lived in Paris it wasn't the same thing. In Belgium you easily find gorgeous wall paintings you just need to open your eyes. When I was an art student at the beau arts in the 1990s, there was no hype around my craft as a painter, 'figurative art' so to speak was dead it was all about contemporary art, I had to fight to make a living and do what I'm doing with figurative painting today" said Yves.

Do you prefer working in Brussels or Paris?

"Brussels for all the reasons I'd previously explained being a painter's town, and the beer is cheaper here. I go to Paris now just as a tourist" said Yves.

Congratulations on the previous encore & encore expo in Schaerbeek, can you tell me a bit more about it and how did it go during the event?

"The expo went well. Its proof of the demand and popularity for figurative art in Brussels. The curator and director of the artistic programme of the house of art in Schaerbeek, Anne-Cécile Maréchal, had this idea in mind for a while to assemble a group of artists around the theme of rituals, so I joined" said Yves. "The expo centred around the theme of repetition in art and life, my ritual as a figurative painter is to use tubes of paint,

hence my collection on tubes of paint" (Yves points to the 12 or so miniature paintings of highly detailed tubes of paint that were part of his previous expo). "There were some big names in that expo, like Roman Opalka. He used to write numbers everyday from one to infinity, the man ritualised every aspect of his work and life until his death" said Yves. "I was proud to be a part of this expo, to be associated with such names but also the quality of the art and material on show, it was fascinating, I'm very grateful to the commune of Schaerbeek and Cecile. It opened up some horizons and gave me an ego boost" said Yves.

In terms of sales, what is your biggest market? Is it Belgium?

"Belgium mainly, Brussels, Antwerp, a bit everywhere. As an artist, unless your international, you focus on where you're based. I strongly focus on where I'm based. Belgium has a great art scene" said Yves.

When is your next expo?

"Next week, its open days for the studio in Etterbeek where I paint, there's the Etterbeek Artists Trial, anyone can come in and check out my work and have a drink or just chill with other artists who are taking part" said Yves. "Otherwise, I'm trying to prepare a new series for the end of the year" he added. I asked, "more chimaeras?". Yes, more chimeras Yves responded.

Joker: Folie à Deux, hit or miss?


Together Magazine takes a look at the hype around the blockbuster coming to a screen near you this October

▼oaquin Phoenix is a wonderful web of contradictions. Arriving to our interview, we find him sporting a messy beard and longish hair; and yet in every word, every syllable, there is a ruggedly handsomeness.

He wears faded jeans and a dark jacket, yet could easily pass for someone who has stepped directly off the Louis Vuitton runway. Even the fact that the Puerto Rico-born actor sits perfectly in midlife - 50 in October his persona, posturing and general cloaked demeanour mean he's as youthful as he was a decade or two ago when appearing in such movies as Ladder 49, or Walk the Line, for which he earned an Oscar nomination.

Beyond that, he also received nomination nods from the Academy for his performance in Gladiator,

in 2001; and again in 2013 for *The Master*. Finally, in 2020, *Joker* saw him take the ultimate prize, and the expectation behind a follow-up has been so intense that many, already, are pointing at *Joker: Folie à Deux* as having the potential for further honours.

How did you feel about returning to the character of Arthur Fleck in *Joker: Folie à Deux?*

Coming back to Arthur Fleck was like revisiting an old friend who you know too well. There's this undeniable connection I feel with him, not because he's a villain, but because there's something so raw, so human about his descent into madness.

When Todd [Phillips, the film's director] and I first talked about the sequel, we both agreed it had to be something truly unique, something that wasn't just a continuation but a transformation. Arthur's journey is far from over, and Folie à Deux allowed us to explore an entirely new facet of his psyche.

What were your thoughts on incorporating musical elements into this sequel?

Initially, I wasn't sure how music would fit into this world. Arthur's world is so grounded in grit and reality that the idea of breaking into song seemed almost absurd.

Yet that's what intrigued me. Todd pitched it not just as a musical, but as a psychological journey where the music isn't just a performance; it's a manifestation of Arthur's inner turmoil. It's chaotic, disjointed, and beautiful in its madness, much like Arthur himself. Lady Gaga's involvement added a layer of complexity, and her approach to Harley Quinn through this lens was something I knew would be special.

How do you view the relationship between Arthur Fleck and Harley Quinn in this film?

Their relationship is central to the idea of 'folie à deux', this shared madness. Arthur

and Harley are two people who find solace in their brokenness, but instead of healing each other, they spiral further down together. It's a twisted love story where their bond is both toxic and oddly comforting. Gaga brought an incredible depth to Harley, and our scenes together felt like we were constantly teetering on the edge of something either beautiful or horrifying.

What challenges did you face while filming this sequel?

Physically and emotionally, it was more demanding than the first film. Arthur is in a different place now, and the energy I had to bring to the character was different, more erratic. There were scenes where I felt like I was losing myself in Arthur's madness, especially during the musical sequences. Todd's direction pushed me to places I hadn't gone before. Every day felt like a new challenge, but that's what makes this project so exhilarating.

Can you describe the atmosphere on set, especially with the new cast additions like Lady Gaga?

The atmosphere was intense but also incredibly creative. Gaga brought a new energy to the set, one that was both playful and intense. There was this mutual respect and understanding that we were doing something that hadn't been done before. We all knew we were pushing boundaries—not just of the genre, but of our own performances. It was a collaborative process where everyone was contributing ideas, and Todd was the maestro conducting this orchestra of madness.

What do you hope audiences will take away from *Joker: Folie à Deux*?

I hope they leave the theatre questioning what they've just witnessed. This film isn't about providing answers; it's about asking difficult questions. It's about confronting the parts of ourselves that we'd rather keep hidden. Arthur's story is not just his; it's a

reflection of society, of how we treat those who are different, and of what happens when we ignore the warning signs. If people walk away feeling unsettled, then we've done our job.

These quotes give insight into Phoenix's experience and thoughts on reprising his role as Arthur Fleck in a sequel that pushes boundaries by blending psychological drama with musical elements.

You're described as a deep-thinking, philosophical actor. Would you agree with that description?

It's all relative. Am I a deep-thinker compared to other people? Perhaps. But to me I am just me – it's natural to feel this way and to think the way I do; and it would feel unnatural if I was to feel any different.

Has this ability to consider the world around you, at length, influenced your faith?

Well my faith comes from a place where I am connected to the world. It comes from the exchanges with fellow people, it comes from breathing in fresh air, from art, from rationing and reasoning. You might say they are the building blocks of most religions, but for me it is a private exchange that reflects and respects the world around me.

Do you struggle to come to terms with life and its realities?

Yes, I think so. Certainly more than others do, although perhaps not as much as I used to. I am difficult to please and am certainly not someone you would describe as easygoing. I am hard on myself, but it is that attitude that has always led me to push harder and reach higher in attaining what I believe is satisfaction.

With that in mind then, does acting become easier with age or maybe more difficult, because you know more about life? By the same token, does life become easier with age?

I don't know if it's that you know more about life. I think you are affected by pressing all your time into the thing and I think that that starts wearing you, on some people, and for me it does. I have always said that I always wanted to be a child actor, but as a result I missed a time when you are totally naïve to all the extra stuff that goes into making a movie.

And so in some ways you are battling against that, battling against people being fucking sick of you, battling against you being sick of yourself, and in some ways I think it can get more difficult, but my appreciation for making movies I think has increased, as has my appreciation for life.

You came from a religious family, right?

Yes my parents were Jewish. They used religion's values as a backdrop for living normal lives. They weren't entrenched in the whole thing, but the morals and principles were present throughout.

How important were those to you?

They were important in the sense that our upbringing was done on the right path, but I think we can sometimes credit religion too much, or credit basic humanity too little.



I like the idea of faith working as a guide, but faith is a biproduct of the soul, and we should be proud of ourselves for making good decisions, rather than attributing those directly to the church. By the same token, we don't label – or we shouldn't label – bad actions on bad preaching. Some people are just inherently good, or inherently bad.

Is modern religion still relevant then?

Of course. I think the portrayal of the Bible is so important these days. Firstly, we are living in an evidence culture, where the directive is to seek affirmation of everything that exists around us. That is the trend right now.

A part of me feels that as time goes on we will tire of always trying to put hard proof behind ideas. As human beings, our passion for detachment, for fantasy, for faith, will always come back round. It is the way we have been for thousands of years, and it isn't something Twitter will stop, despite the efforts of some people on there.

So the Bible will reestablish itself as a tool – and by that I mean not just as a guide for those who want to live to a prescribed doctrine and take comfort from that, but as a reminder of what I am sure we will look back over as happier times where trust, belief and the magic of life is represented by a book that dates back to when we had very little else in our lives.

It's essential we hold on to anything that offers a simpler, more forgiving version of our existences – a less chaotic version of, well, chaos.

But in terms of self-forgiveness, you are still you own worst critic?

Of course. Always. It's impossible for me to ever see the work the way anyone else does; it's absolutely impossible. My career is nothing but memories and I am never, ever going to be satisfied, I am only going to see things that I could improve on. •

Exclusive interview with Belgian filmmaker Fabrice Du Welz

Together Magazine sat down in Lido at the Venice Film Festival for an exclusive interview with Belgian filmmaker Fabrice Du Welz who presented his film Maldoror out of competition

The film is inspired by the judicial scandal surrounding Belgian serial killer and child molester Marc Dutroux. It stars Anthony Bajon as a young policeman who becomes obsessed with a case involving a notorious child abuser.

What changed according to you in Belgium, in Charleroi, between the 90's and the present?

The perception is still sensitive and delicate, because it's very emotional for Belgian people, especially from that region. Of course, the youngest don't know exactly how the story is articulated. I was 20 at the time, it was just like a TV series at the time, every night, every day we had some news: it was unbelievable to hear about all that. I think the perception is different but it's still very emotional in the Belgian soul, it's like it's being "eaten a piece of their soul". That's why in making the film I tried the most honest approach, to avoid sensationalism, to provoke something in the Belgian viewers

- mostly them because they are connected to that story - through the crude and provocative approach, to stimulate a catharsis.

What is the perception of this underworld that was behind the case?

I don't know, I'm a filmmaker. I spend time reading and documenting myself to try the right approach. What I wanted to make clear about those guys is the lack of moral values: kidnapping a kid is the same as stealing a bottle of water. Something happened in the higher society that I don't know but, in the movie, I wanted to stay in the Paul Chartier character most of the time: it's always about what he sees, that's an element to articulate the story.

Which difficulties did you encounter in a movie like this one?

In my country, there is a general embarrassment about that story. People know that there is something beyond the imprisonment of that criminal, I'm not a conspiracy theorist. If you have a brain that functions properly, if you read the documentation, you will know that there is at least a network. In Belgium, there is a feeling of incompletion, a shame about that story being seen by the rest of the world. To embrace this subject is a great responsibility and I at least tried to provoke a catharsis in my country, that's why the ending is a bit different from the real story. People can recognize themselves by thinking about what justice could be, or at least a reflection of it.

About the sources of what happened and how Belgium reacted. There is a part about a Sicilian guy that says "In my country, they kill...(?)" When you put that segment into the movie, did you think it could have been much more aggressive?

I tried to make a good film. When I was 20 years old I heard many people say that kind of thing, I remember my father saying that thing, at the dining table, watching the news. It always shocked me, because I am

not a defender of the death penalty, I'm totally against it - as a human being should be -. The theme in that movie is "justice", when justice fails what can you do? That's the whole film, what is the essence of evil? Is it the urge of some lunatic or misinformation, a dysfunctional justice system? When you have no other choices and the justice that we built as a society fails, what can you do? I only ask the question.

As it happens in the end to the policeman, the solution seems to be going against the rules, to find justice. Is this what the character is thinking?

I was interested in that question. That's why we built that context at the beginning of the film, a context in which there is a strong community, with some values and empathy. The protagonist had a distorted idea of justice, he thought that if he was on the right side he was going to be okay. But even after becoming a cop he realized that everything is corrupt and then you face all the difficulties that come with the corruption, obsession comes as a consequence. What can you do? I don't know, I don't have the answers, just questions.

You met one of the cops working at that time. How was it?

We approached the movie as a documentary, we were very informed and meticulous about the story. We stuck to the reality of things; I didn't want to make something cinematic. I wanted the raw, authentic aspect. I met a lot of different people, many of those were in the movie, they helped us to learn about the different aspects of their gestures, their behaviour, and the way they talked. There were so many clans, and many different communities and all of them cohabitated with each other: the approach was very intriguing. I wanted to be very documented. •

Interview with Oscar winning Director Oliver Stone

Federico Grandesso sat down on the Croisette in Cannes with Oscar winner Director Oliver Stone to discuss the documentary Lula, co-directed with Robert S. Wilson.

The two directors explore the rise, fall and triumphant return to power of an out-of-the-ordinary politician after 19 months in prison. What happened to Brazilian President Lula who had to fight a legal battle, seems to be a more sophisticated evolution of an age-old tactic of creating a scandal to eliminate another political opponent. Was that basically what it is?


Well, you have to trace history to find that out because it takes so many different forms. It seems like a new way of fighting, getting rid of a candidate. It looks like the scandals with the media, the power of the media, and in Brazil, the power of the prosecuting attorneys. It's a likely event. Once you get support from the media, the media is very free to judge. You look at America now, they judge, it's easy to get a mandate against Trump, and you


have a lot of support. Then the issue is that facts are hard to come by, but the goal is to divide the working class like they've done in America, and they've done a pretty good job of it since Vietnam in my lifetime. Frankly, it's an old trick, if you think back to the days of Pinkerton, the corporations were getting bigger and bigger, and they hired Pinker-

tons who were working-class people, and they divided, paid them better, and they got scabs, too, to come in, break the union. It's been going on a long time, that's how you run, and you get power.

You have been working on Lula for a long time. Were you waiting for something?

I met him in 2009 when I did my documen-

VID. So later, that year, December of 2021, is when we finally interviewed him, Glenn and the rest of the people in the film.

I'm curious to know if at any point you've thought of talking to someone at the Brazilian opposition.

I would have loved to talk to Bolsonaro, I've

heard what he said. He called them all these names: Liar and Traitor. They have a presence in the film, and I think even a Bolsonaro supporter could see the film I feel like it was, especially at the ending, the emotion between the two sides, it feels like we were at least fair to the humanity of both positions.

Did you ask Lula to meet Bolsonaro?

No. We took the point of view that we were going to get to know Lula. It's guite a story. It's an amazing experience. If you think about modern politics, who do you know who's been a labourer union or came from those classes? Who? Nobody that I can think of, even in the African continent. They tend to be soldiers, or they tend to come up through a system of some kind. Who do we know who worked as a labourer, remembers where they came from and still hearkens back to that era and tries to bring people up behind them? Lula then is probably one of the sanest people in the world. I think he should have a bigger place on the world stage. But I don't think the United States is in favour of him. I don't think they want him around. They'd love to see him go. No question, in my opinion, he's too important as an example of what's possible.

From the South of the border, you are coming back to talking about the South American leader. How do you feel close to those leaders from South America? Are you interested in them?

I can say that, but I'm not an expert on South America, but I do end up going because I agree with the aspirations, and I see how the United States smothered those, helped to smother, so many of those aspirations. The United States's relationship with these countries, whether it's Russia, South America, or Egypt, is very peculiar. The United States cannot misbehave, and it does misbehave. It does assume that it has the right to intervene in any foreign affair. Now we're on the border of Russia, there's no end, no li-

mit to this. It's a very dangerous time. That's also the importance of President Lula, he fought for peace on the world stage, trying to broker a peace arrangement, it was very courageous, nobody else is doing that. Do you remember? Schroeder and Chirac came out against the American invasion of Iraq, and they were ignored.

Do you think that the re-election of Trump is inevitable?

I don't know what's going to happen, frankly. It keeps it interesting, I mean, it's common in our democracy that these are our two political choices and that any alternative is strangled in the cradle. I'm for Kennedy. I think he was the only one who was always been right, he was at least telling the truth. About things he knew. He was not always right, but I think most of the time he's been right. He's a man of peace. John Kennedy was the last President who used to talk about peace. I haven't heard pretty much in the last eight presidencies about keeping the peace of the world thinking about the other guy and what they're thinking or getting along. Coexistence was a great word.

The film says quite literally that Lula was not a socialist but a pragmatist. Can you explain that?

They were comparing him to Bernie Sanders in that. It was like Bernie Sanders versus Donald Trump, although I think Lula is more of a pragmatist than Bernie Sanders, which is accurate. As a Bernie Sanders supporter, I see the strength and admire Lula more.

Have you ever received a no for an interview or had a negative experience some an important leader?

I received a no from Turkish President Erdogan then I think the worst interview I ever had was with the Cambodian Prime Minister Hun Sen. •

Watches & Absinthe: Switzerland

Michael Beadling went to Neuchâtel to taste absinthe and ask: does character start on your wrist?



eep Dive into Swiss Watchmaking I was 598km away from Brussels this summer, in the beautiful canton of Neuchatel, Switzerland. We are at 1000m in elevation and the air is crisp as we begin our tour of the city, a mecca for watch enthusiasts since the dawn of the 17th century and a pillar of Swiss culture.

Neuchâtel is often overlooked in favour of more popular destinations like Geneva, but for those in the know, it's the heart and soul of Swiss watchmaking. Our group visited a prestigious watchmaking workshop in La Chaux-de-Fonds. This town thrives on its horological heritage. The streets here are lined with buildings that seem to echo the precision and patience that goes into creating a timepiece, with windows in places that allow maximum light for watch artists to create their time pieces. Watchmaking

isn't just a profession in Neuchâtel; it's an art form, passed down through generations, with a commitment to quality and tradition that you can feel in the air.

Inside the workshop Le Garde Temps, we were greeted by skilled artisans bent over their workbenches, each one carefully assembling the intricate parts of a mechanical watch. Seeing the inner workings of a Swiss watch up close was mesmerizing. Hundreds of tiny components, each one meticulously crafted and assembled by hand, work together in perfect harmony to keep time with breathtaking precision.

What struck me most was the sheer patience involved. These artisans spent hours, sometimes days, perfecting a single element of a watch. It made me realize that Swiss watches aren't just luxury items; they're the result of generations of dedication to perfection. We were even given the chance to try our hand at assembling a watch movement—a process that was both thrilling and humbling. I quickly learned that handling the minuscule components with precision and care was no easy feat (I managed to lose many pieces). It gave me a whole new level of respect for the craft and justified the 6-year process it usually takes to become a "master of time" or watchmaker.

Following the tour, we were taken to the International Museum of Time (Musée International d'Horlogerie) in La Chaux-de-Fonds, a mesmerizing tribute to the art and history of timekeeping. Housing an extensive collection of over 4,500 timepieces, from ancient sundials to modern luxury watches, the museum offers a captivating journey through the evolution of horology. Interactive exhibits and beautifully curated displays highlight the meticulous craftsmanship and innovation behind watchmaking. The museum's blend of history, technology, and artistry makes it a must-visit for

both horology enthusiasts and casual visitors. It's a true gem that showcases Switzerland's deep connection to the world of precision and time.

Our final hours that day were spent at the Zenith watch factory. A tour was given of the factory along with an in-depth look at Charles Vermot, the founder of Zenith and the famous el primero movement. The El Primero movement, developed by Charles Vermot in 1969, was the world's first high-fre-

quency automatic chronograph, capable of measuring time to 1/10th of a second. Vermot preserved its plans during the quartz crisis, ensuring its survival. Today, it remains a landmark in precision watchmaking and innovation.

Absinthe in the Land of the Green Fairy

Our third and fourth day was all about absinthe, and I was eager to learn more about this infamous drink. We were taken to Valde-Travers, the birthplace of absinthe, where distilleries now proudly craft the spirit that was once considered contraband. Our wonderful Swiss guide, Mr Steve Weisshaupt, met us at a small, family-owned distillery, where the air was thick with the aromas of anise and fennel, two key ingredients in absinthe. It was a cozy, almost magical place, surrounded by lush green hills, the perfect setting for a drink with such an evocative history.

As we toured the distillery, our guide shared the fascinating backstory of absinthe's rise, fall, and resurrection. Banned for nearly a century, the production of absinthe was driven underground for decades. It wasn't until 2005 that absinthe production was legalized in Switzerland again. I had never tasted authentic absinthe before this trip, so when it came time for a tasting, I wasn't sure what to expect. As I watched the bartender slowly drip cold water over a sugar cube, turning the bright green liquid into a cloudy opalescent drink, I was captivated by the ritual.

The first sip was strong, with a bold liquorice-like flavor that softened as it lingered. Absinthe is an acquired taste, but its complexity makes it more than just a drink—it's an experience. We learned about the traditional method of enjoying absinthe, often referred to as «louching,» where water dilutes the spirit, releasing its full spectrum of flavors. By the end of our tasting session, I found myself with a new appreciation for this once-forbidden elixir. And what better place to experience absinthe than in the valley where it was born?

An Evening in Neuchâtel: Where Tradition Meets Modernity

That evening, we arrived in the town of Neuchâtel, where we had a chance to wind down and reflect on the day's experiences. Neuchâtel, with its medieval streets and stunning lakeside views, offers the perfect blend of history and modern comfort. Its important to mention that the Neuchâtel Tourist Card, of which we were all using, offers visitors free access to a range of attractions and public transport within the canton. Available to anyone staying for at least one night in participating accommodations, the card includes museums, boat trips, and mountain trains, making it an excellent way to explore the region affordably. We strolled along the shores of Lake Neuchâtel, where the sunset painted the sky in shades of pink and gold, before heading to a cozy brasserie for dinner.

The local cuisine here is as rich and diverse as the region's history. We indulged in clas-



sic Swiss dishes like fondue and rösti, accompanied by local wines (Neuchâtel Non Filtré, divine). But, of course, absinthe made another appearance, this time in the form of an absinthe-infused dessert. It was a surprisingly delightful twist on the traditional crème brûlée, with the herbaceous flavour of the absinthe complementing the sweet custard perfectly. As the evening drew to a close, I realized how much this region had enchanted me. Neuchâtel isn't just about watches or absinthe—it's about a way of life that values craftsmanship, tradition, and the slow, deliberate process of creation.

Enchanted, fairly tale city

As I left Neuchâtel, I found myself reflecting on how this region embodies the essence of Switzerland in a way that no glossy tourist brochure could ever capture. It's a place of guiet excellence, where age-old traditions are still alive, and where the green hills and clock towers are symbols of a timeless commitment to quality. Whether it's the bold taste of absinthe or the meticulous crafting of a Swiss watch, Neuchâtel is a place where time, in all its forms, is savoured. The trip had opened my eyes not only to the region's cultural treasures but also to the philosophy that underpins them. And as I watched the landscape of Neuchâtel fade into the distance, I felt a deep appreciation for the craftsmanship, patience, and pride that make this corner of Switzerland truly special. •

Left Bank Luxury

Mark Browne visited the famous "left bank" area of Paris for *Together Magazine*



rith the clamour, disruption and crowds of the Paris Olympic Games now fading into the rearview mirror, but the many urban renovations undertaken for the event still fresh, this may be the perfect time to revisit the "city of light", Paris. And where better to re-immerse oneself in the glory of this world celebrated city than the Left Bank, or «Rive Gauche». Encompassing several districts, including the Latin Quarter and upmarket Saint-Germain-des-Prés this is a vibrant and historically rich area stretching along the southern

side of the Seine River that has long been associated with artists, intellectuals and a Bohemian style of culture. Many view it as embodying the quintessential Parisian experience.

The area has always been influenced by the presence of historic institutions like the Sorbonne University, founded in the 13th century, which has ensured a lively local student population as well as fresh influxes of new arrivals and ideas annually. In fact the area is known for its historic architecture and

landmarks spanning the centuries. These include the mausoleum of Le Panthéon, the museums of Les Invalides (as well as the tomb of Napoleon Bonaparte), the 17th century Luxembourg Gardens and the Musée d'Orsay, now a gallery known for its world class collection of impressionist masterpieces.

Indeed, the Left Bank is perhaps best known for its artistic side. Associated with numerous historic luminaries of both literature and the visual arts, it remains home to numerous theatres and cinemas, showcasing both classic French films and contemporary works as well as the famous (and many lesser known) art galleries.

It also has played host to the social lives of these artists and intellectuals through the years and its streets remain filled with the cafes, bars and restaurants where many of these figures held court in past decades. With most still substantially preserved intact, a visit can constitute a living history

lesson. It is all too easy to imagine a literary giant of yesteryear appearing for a drink at your side!


Walking the winding cobbled streets of the area and browsing its many boutiques while sightseeing or selecting a suitable spot for refreshment is certainly a pleasure, but a riverboat taxi along the Seine is an experience not to be missed and affords unrivalled views of both banks of the city.

Where to Stay

A stay in the iconic landmark hotel, the Hotel Lutetia is the ultimate way to indulge yourself on the accommodation front in the left bank area. Located in Saint-Germaindes-Prés, the Hotel Lutetia dates back over a century and is the only luxury Palace level hotel on the Left Bank. The hotel building itself is an architectural masterpiece and a temple to the Art Deco style. It was a pioneering exponent of this style when first constructed in the early nineteenth century and went on to inspire buildings around the world in the following decades. Its history is nicely captured in photography journals available in the hotel itself.

But time has not stood still here – in recent years the hotel has been fully modernised and reinvigorated in a €200 million renovation project. This has ensured that its furnishings reflect the height of French elegance and style while reflecting its historical legacy.

Hotel rooms, and especially its luxury Suites, offer exceptional views over Paris as well as the level of comfort only to be found in a palace hotel.

The Hotel has its own wellness centre-Akasha. This was even awarded the accolade of 'Frances' Best Hotel Spa 2023' at the World Spa Awards that year. Quite a feat for a city centre location and clearly a perfect spot to relax after a day of shopping and sightseeing!

The hotel also offers a range of dining and bar options in suitable Parisian style. Two of the most iconic are Le Saint-Germain - a central salon perfect for lunch or afternoon tea crowned by a ceiling comprised of a brightly coloured glass canopy by Fabrice Hyber, and the Bar Aristide. This internal area has the ambience of private club-cumcigar lounge with dak leather furnishings and is the perfect venue for the weekly jazz evenings hosted there. The perfect way to ignite a Left Bank bohemian feel! •

Williamsburg-Hipster heaven in New York

Mark Browne visited the fashionable area of Williamsburg in New York



The city of New York, renowned as a global city and international melting pot, constantly evolves as new commercial and cultural influences come to bear. With the increased gentrification of once edgy neighbourhoods in Manhattan such as the Meat Packing District and Hells Kitchen, younger residents and the artistic community have sought out new enclaves and transformed formerly relatively sleepy

areas of the city into vibrant neighbourhoods.

One of those to have really blossomed in recent years is Williamsburg. Located in the borough of Brooklyn and across the East River from Manhattan, what was once a quiet industrial and residential area has metamorphosed into a trendy hotspot with a distinctly hipster feel, characterised by its

thriving artistic community, busy streets and eclectic collection of coffee houses, restaurants and bars frequented by a youthful and diverse community.

Residents of the neighbourhood in past decades were traditionally typically immigrant communities from Eastern Europe and it retains reminders of its history in the form of historic brownstone houses and churches. Today however many of these serve as galleries, studios or performance spaces adding to the sense of local bohemian charm. Not that there is even any requirement to visit a gallery to see some art locally as the area is renowned for its street art. Many buildings are decorated with extensive and elaborate colourful murals. However, for those with an interest in the area's history and broader cultural influences the Williamsburg Art and Historical centre on Broadway or the City Reliquary Museum on Metropolitan Avenue are two good points of reference to visit.

A primary attraction of the neighbourhood for visitors is its hipster scene. Shop in its great collection of clothing boutiques offering both original and vintage items. Dine in its vast array of culinary locations from gourmet restaurants to food trucks or browse the local artisanal shops and markets for unusual ingredients. Hang out in its trendy bars and coffee shops. Enjoy the live music, performances and shows in its clubs. Williamsburg is certainly a fantastic area for people watching the heterogeneous crowd all also enjoying those same myriad options!

However, its not just another part of the urban jungle. With its riverside location and green spaces like verdant McClaren Park, Williamsburg can also offer a break from the metropolitan atmosphere of New York- but with great views back across the river at the skyscrapers of Manhattan! Williamsburg offers something for everyone.







Staying in Willamsburg

Willamsburg is readily accessible from Manhattan by cab across the Williamsburg bridge or its just a few stops on the sub-way, with three separate lines running through the neighbourhood and one (the L) going straight across to lower Manhattan. Walking or cycling across the Williamsburg bridge is also a popular route and a tourist attraction in its own right! All of this makes it convenient for a visit but for those who wish to linger to enjoy the local ambience - and nightlife! -staying locally is the best option. The Penny Hotel situated right in the heart of Williamsburg is a great choice for such a visit. Housed in a modern building with great natural light from its large windows, the hotel has an artistic vibe in keeping with the surrounding area and is richly decorated with original works throughout. It features bedrooms that are surprisingly spacious for New York and are fully equipped to give a comfortable studio apartment fee. Little touches throughout give it an originality and homeliness, adding to this ambience.

However, one of the best features of the hotel is its fashionable rooftop bar and restaurant - elNico. Featuring a modern Mexican themed menu, the high end cuisine is accompanied by fantastic views over Williamsburg and across to the Manhattan skyline beyond. A perfect spot for a date night, whether just enjoying sunset happy hour cocktails such as the signature agavebased blends, or the full dinner experience against the glimmering lights of the city. However, its also a great space to relax over brunch while savouring the daytime view with tasty nibbles high above the bustle of the streets below. Definitely a spot to check out both for hotel guests and those visiting the neighbourhood! •

The Diamond of the Alps!

Mark Browne explored a diamond of a ski resort in Austria - through a unique crystal lens!



Tith news of early snow falls in the Alps already, Together Magazine looks at one of the highest Austrian resorts which will soon open. The quest for the greater snow surety afforded by the highest slopes has driven the increased development of once remote hamlets high in the Alps. This has certainly been the case with Gurgl in Ötztal, western Austria. Known as the "Diamond of the Alps", the neighbouring villages of Obergurgl and Hochgurgl which together make up the Gurgl ski area, have been expanded substantially in recent years to cater to the demand for premium level resorts and take advantage of the surroun-

ding snowy slopes. These range in altitude from 1,800 metres to over 3,000 metres and this lofty altitude ensures that the resort is among the first to open each season – typically in mid November – and also that it can continues to operate all the way until mid-April.

Where to Stay

Hotel development has primarily been at the premium level in Gurgl so that there are now over 25 four or five star hotels in the resort, many of which have the fantastic added bonus of being ski-in ski-out venues. A perfect example of this is the impressive Crystal VAYA Unique Hotel. The VAYA Group has grown in recent years to become the largest Austian Alpine hotel group, owning and operating almost 30 properties. Accordingly, they certainly know the Austrian market and how to accentuate its premium qualities, all of which are evident in this particular hotel.

The hotel is located at 2,000 metres at the start of the village of Obergurgl. The primary feeder ski lift from Obergurgl, the Festkoglbahn, is directly adjacent to the hotel's ski depot, which itself is accessible from the base of both blue and red pistes for pure ski in-ski out convenience.

The hotel offers a selection of room styles and sizes but all have been finished in first quality Alpine style and most have balconies enjoying commanding views across the surrounding slopes. Its large spa area extends to over 2,000 metres and boasts internal and external pools as well as a range of sauna and steam rooms (with separate textile and nontextile areas available). It also offers ESPA signature treatments onsite. The perfect antidote after a hard day on the slopes! The hotel's restaurant offers similarly high quality options with a range of authentic local culinary delicacies being served nightly.







More About Gurgl

The local ski area includes 112 km of slopes and massive investment in infrastructure in recent years means these are now accessible by 25 lifts, ensuring great access and no waiting time in gueues. Night skiing is also available weekly. A variety of terrain is available suitable for all levels of skiing ability, including beginners. However the presence of more challenging pistes and gradients enabled the resort to host the premiere of the AUDI FIS Ski World Cup mens slalom at the start of this season. It has also become a popular training area for competition level skiers from across Europe. Nor does the fun stop there - visitors also have the option of purchasing the Ötztal Super Skipass which also enables access to the other resorts in the Ötztal region (six in total, including Solden), with a combined ski area of over 330 km with 90 mountain liftsamong the largest areas in Europe!

The development occurring in recent years in this area has been done with an eye to quality and style. Many of the new buildings have been constructed with traditional alpine design elements, often combined with

a contemporary twist such as extensive use of glass to enable guests to savour the views.

While the resort does have some slopeside bars for typically lively Austrian apres-ski indulgence after a hard day on the slopes, it is significantly less boisterous than the nearby resort of Solden, making it a preferred choice of families and couples. It attracts a mixed international clientele primarily from across the EU and the UK.

Other Attractions

The views of the surrounding terrain are outstanding and take in the sweeping valley as well as over 20 peaks above 3,000 metres in the surrounding mountains. Nonskiing visitors are catered to with pedestrian lift passes allowing them to access these vistas, as well as the various mountain restaurants, viewing points and bars.

A key non winter-sports attraction located in Hochqural is the Motorcycle Experience World. This impressive museum features over 400 motorbikes reflecting their full history and development, all hosed in an imposing structure boasting a fine slopeside restaurant. Neighbouring Solden also hosts the inspiring 007 Elements interactive exhibition reflecting the ski related segments featured in James Bond movies. Perfect options if a diversion from active sporting activity is preferred! Complimentary access is however afforded with some ski pass options. In summary, with snow assured, great slopes and quality accommodation, Gurgl is definitely a new horizon worth exploring!

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
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

Discovering the Tapas



The first round of tapas arrived and immediately transported me to the bustling streets of Barcelona. There was a beautiful array of dishes, each one showcasing the simplicity and boldness of Spanish cuisine. I started with the classic Pan con Tomate. a staple in Spain, and it was everything I hoped for-crispy bread rubbed with garlic and topped with fresh, ripe tomatoes and a drizzle of high-quality olive oil. Sometimes, the simplest dishes are the hardest to get right, but this one nailed it.

Next came the Jamon croquettes, another essential on any tapas menu. These perfectly crisp were served with a spicy, smoky sauce that packed a punch without overpowering the dish. It was clear that the chef from Sofitel Barcelona had infused these traditional recipes with a refined, modern touch while staying true to their roots.

One of the most memorable tapas of the evening was the Pulpo a la Gallega-tender octopus served over a bed of soft potatoes

and dusted with smoky paprika. It's one of those dishes that's deceptively simple but requires great skill to perfect, and it didn't disappoint. The octopus was incredibly tender, and the flavours were balanced beautifully, creating a dish that was both rich and liaht.

The Perfect Pairing: Drinks and Music

Speaking of drinks, the hotel's mixologist, Nicola Fenu was on hand, crafting cocktails that elevated the entire evening. Inspired by both Spanish and Belgian flavours, the cocktails ranged from refreshing, citrusy spritzes to more robust, spirit-forward drinks. I opted for a gin and tonic made with Spanish gin, a generous garnish of herbs, and a splash of Mediterranean tonic water. It was the perfect companion to the tapas, light and zesty with just the right amount of bitterness.

What really set the evening apart, though, was the atmosphere. The live band created a vibrant backdrop, playing a mix of jazz and upbeat pop, which added an extra layer of enjoyment. The music floated through the open-air terrace, enhancing the laid-back summer vibe. As the night went on, it was easy to get lost in the sounds, the clinking of glasses, and the laughter of fellow diners enjoying the evening's delights.

The place to be

The hotel has curated a series of events. from themed nights to live music performances, designed to turn their already popular terrace into an Autumn hotspot. The tapas menu, paired with a rotating selection of live entertainment and craft cocktails, is just the beginning. The hotel has managed to create an environment where you can escape the hustle of the city and unwind in style. 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Dîner dans le Noir: Sensorial extravaganza

Michael Beadling dives into the unknown at the new dining in the dark experience at the luxurious Stanhope Hotel Brussels by Thon Hotels



Then I first heard about the concept of dining in complete darkness, my curiosity was instantly piqued. Imagine stripping away the most basic senses we rely on to appreciate food — sight. Would the experience heighten my other senses, or would it be unsettling? When I found out that the Stanhope Hotel Brussels, nestled in the Euro Quarter, offered a «Dining in the Dark» experience, I knew I had to try it.

The Stanhope Hotel itself is the epitome of luxury. It's a place where old-world elegance meets modern refinement, set against the backdrop of Brussels' political and cultural heart.



Arriving at the Venue

As I entered the lobby of the Stanhope, I was greeted by the sight of its lavish décor — crystal chandeliers, velvet armchairs, and polished marble floors. The staff welcomed me with characteristic warmth. I made my way straight to the Stanhope library bar where I ordered a whiskey, neat, and marvelled at the beautiful blend of opulence and hospitality.

Before the dinner, I was briefed on what to expect and was asked of any allergies I may have to certain foods. Phones, watches, and anything that could emit light were strictly prohibited, and they would all be safely stored before the meal. The purpose was to immerse diners fully in the experience, without any distractions. I felt a nervous excitement brewing as I handed over my be-



longings, understanding that I was about to surrender my comfort zone.

Entering the Darkness

A server guided me, my plus one and the other guests into the dining area. We were in small groups, and each group had a personal guide, someone who had mastered navigating the pitch black (a unique skill requiring weeks of training). As we passed through heavy velvet curtains, I was immediately plunged into a world devoid of light. I couldn't even see my hand in front of my face. Every sound, every whisper, seemed amplified in the absence of sight as I was unable to visually process spatial distance.

The guide instructed us on how to find our seats and place our hands on the table in front of us. I gingerly felt around for my utensils and water glass, my brain already working overtime to compensate for my lost sense of vision. Sitting there in complete darkness, I felt a heightened awareness of the other diners — the shuffling, soft laughter, and occasional clinking of cutlery were suddenly more intimate, as though we were all sharing a secret.

The Sensory Adventure Begins

Once settled, the first course was served, and I hadn't a clue what it was. The hotel did not reveal the menu in advance, adding to the suspense. I used my hands to gently explore the plate, trying to identify textures and shapes before attempting to taste anything. My first bite was a revelation. The flavours seemed sharper, more pronounced. Without visual cues, I was relying entirely on taste, smell, and texture.

The starter turned out to be a delicate combination of seafood and citrus, though I only pieced this together through smell and the tangy, refreshing flavours. Each bite felt like a small victory, as if I were discovering a secret through touch and taste. Without the

distraction of presentation, I found myself savouring the food in a way I never had before

A Different Kind of Dining Experience

As the courses progressed, the food continued to surprise and delight. The main course was rich and hearty, with flavours that were earthy and warm — I guessed some kind of braised meat with root vegetables, but I couldn't be sure. Every bite was an exercise in mindfulness, forcing me to slow down and focus entirely on the moment. I tried to imagine what the plate looked like, but after a while, I realised that it didn't matter. My perception of the food was completely independent of its appearance.

The dining experience became more than just about the food. It was a conversation with my senses. Without the usual distractions, I became hyper-aware of the texture of the food — the way it felt on my tongue, how it melted, crunched, or lingered in my mouth. I also noticed that my hearing had become more acute. I could hear the soft rustle of the server's clothes as they moved around, the distant hum of voices from another table, and even the sound of my own breath in the darkness.

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Conversation Without Distraction

In the dark, conversations took on a new dimension as well. I found myself speaking to my plus one and the other guests in a more thoughtful, deliberate way. We couldn't rely on facial expressions or body language, so we used our words more carefully. The usual small talk quickly gave way to deeper, more meaningful exchanges. I was speaking to strangers, but it felt strangely intimate. Perhaps it was the shared experience of vulnerability — after all, without sight, we were all on an equal footing.

Dessert and the Final Course

By the time dessert arrived, I had settled into the rhythm of the experience. The dessert was a blend of creamy and crunchy textures, with flavours that were sweet but not overwhelming. I later learned it was a deconstructed fruit tart, though my own interpretation had been something entirely different. That, I realised, was part of the fun — the guessing game, the way each course challenged my preconceptions about food.

Emerging from the Darkness

When the meal was over, we were gently guided back out into the light. The sudden brightness was almost overwhelming, and I blinked, readjusting to the world of sight. Myself and guests were then led to a small presentation room by waiters, as they showcased the meals we had just eaten in a big mystery reveal type finale that was worthy of an episode of scooby doo or Agatha Christie novel "Ah-ha! It was beef fillet! I knew it was you all along!". I felt a sense of accomplishment, not only because I had navigated the meal successfully, but because the experience had given me a deeper appreciation for food — not as something to be consumed, but as something to be experienced with all the senses. With a price tag of 158 euros for two people (79 for one), wine pairing included with water, it's an absolute bargain. 

The Timeless Legacy of Hans/ Jean & Sophie Taeuber-Arp

Together magazine suggests heading to the BOZAR this Autumn for inspirational art in Hans/Jean Arp & Sophie Taeuber-Ar



¬his autumn, the BOZAR Center for Fine Arts in Brussels hosts a remarkable exhibition that celebrates two of the 20th century's most influential avant-garde artists: Hans/Jean Arp and Sophie Taeuber-Arp. Running from September 20, 2024, to January 19, 2025, this exhibition promises to provide a rich and immersive journev through the creative worlds of these artists whose radical innovations shaped the trajectory of modern art. BOZAR's curators, in this instance, have been intentional in redressing that imbalance, giving her the prominent focus she deserves.

This exhibition showcases pieces like Composition Dada (1920) and her delicate beadwork, which serve as an excellent reminder of her innovation in both fine and applied arts. The

They questioned traditional hierarchies between the fine and applied arts, as well as the boundaries between artistic disciplines, resulting in a unique and forward-thinking body of work that continues to influence contemporary artists today.

The works of Hans/Jean Arp and Sophie Taeuber-Arp remain deeply relevant in today's artistic and cultural landscape. 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

Elliott Erwitt Retrospective

Michael Beadling went to take a closer look at the photographic works of Elliott Erwitt: A Celebration of Wit, Humanity, and Timeless Photography in Brussels



Brussels will host an extraordinary retrospective of the legendary photographer Elliott Erwitt at the Royal Museums of Fine Arts of Belgium. This long-awaited exhibition offers a comprehensive look at Erwitt's iconic body of work, spanning more than seven decades. Known for his keen sense of humor, poignant observations, and ability to capture fleeting moments of humanity, Erwitt's photography transcends time, place, and culture.

The Brussels exhibition will showcase over 200 of Erwitt's most famous black-and-white images, along with rarely seen works that demonstrate the depth and diversity of his career. For both seasoned admirers and

newcomers to Erwitt's work, this exhibition promises an intimate journey through the lens of a photographer who has shaped the way we see the world.

A Life Behind the Lens

Born in Paris in 1928 to Russian émigré parents, Elliott Erwitt moved to the United States as a child, where he eventually found his way into photography. His career took off in the late 1940s, and by the 1950s, he had joined the prestigious Magnum Photos, a cooperative agency founded by some of the 20th century's most influential photographers, including Henri Cartier-Bresson and Robert Capa. Erwitt quickly became known for his ability to capture candid, of-



ten humorous moments in everyday life, a style that set him apart in the world of photojournalism.

Though Erwitt has worked as a commercial photographer, director, and documentarian, it's his personal photography—full of irony, tenderness, and wit—that has solidified his status as one of the greats. His images of dogs, presidents, celebrities, and ordinary people offer a unique window into the human condition, often blending the absurd with the deeply moving.

The Exhibition: Iconic Moments and Hidden Gems

The Elliott Erwitt retrospective in Brussels will provide a sweeping overview of his prolific career. Divided into thematic sections, the exhibition will explore his most famous works while delving into lesser-known projects. The chronological and thematic layout allows visitors to see the evolution of Erwitt's style, from his early works documenting post-war America to his more personal and introspective later projects.

One of the highlights of the exhibition is Erwitt's series on dogs, an enduring subject throughout his career. Known for his lighthearted yet profoundly empathetic portraits of dogs, Erwitt's canine photographs are a delightful study in personality and emotion. Images like Dog with Rubber Bone (New York, 1974) and Paris, France, 1989 (the small dog peering from beneath a large man's coat) are emblematic of his ability to find humor in the everyday. The exhibition will present this collection in its full glory, reminding visitors that Erwitt's love for dogs is as much about capturing the human spirit as it is about the animals themselves.

Another section focuses on Erwitt's exploration of political and historical figures, offering a more serious tone. His 1963 photograph of Jacqueline Kennedy at her husband's funeral is one of the most iconic images in American history, capturing the profound grief of a widow and a nation. Similarly, his photographs of Richard Nixon and Nikita Khrushchev's famous «Kitchen Debate» in Moscow, also from 1963, show his knack for being in the right place at the right time, as well as his gift for capturing the underlying tension in a seemingly mundane moment.

Of course, Erwitt's celebrity portraits also feature prominently in the exhibition. His images of Marilyn Monroe, Che Guevara, and Fidel Castro stand as iconic portraits of 20th-century figures, blending glamour and naturalism in a way only Erwitt could achieve. His 1956 portrait of Marilyn Monroe on the set of The Seven Year Itch reveals her radiance and vulnerability, a moment of calm amid the chaos of her fame.

However, the exhibition doesn't stop at Erwitt's greatest hits. It also offers a glimpse into some of his more experimental work, including his self-portraits and personal projects, which are lesser-known but just as impactful. His irreverent self-portraits, often featuring a playful twist or humorous touch, highlight the photographer's wry wit and ability to see the world with a critical, yet affectionate, eye.



Alexandre Farto (aka Vhils): MULTITUDE Solo Exhibition

rom June 28, 2024, to January 5, 2025, the MIMA Museum of Arts in Brussels will host MULTITUDE, a solo exhibition by the renowned Portuguese artist Alexandre Farto, better known as Vhils. Known for his unique and powerful artistic style, Vhils has gained international recognition for creating arresting portraits using a technique of etching and sculpting into walls, often incorporating urban decay and industrial materials into his works.

This exhibition promises to be a deeply evocative exploration of identity, urban space, and the collective human experience, capturing the attention of art enthusiasts and casual visitors alike.

Explosive Art: Some of his large-scale portraits are created using controlled explosions, symbolizing how urbanization and industrialization often disrupt individual lives. These explosive murals reflect both the destruction and creation inherent in city life, showing the fragility and resilience of human existence.

Multimedia and Immersive Installations: Vhils' work has evolved beyond traditional graffiti or street art, moving toward immersive installations that combine video, sound,

and sculpture. In MULTITUDE, these elements will likely be used to further enhance the theme of collective identity, giving the exhibition a modern, dynamic feel.

The Themes: Urban Identity, Memory, and Change

At the heart of MULTITUDE is the concept of urban identity—how cities, with all their complexity and chaos, shape and reflect human lives.
